Pontiac Central's Tipton Sets Two Of Eight Marks

MOUNT PLEASANT (AP) — Bill Tipton set records in the high and low hurdles Friday night as defending champion Pontiac Central won the 16th annual Central Michigan Class A Invitational Track Meet.

Eight records were set in the 13-event meet held in Central Michigan University's field house. Eighteen teams competed.

Pontiac Central rolled up 39 points. Flint Central, which got record performances from Freels Bacon in the high jump and Herb Washington in the 60-yard dash, was second with 36½.

Flint Northern's Jim Love set a 1:58 record in the 880 and Gene Lee pole vaulter a record 13 feet, ½-inch. Northern was third, with 36 points.

Next were Midland 33, Flint Southwestern 18, Mount Pleasant and Waterford Kettering 10, Saginaw 6½, Traverse City 6, Muskegon Mona Shores and Flint Kearsley 3, Bay City Central 2, Bay City Handy and Saginaw Douglas MacArthur 1.

The record-setting performances were:

Long jump — Lavern Miller, Flint, Southwestern, 22 feet, 11½ inches. (Previous record by Hayes Jones of Pontiac, 22 feet 9½ inches, in 1956)

65-yard high hurdles — Bill Tipton, Pontiac Central, 7.7 (Previous by Tipton, 1966, and Hayes Jones, Pontiac, 1956, 7.8.)

High jump — Freels Bacon, Flint Central 6 feet 5¾ inches. (Old by Ray Hudson, Pontiac, 6 feet 5¾ inches, 1962)

60-yard dash — Herb Washington, Flint Central 6:15. (Old by Delton Kimble, Flint Northern, 1962, and Wilbur Johnson, Flint Northern, 1963, 6:2)

65-yard low hurdles — Bill Tipton, Pontiac Central 7:15. (Old by Dennis McGee, Flint Northern, 1961; Delton Kimble, Flint Northern, 1963, 7:2.)

880 — Jim Love, Flint Northern, 1:58.0. (Old by Love, 1966, 2:1.5.)

Pole vault — Gene Lee, Flint Northern, 13 feet 6 inch. (Old by Bill Lee, Flint Central, 1963, 12 feet 10 inches.)

Two miles — Don Yeale, Midland, 9:53.8. (New event and thus a record.)

Running Key To Warriors NBA Success

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The San Francisco Warriors, who hit a snag in the third game of their Western Division National Basketball Association playoffs with the St. Louis Hawks, hope their fast break will carry them right into the championship finals.

The key to Warrior success, says their top scorer Rick Barry, is running.

"We'll have to do more running to win Saturday," he said.

San Francisco won the first two games of the playoff 117-115 and 143-136 before they were derailed Wednesday 115-109 by the Hawks.

Barry scored 38 and 47 points, respectively, in the first two games and 31 here when the Hawks won.

The teams will resume the battle here tonight in the best-of-7 series. They move back to San Francisco Monday for the fifth game.

The winner in the West will play either Philadelphia or Boston in the NBA's finals. Philadelphia has won three straight and is only a game away from taking the Eastern playoff and ending Boston's string of championships at eight.

The two Eastern division teams meet Sunday afternoon in Boston in a televised game.
