Mt. Morris' Young Second in 100, 220

ANN ARBOR - Mt. Morris' Roy Young is a young man on the move.

The Panthers' classy speedster was more impressed with winning than making a dehut in the Class B state track championship Saturday at the University of Michigan's Ferry Field.

Young didn't come home with a blue ribbon but still sparkled with seconds in the 100 and 220 to earn 14 points to give Al Doty's crew a tie for ninth.

Ecorse was No. 1 with 32 points on a day that saw five recods shattered, including two held by Flint area performers.



ROUNDING OUT the top 10 were Oscoda with 23 points, Muskegon Catholic Central 21, Ludington 17, Inkster and Riverview 16, Essexville Garber and Grand Rapids Northview 15 and Dowagiac Union 14.

Other than Mt. Morris, Flint area representatives did little. Holly, which had 10 individuals and a mile relay team, scored only two points. The rest were shut out.

Young is only a freshman and has two more years of eligibility. If Doty finds some help within the next two years, the Panthers will have a good shot at the title.

YOUNG WON his heat in the 220 preliminaries in 22.6. It was his top time in that event. He was runner-up in the semis and ran the finals

But the little speedster, who runs with his head tilted back as though he has a nose bleed, had a 10-flat and two 9.9s in the 100 The record was 99 but James Holmes of

Kalamazoo Hackett broke that with a 9.8 in the semis.

"I just couldn't seem to come in first," said Young.

But a shake of the head in a negative motion indicated he wasn't disappointed.

HOLLY'S POINTS came on Ted Witte's seventh place in the shot put. The Broncho strongman had a top heave of 50-2.

Hurdlers Roger Downing and Tom Striggow of Holly finished second in the low and high hurdles, respectively, in the prelims, but

last year but Jerry Sinkel of Detroit St. Anthony lowered it to 9:32 9.

Ralph Zoppa of St. Louis ran 9:30 in the regional at Ovid-Elsie last week but finished fourth Saturday. Sinkel's pace was just too much as was a strong finishing kick.

The most interesting record

came in the pole vault. Dave Boyer of Fremont and Dave Draper of Oscoda bettered the 13-7 mark by clearing 13-9 on their first attempts.

BOYER, who vaulted only 13 times last year because of a kidney infection, cleared 14-134 on his second try while Draper was unable to meet the challenge.

Boyer had the bar raised to 14-6,1/4 His best in a meet was 14-2 while he had done 14-8 in practice. But three attempts failed.

The high jump mark was Co broken but stayed in the gigo same family. Brad Miller of Sturgis upped the record one-half inch at 6-5½. His brother, Jim, set the old mark in
