Seven Records Set In State Track Finals

Ticket Class A youngsters gave future Michigan high school track stars quite a bit of something to shoot at—seven records.

A human bullet named Marshall Dill set two of them and was in on the making of a third Saturday as he paced racing Detroit Northern to an easy Class A win, 54 points to runner-up East Lansing's 22, in the state prep track championships.

The Class A took place in East Lansing, on Michigan State University's Ralph Young Field. Holly didn't win a single event at Michigan Center but still wound up on the Class-B heap, 20.5 over defending champion Koorse.

The Class C championships, at Central Michigan in Mount Pleasant, went to Detroit County Day, 46 to 28 for runner-up Muskegon Christian, while Cassville improved from 11th a year ago to take its second Class D title in history by a 74-64 margin over second place Camden - Frontier at Ferris State in Big Rapids.

Dill set a new 100-yard dash mark of 9.8 seconds, better than even former schoolboy star Herb Washington has ever done on his home college track, and his winning effort of 29.6 in the 200 was eight-tenths of one second lower than has ever been done by a high schooler. The next standard in the 100 is two-tenths lower than either Washington or seven other freshmen had ever done in the state.

The super-swift Dill then anchored an 800-yard relay team which hit 1:27.9 to lower the state mark there by 1.4 seconds. Northern took a fourth first place, in the mile relay.

Mount Clemens' Ron Gathie, right, the state heavyweight wrestling king, established a new Michigan shot put barrier of 46.4 feet, one-inch; Dave Baker of Flint Kearsley lowered the most-lifted score five runs in two-mile record by a half-second to 5:15.4; Hayes Jones' 106 long jump mark went out to 23.4 feet, 11 inches; the 440 was dropped to 1:02.4 by Stan Vlasov of Detroit Chadsey; and the high jump record of 5-foot-8 was equalled by Dean Cooperstock of East Lansing.

The best finish Holly took in Class B was Wes Tyle's second in the shot put as Roy Young scored all of Mount Merai's 23 points to dominate the meet. Young hit 5.5 in the 100 and 21.9 in the 200 plus winding up second in the long jump. Only the 100-yard time was a record.

The 120-yard high hurdles standard in Class C was clipped to 1:4.8 seconds by Gary Venrick but Jack McClellan and sophomore Dave Hatajick dominated things for winning County Day. McClellan won the 100-yard and 200-yard dashes with 1:02 and 22.5 times while Hatajick was third in the 100, fifth in the 200 and helped out on the 800-yard relay winner with McClellan.

Carson City Crystal's Mike Burns lowered the Class C mile record to 4:23.7. George Rader of Mason County Central upset the pole vault standard to 13 feet, 1 1/2 inches. Rod Sefer of Ashtabula Easters set the lone Class D mark of the meet with a pole vault of 13 feet, 1 1/4 inches. The record of 10.2 in the 100-yard dash was equalled by its holder, Edward Robinson of the Michigan School for the Deaf team. He also won the 200 in 22.5.

Univille took the mile relay in 3:35.5 and also won the long jump and 400-yard dash. Al Stetter hit 56 feet, 11 inches for one and Terry Balzar turned in a time of 21.8 in the other.
