## Dropped Baton Beats Central

Just to show determination, the Tribe managed to foul up

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two relays Saturday. Its 440 relay team was second by threetenths of a second which could be attributed to a bad handoff. The 880 team never had a chance after the baton dropped, fin-

ishing sixth in a field of seven. THE BOO-BOO came with the Indians running third, a po-

sition which would have assured victory had they maintained it. With Herb Washington due for the anchor leg, it's logical to assume they could have earned those six points. Washington already had demonstrated his ability, joining teammate Freels Bacon and Pontiac Central's Bill Tipton as

stars in a record-smashing parade for Class A and B schools. Washington broke the 100-yard dash record with a time of 9.8 seconds, narrowly beating Flint Northern's William Wallace who was clocked in 9.85. BACON BROKE the meet's oldest record with a 6-6 high

jump. The former record of 6-5% had been the property of Central's Floyd Bates Sr., since 1938. Later Bacon exceeded his previous best long jump by 19% inches to win with 22%. Added to a somewhat surprising six points by the middle

distance relay team, it looked like Central's day. With three events to go it had an 11-point edge. Then misfortune set in.

Central, Northern and Pontiac were in the same 880 heat. Northern got the early lead, Pontiac was second and Central was third halfway around the track when the baton dropped.

Even so, victory still appeared somewhat possible until Tipton took over. HE WAS SECOND by about four yards at the final exchange but outlegged Wallace to bag 12 points for first place.

Earlier Tipton won the high hurdles in 13.6 and the lows in 18.4. The latter was a meet record. His time for the highs was only one-tenth more than the national high school record but the wind gauge briefly fluttered beyond the 4.473 miles-per-
