

# Warren Vaulter Tops State Mark, but Ferndale Wins Title

**Warren Vaulter** won the Class A regional track title Saturday at Warren Fitzgerald, but it was the Spartans who produced the day's top individual performer.  
 Bruce Kennedy, Fitzgerald pole vaulter, soared 14 feet 7 inches, half an inch better than the existing state record, to win his specialty.  
 "I'll break the record next Saturday at East Lansing, Kennedy said confidently after the meet. "I should have done 15 feet today."  
 Fitzgerald, which finished second in Ferndale, 275-289, also got winning efforts from Mickey Griffin in the long jump and Mark Foreman in the high jump.  
 Ferndale won the mile

final event of the day, to take home the team trophy. Running the mile relay were Bruce Cunningham, Dave Chase, Daryl Johnson and Chuck Shroy.  
**THE EAGLES** also got first-place finishes from De Michael in the shot put and Maurice Watkins in the 100-yard dash. Michael threw the shot 37 feet 3/4 inches.  
 Bruce Remsted of Warren was the meet's only double winner. He won both the 120-yard high and low hurdles, setting a regional record of 1:14 seconds in the highs.

**Holly Runs Away**  
 Holly high overborewhelmed the Class B regional track field at Oxford Saturday to win with 63 points.  
 Holly got a 1:11 effort from an Oxford relay team of Bob Heiler, L. M. Thomas, Rinal Landrod and C. T. Williams.  
 Ferness' Don Kewick ran a 1:58 half mile and Doug Hoffmann of Lake Forest won both the high and low hurdles.

**Farmington Wins**  
 Farmington High captured four first places, including a 4:22 1/2 mile by Mike McGilchrist, to win its second straight Class A regional.  
 Sam Ostrowski, a half miler from Brother Rice, turned in a splendid 1:13 in the 100 and Mike Rollins won both the 100 and 200 for Oak Park.

**Pontiac Central Wins**  
 Pontiac Central took nine of 13 firsts to pile up 96 points in the Class A track regional at Utica.  
 Central's Lucky Smith won both the 100 and 200 yard dashes. Ron Gathright of Mt. Clemens threw the shot 38 feet 3/4 inches and Mike Taylor of Pontiac Northern skipped the two mile in 8:27.4.

**New Haven Wins 'em**  
 Flint's Ron Lee won the long jump and low hurdles and Ed Smit the 100 and 200 to lead New Haven High to a Class C regional track title here Saturday. New Haven won with 27 points with Memphis second with 29.67 points.

**440 Record Falls**  
 State's Vinson, a 14-year-old senior from Detroit Chadron, clipped six months of a second off the state Class A 440-yard record Saturday in the Class A regional at Sciole High.  
 Vinson was clocked in 47.2 seconds and teammate Larry Harvey won the high jump at 63. Redford's Clarence Chapman turned in a 5.9 1/2-second dash.  
 It was Mackenzie which had the balance and rolled up 285 points to win the team title.  
 The Class C title went to Detroit Country Day, which edged Dearborn, 330-21 Country Day placed 1-2 in both the 100 and 200 and won the 100-yard relay.

**Shrine Wins in B**  
 Tim Hobbes took the pole vault at 12-foot-4 and the 100-yard low hurdles at 1:31 seconds to lead Shrine High to a one-point victory in the Class B track regional at Clarenceville, 38-29.  
 Shrine's other victory came in the mile where Bud Mehan turned in a 4:34. John Stuyvenberg of Northville, one of the state's premier long jumpers, qualified for next week's state championship with a modest leap of 21 feet 1 1/2 inches.

## Goose Goslin Dies at 70

**BRIDGTON, N.J.**—Leon Allen (Goose) Goslin, who spent four colorful years of his Hall of Fame baseball career in Detroit, died here Saturday at the age of 70.  
 The half-century-old outfielder, who was elected to the Hall of Fame in 1962, compiled a .216 lifetime average during his 18 major league seasons.  
 But the knowledgable, free-swinging Goslin probably is best remembered in Detroit for one line single in 1932 that sent the city into a celebration that wasn't matched for intensity until 1968.

**THE TIGERS** obtained Goslin from the Washington Senators in 1934 and his .380 hitting helped them to a pennant. The St. Louis Cardinals, however, took the edge off by winning the World Series.  
 In '38, with Goslin hitting .321, the Tigers repeated and faced the Chicago Cubs in the Series. The Tigers took a 2-3 lead in games and went into the ninth inning of game six at Navin Field deadlocked at 2-2.

**TAMMY BRIDGES** yielded a headoff triple to Stan Hack in the top half, but retired the next three Cubs as the crowd roared and the drama increased.  
 Now it was the last of the night, and Mickey Cochrane slipped with one out. He showed no second on Charley Gehringer's grounder.  
 Two out, Goslin waddled to the plate, drilled a Larry French 1-1-3 into rightfield to score his manager and give Detroit its first world championship.  
**IT WAS NOT** Goslin's first brush with World Series stardom. The Goose hit .344 in the 1928 classic as the Senators beat the Giants, hitting three homers and accounting for seven RBIs.  
 Goslin also batted .383 with three homers and six RBIs as the Nats lost the 1925 Series to Pittsburgh.
