

It's Waltz Time for Holly

OVID-ELSIE — For 16 opponents, it wasn't a pretty site. The official scorer's sheet and the record book made one think of Pearl Harbor . . . a bloody mess!

Especially after Holly's talented track team completed its assault on the Class B regional meet here Saturday.

Duane Raffin's Bronchos had to set some sort of high school record, qualifying 10 individuals and both relay squads for the state meet while waltzing home with the regional trophy by a whopping 50-point margin.

SO, IT'S almost a repeat of last year for Holly as it heads for the state meet Saturday in East Lansing. The Bronchos won the 1969 regional by nearly 30 points and qualified 10 individuals and a relay unit for the Big Test. Only Raffin hopes his crew can improve on last year's showing at Ann Arbor when Holly came up with a mere two points.

The Bronchos finished with 74½ points, so dominating the field they swept nine of the 14 first places. St. Louis was second with 24½ points, Fenton third with 20 and Linden fourth with 17.

Other Flint area schools scoring were Lake Fenton, 10 points for eighth place; Ainsworth with eight points for 10th; Bentley 12th with five;

Hamady 14th with four, Atherton 15th with three and Durand 16th with one.

The day also saw an assault on the record book as seven marks were shattered and two others equalled. Holly broke five, tied one and two other area representatives figured in the record books.

FENTON'S DON Keswick broke the mile mark of 4:35.7 with a sparkling 4:33.55. Linden's John Parkhurst was just as effective in that race with a fine 4:35.0 time. Atherton's Tom Sheppard was third in 4:35.7.

Linden's Dennis Stanley tied the high jump mark of 6-1 set by Atherton's Rich Green in 1968. Stanley had only one miss in four

heights while winning the event, but failed three times at 6-3.

Holly's standout hurdler Roger Downing was a double record setter. He won the 120 highs in 14.6 and took the lows in 20.35. Teammate Buzz Tyler stretched the shot put record from 52-0½ to 53-11. Tyler's best this year is 54-6¾.

Other Bronchos figuring in were Dave Coleman (tied 880 mark of 2:01.6), Cottrell Williams (22.9 in 220) and the mile relay team of Coleman, Kevin Chappell, L. M. Thomas and Gordon Hopson. It turned in a 3:30.5 time, 1.1 seconds under the previous mark.

THOMAS WON the long jump for Holly with 20-9, tied for second in the high jump and ran on the second place 880 relay squad. Williams also won the 100, joining Downing as the meet's only double winner.

Gary Plew came through with a strong two-mile run for Holly, winning the event in 10:18.1. Plew dazzled the field with a strong finishing kick, crossing the finish line 75 yards before the runnerup.

The Flint area qualified 22 individuals and four relay teams for the Class B state meet. Linden's mile relay unit of Tom Stobaugh, Gary Beebe, George Rolleston and Parkhurst was second in 3:31.2, four-tenths of a second under the previous record.

Parkhurst made up most of that time with a strong finishing leg.

LAKE FENTON'S Jay Kelso was second in the long jump as was teammate Terry Thoroman in the 880. Second in the high hurdles, third in the lows and ran on the Tigers' fourth place 880 relay team.

The Tigers' mile relay team of Brian Harris, Keswick, Mike Beardsley and Mark Evans finished third as did Linden's Spobaugh in the 440. Holly's Hopson was second in that event and Fenton's Mark Ewing was teammate Chappell third in the 880.

Hamady's top-notch pole vaulter Don McMonagle earned a ticket to East Lansing with a third place in his specialty. McMonagle hadn't vaulted since the Central Michigan Relays because of mononucleosis. He received the doctor's okay to compete in only the pole vault and to quit once qualifying.

Canisius Aide Named Cage Boss at Gannon

Bob Fisher pitched the entire game for Minnesota in the nightcap. He was aided by two home runs each by Jim Wallace and Phil Flodin, and one homer apiece by Gary Hohman and Gary Morgan.

Mark David swatted a two-run homer for Purdue in the first game.

Purdue is now 6-8 in Big Ten play, and 14-16 overall. Minnesota is 13-3 in conference games, and 32-14 for all games.
