

Ties World Record for 60 Yards

McCullouch Hurdles in 6.8

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Miss Volvelaere had tied the world records were set or tied with almost methodical frequency in the National AAU Indoor Track and Field Meet Saturday night.

Pat Van Wolverlaere of the Angeles Track Club won the 60-yard low hurdles in 7.4 seconds, breaking the 7.5 women's mark set in 1965 by Tammy Davis of the Frederick T.C.

Three women's teams broke the world record in the 4x160 sprint relay with Chicago's Mayor Daley Youth Foundation quartet timed in 1:11.9, half a second faster than the Detroit Track Club had set it last year.

Earl McCullouch said he was both happy and disappointed.

McCullouch tied the indoor 60-yard high hurdles world record at 6.8 in a semifinal heat. The effort matched the mark set by Hayes Jones in 1964. He won the final too easily in 6.9 and regretted he wasn't pushed to a faster time.

NY Notches 3rd in Row Over Bulls

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Knickerbockers, substituting freely after the first period, coasted past Chicago 109-101 Saturday night for their third straight National Basketball Association victory and eighth in the last 10 games.

Although the margin of victory was only eight points, it was as close as Chicago could get after the Knicks moved from a 29-27 first period deficit to a 39-27 lead early in the second period.

The Mayor Daley Youth Foundation quartet from Chicago ran the fastest women's sprint relay heat, 1:11.9, breaking the 1:12.4 record set by the Detroit Track Club in this meet a year ago.

Martin McGrady of Santa Clara Valley Youth Village ran the fastest ever 600 yards on an 11 laps to the mile-oval to win over Lee Evans of San Jose State. Both were timed in 1:09.2.

Ed Burke, Southern California Striders, successfully defended

his 35-pound weight throw crown with 65-3/4. Hal Connolly, also of the Striders and former Olympic hammer throw gold medalist, was second at 64-4/8.

Randy Matson, a former world outdoor champion, passed up the shot put here, saying he was through with indoor competition. After receiving the Sullivan Award in Los Angeles, he flew home to Pampa, Tex.

1 Blue Chip Left Unsigned

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—Only one blue chipper remained unsigned Saturday as the Southwest Conference football recruiting campaign levelled off.

The lone top prospect not yet choosing a college is Ken Farrier, Spring Branch tackle. He apparently is leaning toward Texas but may wind up going to a junior college.

In the recruiting drive, Texas A&M, Rice, Southern Methodist, Arkansas and Texas Tech each bagged two blue chippers. Texas A&M, Baylor and Texas Christian each signed four all-stars to letters of intent.

Texas A&M leads in the signings, with 46 of the 50 allowed. Texas Christian has 45, Southern Methodist 43, Arkansas 42, Texas Tech 41, Texas 35, Rice 33 and Baylor 31.

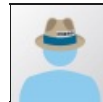
