

Detroit Team Wins In Bellaire Relays

BELLAIRE — Detroit Northern captured top honors in the 17th-annual Bellaire Relays here Saturday, coming out on top of runners-up Cleveland Glenville, 53-42%. It was the first time in the history of the relays that an out-of-state team had taken the laurels.

The Michigan entry was paced by the efforts of 100 and 220-yard victor, Marshall Dill, who also ran the anchor in the sprint relay.

Cold weather prevented what was an expected assault on the event records. Dill cracked the mark in the 220-yard dash with a 21.2 second clocking, then anchored the sprint relay team, setting another record in 1:28.5.

Also, Bruce Hodge of Dayton Belmont and Joe Record of Cleveland Benedictine, cleared 6 feet, 6 1/2 inches to share the high jump record.

The only valley athlete to cop top honors was Magnolia's Keith Thornton, who went over the bar at 13 feet, 6 inches. Just Friday night, the New Martinsville athlete had set an Ohio Valley record and West Virginia standard by vaulting 14 feet in triangular meet.

While Detroit Northern was first and Cleveland Glenville second, the remainder of the field showed Akron East, third with 20 points and Dayton Chamaine fourth, 23. Defending champion, Dayton Roosevelt was fifth with 20.

Then came Cleveland Benedictine, 19%; Youngstown Ursuline, 17; and Marion Franklin East Cleveland Shaw, Cincinnati Moeller, and North Olmstead, all tied with 16.

A total of 48 teams, from a field of more than 80, scored. Worthington lugged 15 1/2 markers; Cleveland John F. Kennedy 15; Willoughby Eastlake North and Marietta, 14 each; Cleveland John Adams, 13; Kettering Fairmont East, Cleveland Heights and Parkersburg, 12 apiece; Hickory (Pa.) Wintersville, Dayton Belmont, Mansfield Malabar, Zanesville, Cleveland Rhodes, Cleveland East Tech, Magnolia and Parma Normandy, 10 each; Campbell

Memorial, Wooster, Clarion (Pa.), and Warren Western Reserve, 8 apiece; Cleveland East and Newark, 7 each; Beaver Local and Cincinnati Parcel, 6; Gahanna Lincoln, 5; Columbus Eastnor, Triadelphia and Walnut Ridge, 4; McConnellsville Morgan, 3; Steubenville 2 1/2; and Shady-side, Cleveland Lincoln West, Warren Harding, Austintown Fitch and Ashkubala, 1 each.
