

Rain Slows Golden Midwest

LOMBARD, Ill. (AP) — Rain and cold kept a group of the nation's outstanding prep track stars from setting any records but most of the top-ranked performers won their event with ease in Saturday's Golden Midwest Track and Field Meet.

Octavia's Gayln Sweet, whose 6 foot 9 inch jump was the best recorded among the high jump entrants prior to the meet, did not compete. Sweet made the trip with his father, but was told that only seniors could compete.

Sweet is a junior and would have lost his next year's eligibility by competing.

The winner of the high jump event Saturday leaped 6-4.

The nation's pacesetter in both the 220 and the 440, Marv Foster of Kansas City, Mo., won both of his specialties in relatively slow times. He was the

day's only double winner with :22.0 in the 220 and :47.7 in the 440.

George Amundson, of Aberdeen, S.D., who has a national record pending in the discus, the event with a toss far below his best effort. His winning throw was 179-7.

Two more national leaders, John Morrison, of Detroit, and Willie Thomas of Chicago's Inglewood High School, won their specialties. Morrison ran the 120 high hurdles in :13.8 and Thomas, the state champion, sped the 880 in 1:53.3.

In all, seven states were represented in the winners of the 14 events, including Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Michigan, South Dakota and Kansas.

The meet was moved because of the weather from York High School's cinder track to the all

weather surface at Glenbard East.
