

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - Clyde King, manager of the San Francisco Giants, was fired Saturday, shortly after his team lost a 17-16 marathon slugfest to the San Diego Padres.


The Giants called a press conference shortly after the 5-hour, 29-minute game ended and announced that Charlie Fox a member of the club's organization for 28 years, would replace King today.

King managed the Giants to their fifth consecutive second place finish his first year as field boss last season.

King, fired on his 46th birthday, guid ed the Giants to a 90-72 record and second place in the Western Division as a rookie manager in 1969. It was the Giants' fifth consecutive second-place finish. The first four were under Her-
