

In State Class

Camden-Frontier placed second in the state Class D track and field meet Saturday at Big Rapids with 46½ points while Quincy finished sixth and Reading tied for ninth in the Class C state meet at Mount Pleasant.

Camden-Frontier had two first-place winners as the Redskins finished second to the new Class D champion, Unionville, which compiled 47 points. The remainder of the first 10 in Class D are Michigan School for the Deaf 41, Lake City 31, Mendon 27, Harbor Springs 20½, Arenac Eastern 18, Covert 18, Fairview 17 and Mancelona 15.

In Class C it was Detroit Country Day first with 46 points followed by Muskegon Western Michigan Christian 39, Saginaw Sts. Peter and Paul 28, tie between Mason County Central and New Haven 26, Quincy 23, Hazlett 22, Detroit St. Martin de Perres 21, and a tie between Reading and North Muskegon 19½.

In Class B Holly took the championship with 38 points and was followed by Ecorse 29 and Grand Rapids West Catholic 27½.

The two first-place performances by the Redskins were by Duane Reamer in the shot put with a toss of 49 feet, 10½ inches and by Dean Eby in the high hurdles with a time of 15.5 seconds.

Eby also placed second in the low hurdles with a time of 21.0 behind the winner, Art Morris of Covert, who came in at 20.8.

Other Camden-Frontier point-getters were Mark Reamer, tied for second in the long jump at 20-1¾, seventh in the high jump at 5-9 and tied for sixth in the 440 with a time of 53.5; Gary Morrison, fifth in the pole vault at 11-5; and the Camden-Frontier mile relay squad, second with a time of 3:37.0.

The only other first place won by a Hillsdale County area man was by Litchfield's Roy Haminger in the mile run. He ran the distance in 4:37.9 ahead of Manton's Chet Brown who ran it in 4:38.2.

Other places won by local men were Jack Stockford of Pittsford, sixth in the two-mile run at 10:28.2; Steve Shannon of Pittsford, fourth in the pole vault at 11-5; Mike Beach of North Adams, sixth in the low hurdles with a time of 21.3; and Terry Hartman of Pittsford, eighth in the low hurdles at 22.4.

The only first place won by a local man in Class C was by Tom Burger of Reading in the 440. He finished first with a time of 56.7, ahead of West Michigan Christian's Bruce Okkema who ran it in 31.9. Burger also placed second in the 220 with a time of 22.3.

Tim Concoe of Quincy placed second in the low hurdles with a time of 19.9 and third in the high hurdles at 15.0. The Quincy mile relay squad finished fourth in 3:35.2.

Two Jonesville men scoring points were Rick Cooley, sixth in the pole vault at 12-3, and Bill Dunn, eighth in the long jump at 20-5, behind Hanover-Borton's Mike Penn, who jumped it at 20-8¼.

Keith Burger of Reading tied for fourth in the high jump at six feet even and Bob Norman of Addison placed fifth in the 800 run at 2:00.6.

Coming off the turn Mr. Margay pulled ahead by as much as a half length, but in midstretch Laddie came on again. At the wire no more than scant inches separated the pair, with the picture showing Mr. Margay in front, but only by a short neck.

The amazing win streak of Jean Dilworth and Steffenette came to a close Saturday night as five horses, led by True Speed with Frank Sears up, finished across the wire in the eighth race. All six of the starters were in contention at one point or another in the race. Winner True Speed is owned by Ray Bucknell of Sturgis.

New Bill, owned by Farn Salmon of Hillsdale and driven by Grant Dennis, showed in the first race and paid 4-40.

Saving Grace, owned and driven by Jerry Salisbury of Camden, finished seventh in the 10th race.
