A Victory to Remember!

With a blistering homestretch drive, Les Nagy of Niles McKinley High School yesterday sped to a new mile run record in the Mansfield Relays and won his place in the history of Ohio high school track compe-tition.

As Nagy snapped the finish line tape, the officials' stop watches snapped 4:13.8, smashing the old Relays mile record of 4:16.5 set last year by Reginald McAfee of Cincinnati Courter Tech.

Nagy's mile clocking at Mehock Field was also the second fastest time ever recorded in an Ohio high school mile race. Ironically, it was McAfee who ran the best high school mile in the Buckeye State's history. Last year in the State Class AA meet, McAfee turned a 4:08.5.

The second place finisher in the Relays' mile, Mike Pierce of Grand Blanc (Mich.) High School, pushed Nagy to his record-breaking performance. Pierce also did better than the old Relays mile record by post-

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Yesterday's mile was a classic race to watch. The mile field came through the first lap bunched up at 63 seconds. Nagy was barely in second place at the half mile mark with a 2.09. At the end of the third lap, Nagy was tied for the lead with Doug Brown of Harper Woods (Mich.) Notre Dame, who finished third in the race with a 4:18.5. Time at the third lap was 3:14.

With about 220 yards to go to the finish, Pierce came blasting out of the trailing pack. He swept by Brown and started to inch ahead of Nagy.

Then, some 110 yards out, Nagy seemed to smell the tape and turned it on. He ran away from Pierce and won going away. For his last quarter mile, Nagy ran 59.8 seconds
