## Foreword

This is the 11th edition of the High School Track and Field Annual and, as usual, our national lists and records disagree with the National Federation. We make no restrictions because of the type of meet, competition or whether it was or was not a winning effort. Marks made in AAU or other outside competitions have been included in the lists, as have non-winning marks in all types of meets where it is assumed such times (generally unofficial) are reasonably accurate. Performances during the summer months, until September, are included. Some people contend these should not be counted--especially for seniors--but many state meets or other post-season invitationals are entirely legitimate.

Boys who have not received a diploma from previous attendance in a high school are accepted so long as they have not exceeded four years or reached their 20th birthday.

# Brown 'Athlete of Year'

Reynaldo Brown is a phenomenon which comes along rarely in high school track: a national prep record-holder, a consistent topper of one of the sport's "magic" barriers, and a US Olympian--all before his senior year of high school.

In 1968, Brown was prep high-jumping's number one leaper. He was undefeated in every prep competition he entered, cleared 7-foot four times in prep competition (once at 7' $\frac{3}{4}$ ' for a national record which was later bettered by Wasco, Calif.'s, Otis Hailey, and another at 7'0" which annexed his second consecutive Cal state title), soared an unbelievable 7' $\frac{3}{4}$ ' in the Final Olympic Trials to make the US team, and placed fifth in the biggest meet of all, the Mexico Olympic Games, with a 7' $\frac{1}{4}$ ' effort. For such superb performances, Reynaldo Brown is 1968's high school "Athlete of the Year".

The year 1968 truly was a stellar year for the senior at Compton, Calif., High. Besides going undefeated and winning his numerous honors, Brown also won the Compton-Coliseum Relays prep competition at 7'0". He slipped to a tie for seventh in the AAU championships, clearing 6'9". At the Semi Olympic Trials, however, he bounced back, literally, getting over 7'0" again for third place.

Still, up to the Final Trials, Brown wasn't really considered a prime threat for the team. In several pre-Olympic meets, he was jumping only in the 6'8"-6'10" range and in one even sagged to 6'3". But, when the chips were down, Brown ignored the tremendous pressure of the Trials and cleared 7'3", along with Ed Caruthers and Dick Fosbury, to qualify for the United States team.

At Mexico, Brown again showed his maturity, despite his youth, to the cream of the world's jumpers. He didn't miss until the bar reached 7'1 $\frac{1}{8}$ ", cleared 7' $\frac{1}{4}$ " on his first try, and displayed supreme confidence by passing 7'1". He missed badly on his first two tries but narrowly nicked the bar on his final attempt. His fifth place helped earn him the same notch in the world ranking and he was rated the third-best American.

Besides his world-class track talent, Brown is also a basketball player of star caliber. At 6'5", 210-lbs., that's not too surprising. He is the center of Compton's team which won 32 consecutive straight games in 1967-68 and by the first of the year had stretched their string to over 40 games. Brown has scored as much as 28 points in a single game.

But, of course, it is for high-jumping that Reynaldo Brown has made his name well-known.

He first started jumping as a 13-year-old seventh-grader at Compton's Willowbrook Junior High, clearing 5'8". His next year, he went over 5'11" but as a ninth-grader he shot up to 6'5". He kept going up and up, clearing 6'9 $\frac{1}{4}$ " as a sophomore at Compton High to win the state title.

Brown's potential seems unlimited--and he hasn't even been expected to collegiate and national-caliber competition week-after-week as a collegian. Of course, after seeing his performances against world-class competition last year, some of the competition may not be too anxious to meet him.

After all, it is a little disheartening to think an Olympic veteran like Reynaldo Brown still has to look forward to his senior prom.

# Brown, Carrigan Glitter in '68

Reynaldo Brown and Casey Carrigan are still high school seniors who have already attained a goal about which many only dream.

Brown (Compton, Calif.) and Carrigan (Orting, Wash.) were members of the US Olympic track and field team at Mexico City. Brown made the team off an incredible 7'3" effort in the high jump at the Final Trials at South Lake Tahoe, and Carrigan made the squad after clearing an equally astounding 17'0" in the pole vault, the first prep to achieve that feat.

Brown went on to finish fifth in the competition at Mexico City at 7'4" while Carrigan missed a berth in the finals when his pole slithered under the bar and was ruled a miss at the qualifying height of 16'1".

Joining Brown and Carrigan at South Lake Tahoe as the only preps at the Final Trials was Bob Bornkessel (North, Shawnee Mission, Kans.). The Kansas flyer will probably go into the record books as the finest hurdler in prep history after his national records over the three intermediate barrier races, 36.7 for 330-yards, 51.0 for 440-yards and 49.8 for 400-meters. In addition, he clocked 13.7 for the prep high hurdles, 18.1w in the straight 180 lows and also managed an 18.6 legal time over the lows.

One youngster who did not make it to South Lake Tahoe, but who rates in the minds of many right along with those who did, is Sam Walker, who emerged as the finest shot putter in prep annals.

Walker (Samueli, Dallas, Tex.) became the first schoolboy to surpass both the 70- and 71-foot barriers, before finally winding up at 72'3 $\frac{1}{4}$ ", obliterating the national record of 69'6" set in 1967 by Karl Salb (Crossett, Ark.). Walker also bettered the national mark with the 16-lb. bulb when he did 61'1 $\frac{1}{4}$ ", upping Dallas Long's ten-year-old record by  $\frac{3}{4}$ ". Walker's marks are truly among the finest in prep history.

The Brown-Carrigan-Bornkessel-Walker foursome, along with the 440 relay team from Kirkpatrick High of Ft. Worth, Tex., which combined for a 41.1 clocking, comprises the national record claimants for 1968. Bornkessel, of course, claims three standards and Walker two.

The 1968 season saw two other athletes other than Brown clear 7-feet in the high jump, and giving Walker his push in the shot put was Doug Lane (Jefferson, Cedar Rapids, Ia.), who became the only other high schooler to go over 70-feet when he went 11 inches past the once-magic mark.

Otis Hailey (Wasco, Calif.) held the high jump standard for a time at 7'1 $\frac{1}{4}$ ", but that was before Brown's big effort in qualifying for the Olympic Games. Lorenzo Allen (Casa Grande, Ariz.) also had a clearance at 7'0", and a number of others were close to that barrier, including Brown's Compton teammate Pat Bradford, who did 6'11 $\frac{3}{4}$ ".

There were many other outstanding performances during 1968:

A talented 880 field was paced by John Drew (Memorial, Houston, Tex.) who sped the two-lapper in 1:49.5 to win the Golden West meet, pulling John Brady (St. Helena, Bronx, N. Y.) under 1:50 with 1:49.6. . . Edsel Garrison (Centennial, Compton, Calif.) sped a two-turn 440 in 46.7, the 100 in 9.6 and anchored his school's mile relay team to the fastest time of the season--3:14.3--with a 46.6 leg. . . Scott Hiles (Madison Heights, Anderson, Ind.) and Rich Elliott (Proviso West, Hillside, Ill.) were the

only prep distancemen to dip under 9:00 for two-miles, clocking 8:56.4 and 8:56.8 respectively. Elliott was the sole high-schooler under 14:00 for three-miles with his 13:58.2 during a 5000-meters.

Heulon Hewitt (Merced, Calif.) contributed a 25'10 $\frac{3}{4}$ " long jump and has another season to catch Jerry Proctor's national record of 26'3 $\frac{3}{4}$ ". Tom Brosius (Springbrook, Silver Springs, Md.) had marks of 64'6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " and 190'0" in the shot and discus, a double surpassed only by Randy Matson's 66'10 $\frac{1}{2}$ " and 193'11 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". . . Jimmy Evans (Waco, Tex.) and Rayceal Williams (Ablene, Tex.) also dipped under 47-seconds in the quarter, as both ran 46.9 to tie for the Golden West meet title. . . Bob Barratti (North, Wichita, Kans.) had himself three top efforts in the 880 (1:50.5), mile (4:08.9) and two-mile (9:05.6).

In the relay department, only one national record fell, but there was unusual depth in most events. Kirkpatrick of Ft. Worth, Tex., twice zipped 41.1s, a tenth under the old mark, and also led the 880 relay with 1:26.2. Two California quartets, Centennial (Compton) and Fremont (LA) were one-two in the state mile event and occupied those positions nationally. The Penn Relays also produced many fast stick races, including the two leading two-mile teams and the top four distance medley units.

All this produces difficulty in naming outstanding athletes in different categories. However, to Brown, off his consistency (many times over 7'0"), his ability to compete best when the stakes are the highest, and for his fifth place finish in the Olympic Games, goes the honor of "Athlete of the Year". His 7'3", under any set of standards, is a super performance. On the track, the nod for outstanding athlete must go to Bornkessel, another amazing athlete from the track-conscious state of Kansas.

Top athletes by classes:

SENIOR--Bornkessel and Walker. Walker's feats with both the 12- and 16-lb. bulbs and Bornkessel's surprising maturity against world-class hurdlers were truly amazing for prep athletes.

JUNIOR--The obvious selection in the field has to be Brown. In any other season it would be Carrigan, a 16'8 $\frac{1}{4}$ " vaulter as a junior (his 17'0" vault technically came in his senior year since it occurred after Sept. 1) as compared to former world record holder Paul Wilson's 16'6 $\frac{3}{4}$ " as a senior. Phil Herndon (Central, Little Rock, Ark.) was outstanding on the track with 13.7 and 18.6 hurdles clockings and efforts marked by consistency on good and poor tracks and in all kinds of weather. Steve Prefontaine (Marshfield, Coos Bay, Ore.) had a top competitive record to go with 4:12.3 and 9:01.2 clockings. Combining top efforts on both track and field was Spencer Thomas (Carver, New Orleans, La.) with 38.1 in the 330 hurdles, 19.2 in the 180 lows, 23'6" long jump and 48'6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " triple jump.

SOPHOMORE--It's hard to choose from a talented trio of trackmen. Darwin Bond (Dobyns-Bennett, Kingsport, Tenn.), 47.5 in the 440, is one. Another is Ken Curl (Worthing, Houston, Tex.) at 9.5 (9.3w) and 21.2t had a competitive record to match those times (Texas State 4-A champ in both). Then there is Rod Milburn (Clark, Opelousas, La.), who had 13.9, 19.0s and 19.1t hurdle clockings. Craig Streichman (South, Torrance, Calif.) ran a 2:33:23.0 marathon just after turning 16. Jesse Stuart (Glassgow, Ky.) rates the nod in the field off sensational 61'1 $\frac{1}{4}$ " shot putting.

FROSH--The great Central Valley of California claims the outstanding frosh athletes in fieldman Dave Tucker (San Joaquin Memorial, Fresno) who won his section crown with an amazing 48'4" triple jump, and trackman Harry Nicholas (Reedley), who also claimed his section title with a 4:17.2 mile clocking.

With so much great talent returning, an old cliché may not be out of order. It may very well be that "the best is yet to come".



# 17-year-old-Carrigan Vaults Age

Because Casey Carrigan has a habit of saving his best for big meets, one has to wonder what the versatile Orting, Wash., prep pole vaulter would have done in the Olympic Games had the pole-under-the-bar rule been in effect then.

Carrigan, who now ranks as the number one all-time prep vaulter, surprised everyone but himself with several phenomenal performances. He shocked the US track and field fraternity for the first time at Sacramento, Calif., last June, muscling his way to a third-place finish in the AAU championships with a 16'8 $\frac{1}{2}$ " effort. But he didn't stop with that.

Casey, 17-years-old at that time and between his junior and senior years in high school, experienced a frustrating summer thereafter. That is, until the US Olympic Trials began at South Lake Tahoe, Calif., in September. He experimented with several poles during the summer Olympic development meets, seeking to find the right implement.

After admittedly being in a rut most of the summer at levels between 14- and 16-feet, Casey again found the right combination when it counted most. He soared his age (17-feet) in the Final US Olympic Trials, nabbing the third vaulting berth and becoming the youngest member of the US track squad.

Next came that frustrating day--Oct. 14 in Mexico City. Young Casey, after missing poorly on his first two attempts at the Games' qualifying height of 16'1", saw his glimmer of gold, silver or bronze go awry on the third try. He was well over the height but his pole went under the bar, nullifying the effort and sending the youngster to the sidelines.

That rule has since been changed and will go into effect this season. But it came too late for Casey. Thus, 1968 was both a satisfying and frustrating season for the kid from the small logging community 20 miles southeast of Tacoma.

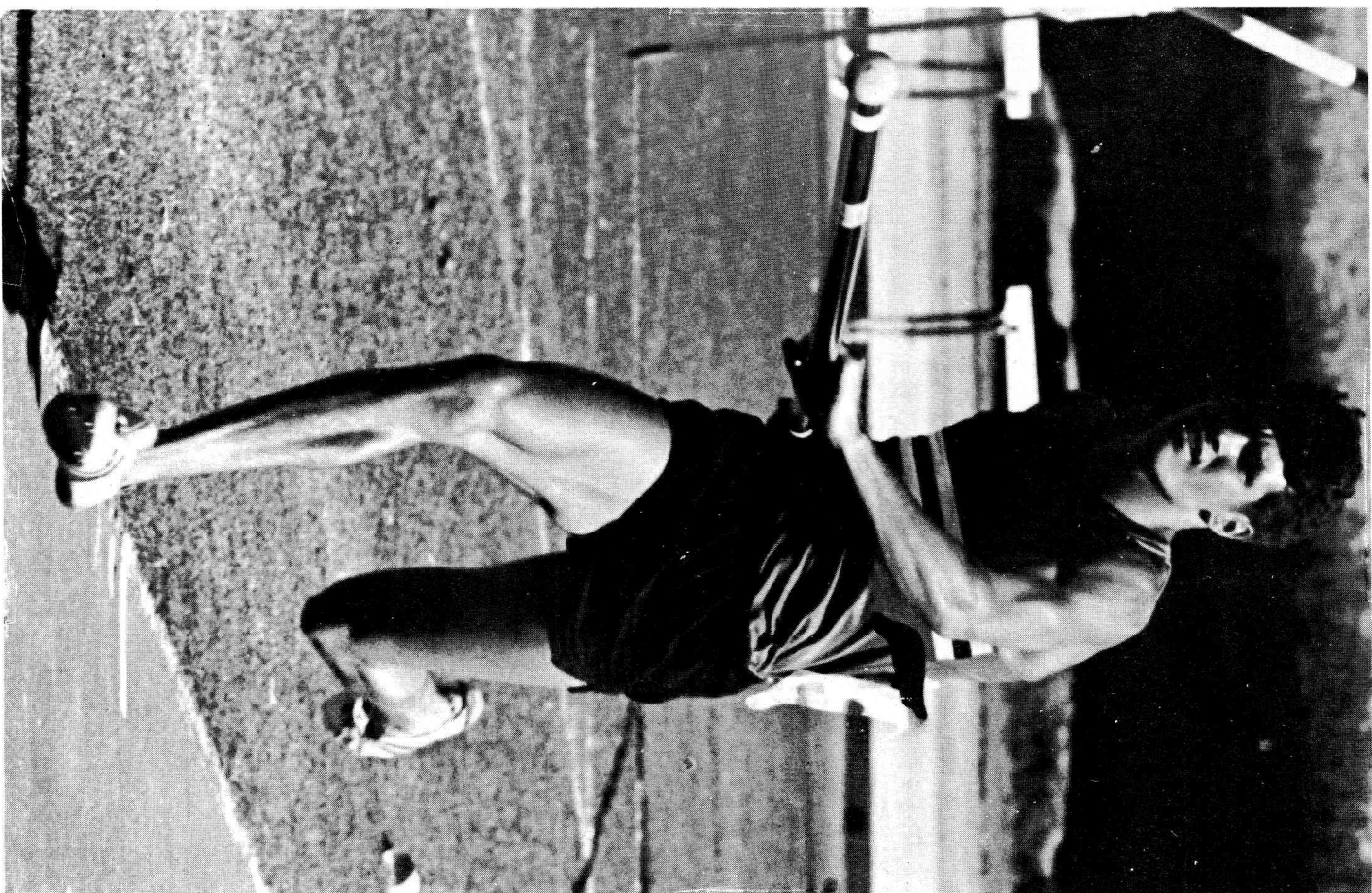
When simply analyzing them, Carrigan's accomplishments last season were amazing. But what most track fans were not aware of is that the muscular youngster didn't really get started in the outdoor season until May.

No, he isn't lazy. It's just that the Northwest weather isn't conducive to track competition prior to then. Rain and cold weather accompanied just about every meet in Western Washington during April, reducing all marks to an average and sub-par status.

Although he would have been a good drawing card for indoor meet promoters this winter, particularly those in Seattle and Portland, Casey decided to turn his attention to basketball at Orting High.

Inlement weather and the lack of a suitable indoor facility where Carrigan could practice vaulting were undoubtedly the key factors determining his layoff from track and field.

But Carrigan, who turned 18 in February, will be back at it again this spring, hoping to boost the prep vaulting record even higher. That proverbial assertion that "the sky's the limit" might be overdoing it a little when it comes to describing Carrigan's limitations. However, everything that occurred last year leads one to believe he will be a future contender for a world record.





# Preps in Olympic Games

In 1912 at Stockholm, James "Ted" Meredith, then a student at Mercersburg, Pa., Academy, won the Olympic gold medal in the 800-meter run with a world record 1:51.9 and continued on to the 880-yard wire for another world mark of 1:52.5. Thus he became the first high schooler to win an Olympic title. He later placed fourth in the 400-meters with 49.2.

Another prep represented the US at Stockholm. Howard Drew, then just a junior from Springfield, Mass., pulled a tendon in winning his 100-meters semi-final in 11.0 and could not compete in the final.

Meredith and Drew were the first of 14 high school athletes who have represented the US in the greatest athletic contest in the world, the Olympic Games. After 1912, though, no high schooler again made the US team until Frank Hussey in 1924. The Stuyvestant of New York City sprinter struck gold at Paris, leading off the victorious US 400-meter relay team which set a world record of 41.0.

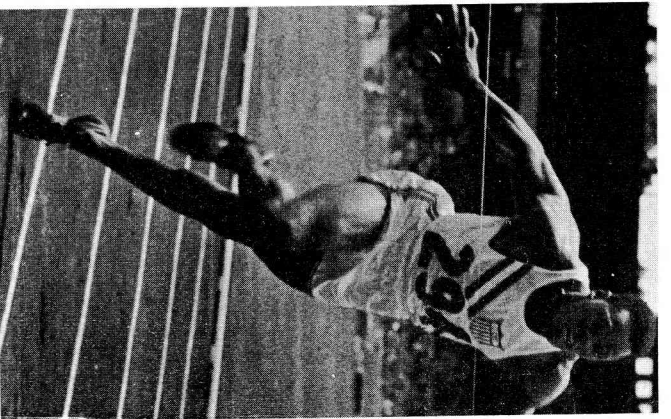
Four years later, three preps competed at Amsterdam. Lee Barnes of Hollywood, Calif., won the pole vault with a 12'11 $\frac{1}{2}$ " leap and Frank Wykoff of Los Angeles led off the 400 relay squad which equaled the 41.0 world record. He also placed fourth in the 100-meters. Sid Bowman of Hammond, La., triple jumped 47'1" for ninth place. It was the first of three Olympics for Wykoff and the first of three gold medals he was to win in the 400-meter relay.

In 1932 at Los Angeles, hometown junior Cornelius Johnson nearly won the high jump, clearing 6'5 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", the same as eventual winner Duncan McNaughton of Canada. In a jump-off, though, Johnson placed fourth and thus went medalless. Four years later at Berlin, however, Johnson prevailed and claimed his gold medal. Also at Berlin, another Louisiana triple jumper, Billy Brown, triple jumped 47'1 $\frac{3}{8}$ " but failed to qualify for the finals.

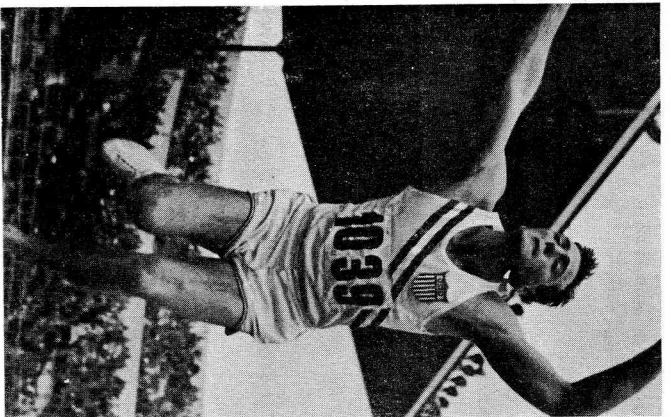
War intervened and halted the Olympics for 12 years after 1936 but in 1948, at London, a high schooler made some of the biggest headlines of the Olympics. Bob Mathias, a 17-year-old senior at Tulare, Calif., High, was competing in only his third decathlon ever, yet he met and defeated the world's best ten-event men to win the gold medal with 7139 points. At that time, he was the youngest track champion in Olympic history. Four years later at Helsinki, Mathias, now an "old" 21, re-tained his title as Milt Campbell, talented Plainfield, NJ, junior won the silver medal with 6975 points. Campbell succeeded Mathias as Olympic champion at Melbourne in 1956.

It was not until 1964 and Tokyo that another prep competed in the Olympics. In the Orient's first Olympics, diminutive Gerry Lindgren from Spokane, Washington's, Rogers High, ran 29:20.6 for ninth in the 10,000-meters as American Billy Mills won an electrifying upset victory. Another prep runner, lanky Jim Ryan of East High in Wichita, Kansas, competed in the 1500-meters, doing 3:44.4 in his heat but failing to make the final with 3:55.0 in the semis while ill with the flu. Just a year later, Ryan was to beat Peter Snell, the Olympic champion, with an American record 3:55.3 mile.

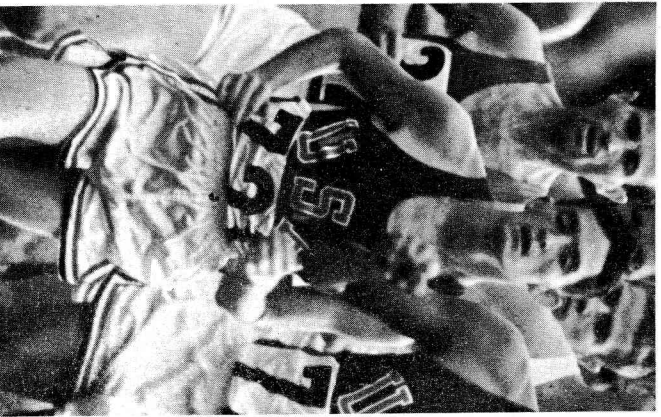

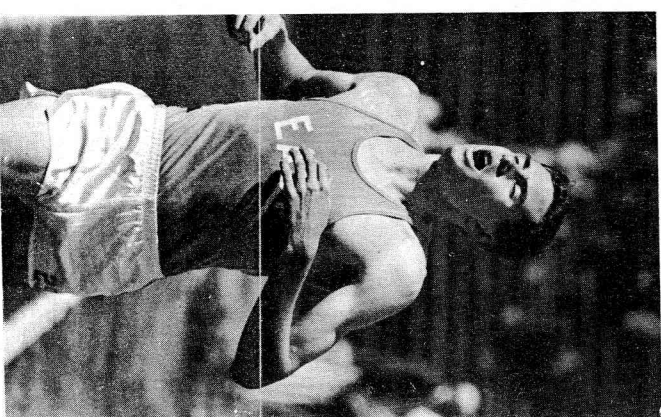

# Walker Muscles Shot 72'3 1/4"

Few track fans outside of Texas knew about Sam Walker before March, 1968, but after the second day of that month the Dallas Samuell High School strongboy had begun one of the finest record-smashing seasons in prep annals - the raising of the shot record by nearly three feet to 72'3 $\frac{1}{4}$ ". It wasn't that Walker was totally unknown prior to this day for his 64'6" toss during his junior season still stands as an international age 16 record and ranked him sixth amongst the preps, but all the headlines were going to Karl Salb, the then new record holder at 69'6" and another junior, Doug Lane.

Little Sam, who stands only 6'1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " but weighs a hefty 230 lbs., opened the outdoor season that March day with a national record, something most performers wait to do until late in the season. His 69'11 $\frac{3}{4}$ " was such a shock many fans thought the papers had made an error in reporting, but after learning of a 70'11 $\frac{1}{2}$ " foul throw the same day, one realized that the prep shot-put had definitely entered a new era.

Two weeks later Walker produced another shock when he completely bypassed the 70-foot range and plunked the hulk down at 71'1 $\frac{1}{4}$ " only to discover later the landing area sloped over the limit. During the next month, reports out of Texas found Sam upping the record to 71'0", falling to 68'4 $\frac{1}{2}$ " at the Texas Relays, then getting back on the record track with 71'3 $\frac{1}{2}$ " and 71'7" tosses.

Finally, on April 27th at Corpus Christi's Little State meet, Walker let one fly 72'3 $\frac{1}{4}$ ".

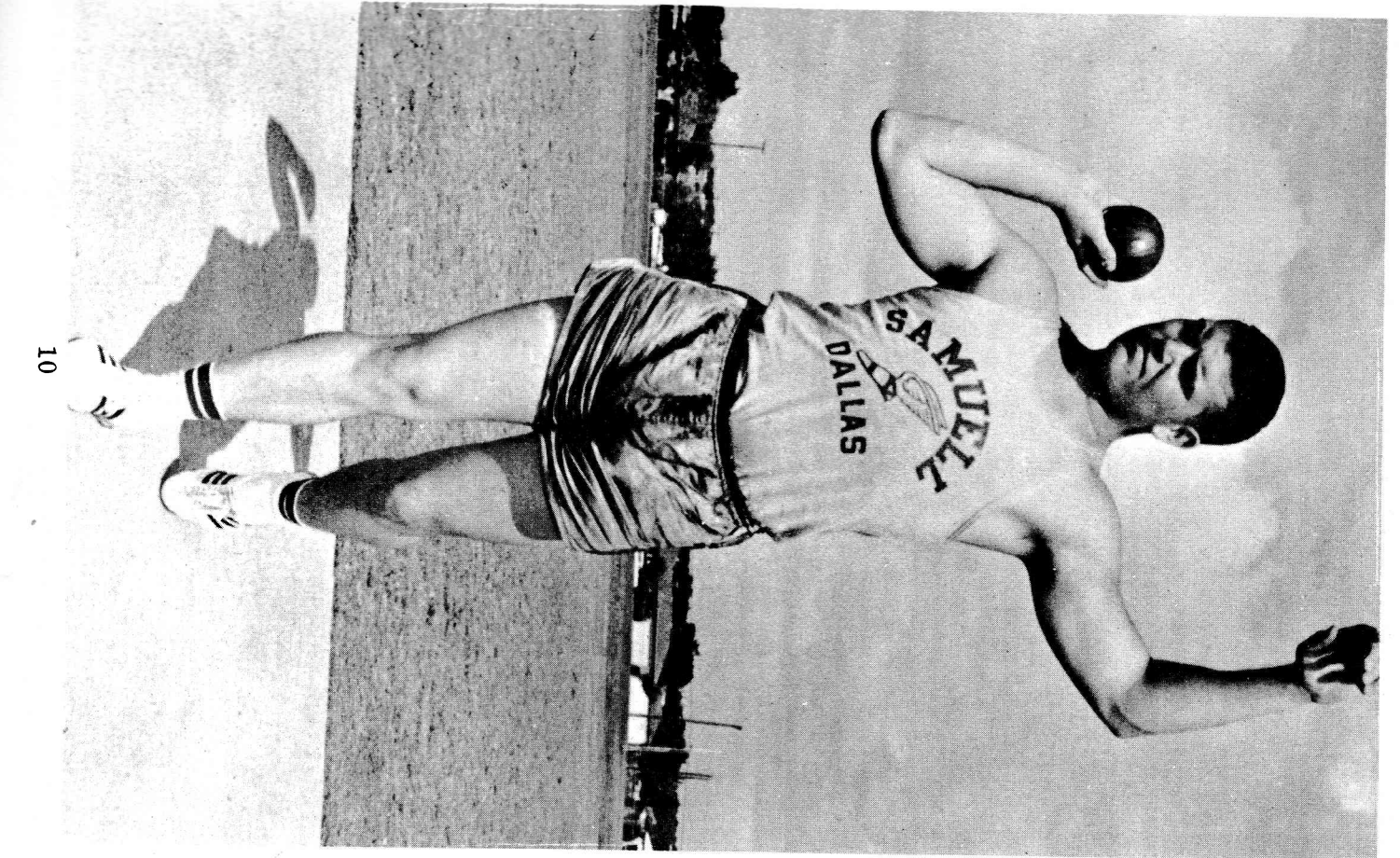
All the eyes of Texas were on Austin the following week for the State meet to see if Sam's shot would go into orbit, but his father's heart attack just days before understandably took the edge off his effort, though his winning toss of 68'5 $\frac{1}{2}$ " gave him his second state title and separated Randy Matson from the meet record.

During the season, Walker warmed up with the 16-lb. shot and had a 61' $\frac{1}{4}$ " the day of his downhill mark, just a quarter-inch from Dallas Long's prep best. With the close of the prep season, there were invitations to the "big" meets where Sam did 60'4" (California Relays) and 60'7" (Coliseum-Compton) before catching Long's mark with a 61'1 $\frac{1}{4}$ " effort at the Golden West Invitational. His 69'8 $\frac{3}{4}$ " at the Golden West broke the meet and old, old prep record of 69'6". Walker closed the season with a 58'3" at the AAU. In all, it was a fine season for the senior class vice-president and national honor student--two prep records and eight of the 10 farthest puts in history.

Walker trains 9-10 months a year, 6 days a week, 3-6 hours a day, mainly on weights in the early-season then tapering to speed work. His 10.7 100-yard speed explains why he is one of the fastest putters crossing the ring.

Sam Horace Walker III was born August 15, 1950, in Dallas, Texas, and is currently enrolled at Southern Methodist in Dallas. Progression:

# Bornkessel Blasts Hurdle Marks

Despite rewriting the prep records in the intermediate hurdles during 1968, and leaving his name throughout the all-time prep hurdles list, Bob Bornkessel didn't achieve his prime goal for that Olympic year: to represent the United States in the 400-meter hurdles at the Olympic Games in Mexico City.

But he came very close to that goal.

The stocky (5'11", 160 lb) hurdler from Shawnee-Mission, Kansas, North High blitzed the prep records for the 330-yard intermediate hurdles (36.7), the 440-yard intermediates (51.0) and the 400-meter hurdles with a fantastic 49.8. The latter two marks, incidentally, were formerly held by Rex Cawley, the 1964 Olympic intermediates titlist.

Bornkessel gave every indication during 1968 that he would have been an able representative of the US in any international competition. He first burst upon the US scene in April with his national record 36.7 over the 330 hurdles. He also covered the prep hurdles in 13.7, 18.6 for the straights and had an 18.1 windy clocking in the same event.

Then at the USTFF championships, the same meet at which he as-tounded track buffs in 1967 with a 52.6 clocking when 16 years old, he gave his first indication that he would be a threat for an Olympic berth, despite his lack of experience over the intermediates against top-flight competition. He placed second in the final in 51.0, lowering Cawley's prep mark by a full half-second. He also received credit for the 400-meter mark, clipping three-tenths off Cawley's record.

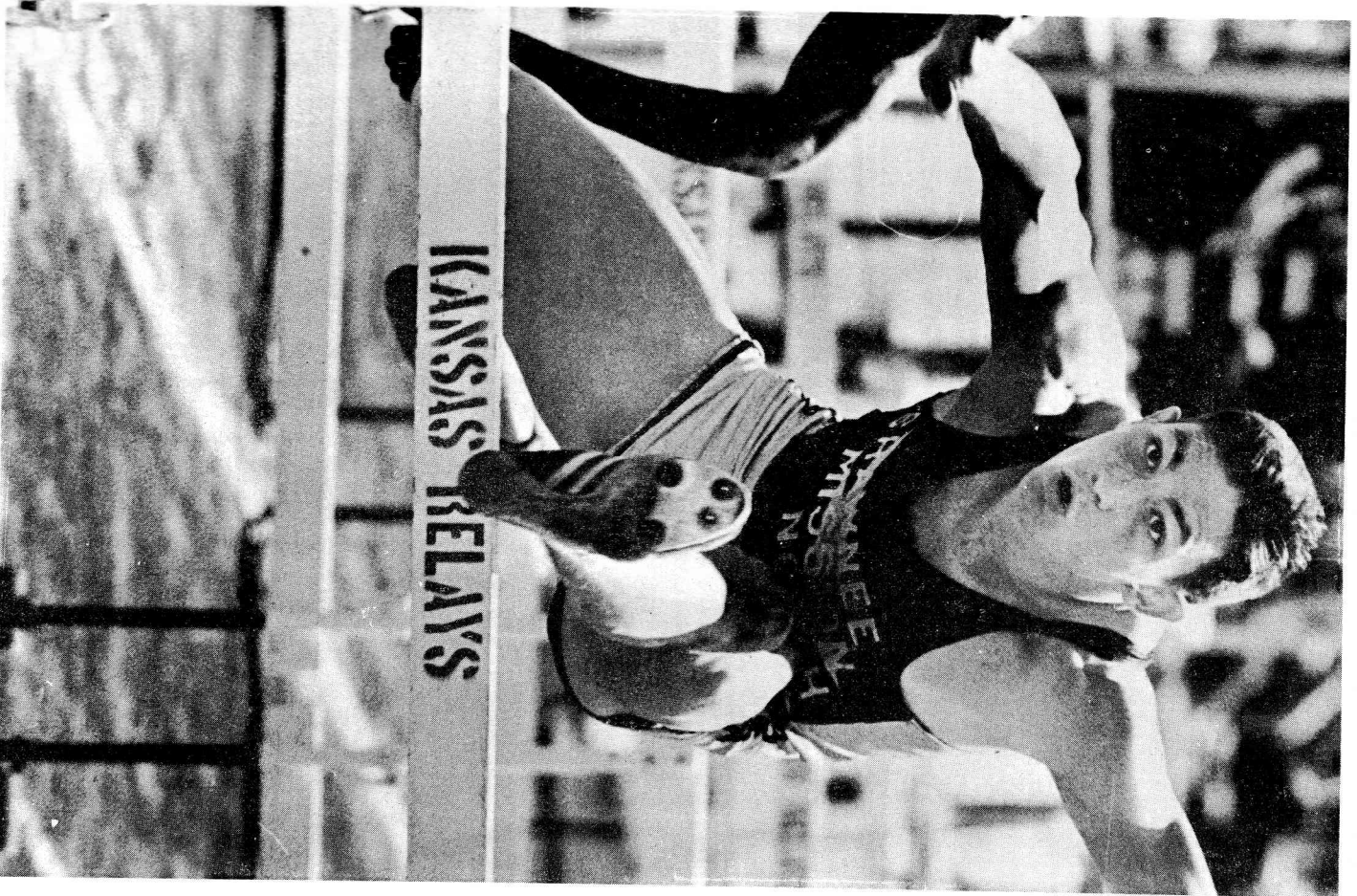
At the AAU championships, Bob ran 52.1 for third in his heat and 51.1 for fifth in his semi, which eliminated him from the final. But in a special race to determine two athletes to advance to the Los Angeles Olympic Trials, he stormed home second in 51.4 and his Olympic hopes remained alive. At Los Angeles, his 51.5 didn't qualify for the finals, but once again, Bob showed amazing maturity in a special race, getting second in 51.1 and advancing to altitude training.

It was at South Lake Tahoe where Bornkessel came up with his greatest performance. At a pre-Olympic meet on August 31, Bob blazed 49.8 for the 400-meter hurdles, a 1.2-second improvement of both his career best and his national high school record.

But it was at Tahoe that Bob met his Waterloo--at least for 1968. Under possibly the greatest pressure of his life, Bornkessel was in third place at the 10th hurdle in his heat of the Final Olympic Trials--but he tripped at that barrier, stumbled, and came home last in 53.6.

Regardless, Bob firmly established himself as one of the most talented all-around hurdlers in prep history. In both 1967 and 68, he won the Kansas state title in both the 220 and lows and was second in the highs in 68. In addition, he has bests of 21.7t, 49.0, 47.7r and 2:00.5. While at North High, he quarterbacked the top-ranked football team in Kansas and was a diver on the swimming team.

Bornkessel, now at the University of Kansas, believes "a young athlete should compete as much against athletes older than himself." This is not only good experience but also develops important speed. Bob himself serves as a pretty fair example of his own idea. And despite not achieving that prime goal of the Olympics in 1968, Bob needn't worry too much. There always will be Munich in 1972.





# 1968 Postal Competition Results

Back in 1957, Track & Field News' first postal competition was inaugurated. The idea of high school teams running two miles per man for five men, adding the times for a final overall clocking and then mailing the time to T&FN was originally designed to serve as a basis for comparison for schools in states which had two-mile cross country races. The event proved so popular that the eight-lap race eventually became nearly standard throughout the country in state prep title meets. Ten teams entered that first competition as compared with 59 in 1968.

## 1968 Best Performers

It may seem doubtful that high school athletes can top the phenomenal performances which highlighted 1968, but don't bet against just as, or more, startling marks during the 1969 season.

Coverboy Reynaldo Brown (Compton, Calif.), 7'3" high jumper, and 17'0" vaulter Casey Carrigan headline the returning crop of athletes. Both, of course, were US Olympians in 1968. Of course, they are only two of the returning super-stars.

Another prep record holder, like Brown and Carrigan, returns in sprinter-hurdler Wade Williams, who was a part of the Kirkpatrick (Ft. Worth, Tex.) 440 relay team which did 41.1 last year. Williams zipped a windy 9.3 100 and had a legal 14.0 over the prep highs.

One of the records expected to go early is the long jump where Heulon Hewitt (Merced, Calif.) led the nation in 1968 with 25'10 $\frac{3}{4}$ " which the National Federation recognizes as the prep record (Track & Field News lists the 26 $\frac{3}{4}$ " of Muir of Pasadena, a Jerry Proctor in 1967 as the record). Hewitt also high jumps 6'7" .

Distance runners are sure to provide fireworks. Chuck Baker (Elkhart, Ind.) had the equal second-fastest mile last year of 4:08.9. Paul Olson (Skyline, Salt Lake City, Utah) did an impressive 4:12.1 in the Big Sky country and could go much faster at a lower elevation. The latest in Oregon's long line of prep greats should be Steve Prefontaine (Marshfield, Coos Bay, Ore.), who did 4:12.4 and 9:01.4 last year. Washington should be a distance power with the likes of Randy James (Ferris, Spokane, Wash.), Tim Jordan (Shorecrest, Seattle), Phil Burkwitz (Lewis & Clark, Spokane) and Bob Brandon (Clover Park, Tacoma). The first four placers in the California state two-mile last year all return: Rubin Chappins (Excelsior, Norwalk) 9:04.4, Fred Ritcheverson (Salesian, Los Angeles) 9:04.4, Rich Kash (Redlands) 9:06.0 and Ruben Mejia (La Habra) 9:07.2.

Brian McElroy (Massapequa, NY) gives Long Island and the metro New York area the premier 880 candidate off his 1:51.1 as a junior. Competition will include Bob Langston (Millikan, Long Beach, Calif) 1:51.6, California State king George Alfaro (1:52.2) from Pittsburg and Allen Judd (Weiser, Id.) who also clocked 1:52.2 as a junior.

Sprinters and hurdlers won't be lacking either. Sensational Ken Curt (Worthing, Houston, Tex), Texas champ last year with bests of 9.5 and 21.2t, also zipped a windy 9.3 100. Then there is amazing Darwin Bond (Dobyns-Bennett, Kingsport, Tenn) who blazed 47.5 as a soph. Foremost among high hurdlers should be Phil Herndon (Central, Little Rock, Ark), 13.7 and 18.6. Rod Milburn (Clark, Opelousas, La) 13.7 and 19.2 as a soph, and Spencer Thomas (Carver, New Orleans, La) 38.1 for the 330 intermediates. Thomas also looms as a top triple jump threat off his 48'6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " last year plus 24'8 $\frac{1}{2}$ " in the long jump.

Top weight returnees include Al Dalerio (Clowitz, Calif) 62'3", Melmont Taylor (Hartford, Conn) 6'11 $\frac{1}{4}$ " and 180'3" and junior Jesse Stuart of Glasgow, Ky, 6'11 $\frac{1}{4}$ ". Chuck Miller (Borough, Chatham, NJ) 221'0" and Mike Daniels (Central Linn, Halsey, Ore) 220'10" top javelin returnees. Frank Samara (Ft Hamilton, Brooklyn, NY) is a 6405-point decathlete re-turning.

## 'Athletes of Year' -- '47 to '68

From its beginning in 1948, Track & Field News has named a prep "Athlete of the Year". They are:

1947: Carl Joyce (Commerce, Boston, Mass) -- 4:20. 0 miler.  
 1948: Bob Mathias (Tulare, Calif) -- In only his third decathlon, he became the youngest man (17 years old) to ever win an Olympic title by taking the decathlon gold medal with 6386 points. He also won the US title with 7224, the third-best score in the world that year, and was ranked second globally.

1949: George Brown (Jordan, Los Angeles, Calif) -- By leaping a national high school record 25' 2 1/2", he broke the 24' 11 1/4" mark held by Jesse Owens since 1933.

1950: Steve Turner (Glendale, Calif) -- He set a national record in the 180-yard low hurdles at 18. 9, also clocked 14. 1 in the 120 highs and long jumped 24' 6 1/2".

1951: Leon Patterson (Tat, Calif) -- He muscled the prep shot 59' 2 1/2" and the discus 173' 3 3/4", both close to the national prep records.

1952: Milt Campbell (Plainfield, NJ) -- As a high school junior, he won the Olympic silver medal in the decathlon with 6975 points behind winner Bob Mathias. Campbell scored 7060 to take second in the AAU ten-event test. He also had times of 14. 0 and 19. 0 over the prep hurdles and 23. 7 over the 220 lows.

1953: Don Vick (Chaffey, Ontario, Calif) -- He led three high school weight divisions, heaving the prep shot 62' 5 1/2", the 16-lb. bulb 52' 9 3/4" and the high school discus 158' 5 1/4". (Note: Milt Campbell won the AAU decathlon with 7743 points, the top performance in the nation and the world. Because he was 20, however, he could not be considered either as prep Athlete of the Year or as high school record-holder.)

1954: Monte Upshaw (Piedmont, Calif) -- He set a national long jump record of 25' 4 1/4" and was the ironman at the California state meet, winning the long jump and lows and getting second in the highs. His lone point total was enough to place his team second.

1955: Charley Dumas (Centennial, Compton, Calif) -- This long-legged youngster high jumped 6' 10 1/4" to up his own national mark by nearly an inch. Just a year later, he became the first man to top 7-feet and also won the Olympic title.

1956: Jerry White (Corcoran, Calif) -- He led the nation in the 440 with his 45. 7, run in winning the Cal State championship. He also zipped to a 9. 5 100 clocking.

1957: Jim Brewer (North, Phoenix, Ark) -- This crew-cut vaulter became the first high-schooler over 15-feet with his 15' 1/2" clearance, which upped his own national mark from 14' 3 3/8".

1958: Dallas Long (North, Phoenix, Ariz) -- For the second straight year, a Phoenix North athlete was the nation's outstanding prep. This year, Long pummed the shot record by nearly three feet, reaching 69' 3 3/8". He also put the 16-lb. ball 51' 1/2", a mark that stood as the prep best for 10 years. He also threw the prep discus 179' 6". He was national leader in all three events.

1959: Rex Cawley (Farmingington, Mich) -- This Midwest youngster sparked over the hurdles -- of all heights -- clocking 14. 1 over the prep

highs, 13.9 in the 110-meter highs (still the national record), 23.0n for the 200-meter lows on a turn, 51.3n in the 400-meter hurdles and 51.5 in the 440-yard hurdles. He placed in the AAU highs, lows and intermed-iates and competed in Europe.

1960: Mel Renfro (Jefferson, Portland, Ore) --This versatile jumper-hurdler clocked 13.8 and 18.9 over the prep barriers and long jumped 24 1/4" --all in winning the Oregon state titles in those events. He also anchored his 880 relay team to the championship.

1961: (tie) Tom Sullivan (St George, Evanston, Ill) & Uis Williams (Compton, Calif) --Diminutive Sullivan tied the prep half-mile record with 1:50.6 and ran the fastest mile by a schoolboy to that time with 4:03.5n. Lanky Williams blazed a national record 440 of 46.1, which still stands, placed second in the AAU championships in 46.3 and was a member of the US international team.

1962: Forrest Beatty (Hoover, Glendale, Calif) --He was the King of prep sprinters in '62, tying the national 100 mark of 9.4, setting a prep record of 20.2 for the straight 220 (which still stands) and also covering the 440 in 47.3.

1963: Randy Matson (Pampa, Tex) --He led four weight categories with his 66 1/2" and 193 1/2" performance with the high school implements and 60 3" and 169 7/8" with the international weights. Each performance was second all-time only to the national record holder.

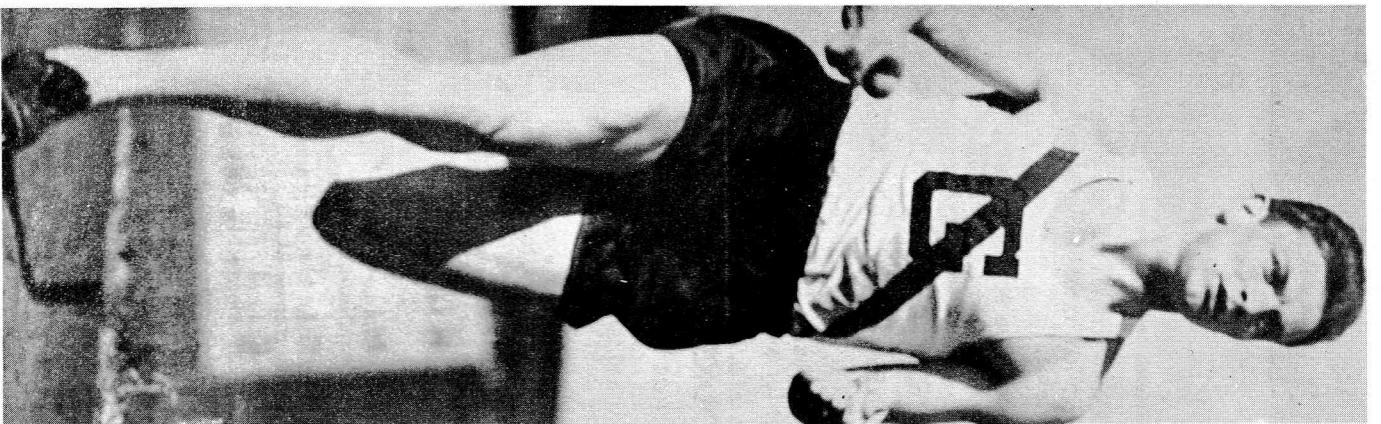
1964: Gerry Lindgren (Rogers, Spokane, Wash) --This mighty mite emerged as the giant of prep distance runners. Indoors he ran amazing times of 8:40.0n and 13:37.8n, both prep records which still stand. Outdoors, he ran record times of 4:06.0 and 8:56.6 and later did 4:01.5 and 8:53.6 in open competition. He also clocked record runs of 13:17.0y, 13:44.0m, 28:23.8y and 29:17.6m, still prep standards. He won the US-USSR 10,000-meters (29:17.6), the US Final Olympic Trials 10,000 (29:02.0), and placed ninth in the Tokyo Olympic 10,000 (29:20.6).

1965: Jim Ryan (East, Wichita, Kans) --Prepdom's greatest miler ever copped the prep of the year honors with such superb performances as his AAU mile victory over Olympic 800-1500 champion Peter Snell in a US record 3:55.3, which also was a prep best. He also had four other sub-4:00 races in '65 and three sub-3:43 1500-meter races.

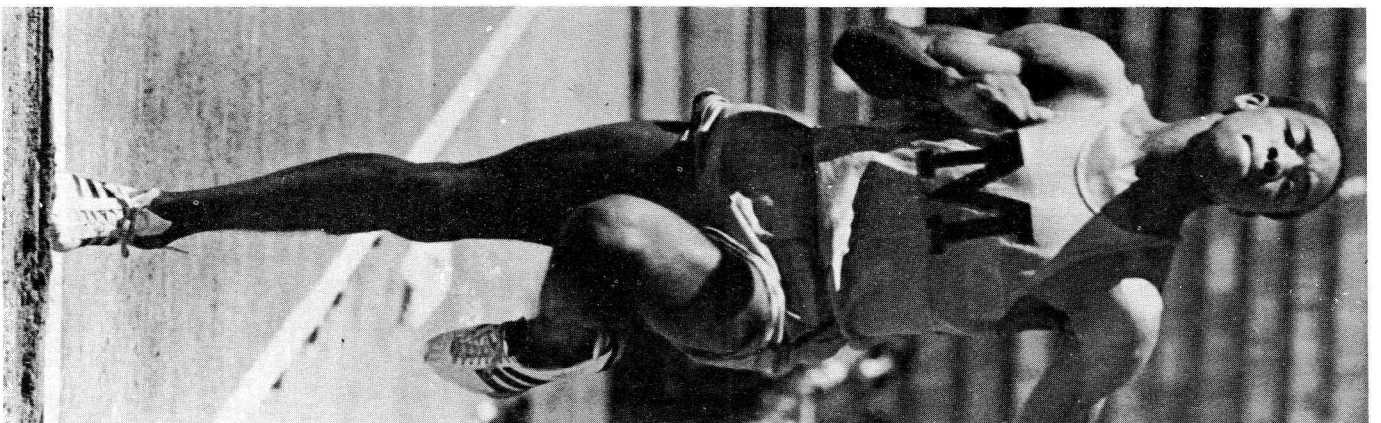
1966: Tim Danielson (Chula Vista, Calif) --He became the second prep miler to dip under four minutes with his 3:59.4. Danielson was undefeated in prep competition from the 440 through the two-mile, won the Cal state mile (4:07.0), the Golden West Invitational mile (4:07.0) and two-mile (8:55.4) --for the greatest prep double ever in those events -- and placed sixth in the AAU mile in a creditable 4:03.3.

1967: Jerry Proctor (Muir, Pasadena, Calif) --He joined Jesse Owens as the only high schoolers ever to long jump over 26-feet and also to win a national title. Proctor's 26 3/4" leap garnered the AAU championship for him and set the present prep mark. He also jumped a record 26'2" indoors and had a wind-aided 26 5/8". He became the fourth prep in the history of the California state meet to win three events as he took the highs (13.7), lows (18.7) and long jump (25 4 1/2") and also ran a leg on the second place 880 relay team.

1968: Reynaldo Brown (Compton, Calif) --see page 3 for a profile of the most recent Athlete of the Year.
