

Ottawa Hills Ties for Ninth

Motor City School Is 'A' Track King

By JOE VANDERHOFF EAST LANSING — Detroit Redford Union ended the 39-year drought of the Motor City by taking first place in the state Class A track finals while classy Grand Rapids Ottawa Hills led the West Michigan assault by sharing ninth place before 3,000 fans on a sunny Saturday afternoon at Michigan State University's track.

West Catholic's three points were registered by senior Bob Young with a sixth place in the high jump on a 6-1 leap. Catholic Central's Dick Mencarelli gained a seven way tie for eighth place at 5-10 for the Cougars one-seventh of a point.

Junior Bill Heth, East Grand Rapids' outstanding pole-vaulter, chalked up with the Pioneers' one point with an eighth place in his first state finals endeavor. He missed 13-2 on his third attempt when his trailing leg shook off the bar. The young Pioneer gained his point with a vault of 12-8, his third best of the year.

Senior Craig Daniels of Muskegon High School placed fifth in the mile with a 4:19.2 time for the Big Reds' only four points.

Scarcity of Records There was a scarcity of new records Saturday as the MSU indoor track proved difficult for the sprinters to master.

Although sophomore Jeff Dixon of East Grand Rapids failed to place in the mile, he did run first in his heat with a 4:26.8, his second best of the year. Detroit Redford Union's championship was guided by its strength in the hurdles with 15 points. John Morrison, who has been clocked in 13.6 this year, won the high hurdles event in 14.3.

ANN ARBOR (UPI)—Ecorse 440-yard dash in 50 seconds flat, the school's one-mile relay team came in first with a clocking of 3:25.1 and the 880-yard relay team was a winner with a time of 1:31.7.

The three firsts plus a fifth-place finish gave Ecorse 32 points, nine better than second-place Oscoda.

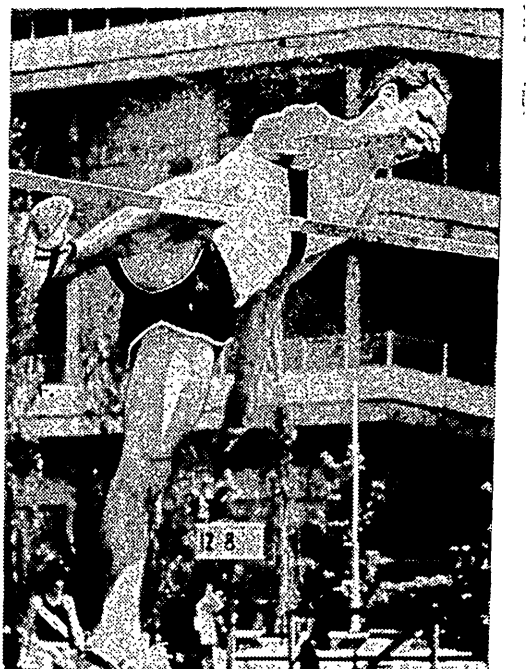
