16 New U.P. Records Set

Upper Peninsula records fell by the wayside in rapid-fire fashion Saturday afternoon in high school track and field finals on the new all-weather track at Marquette High School, the athletes breaking 16 marks, with eight in Class A-B, three in Class C and five in Class D.

On a day of great performances, Wakefield's Bob Bruno, senior pole vaulter, had one of his greatest when he set a new all-class U.P. record with a mighty 13-1 vault to be the first Upper Peninsula pole vaulter to crack the 13-foot barrier in championship competition.

Another area athlete, John Staff of Ewen - Trout Creek, came through with another real fine race to set a new mark of 2:01.7 in Class D in the 800-yard run.

Paul Kittl of Calumet became the first to break the two-minute barrier in the 800-yard run with a clocking of 1:58.2.

Bergland's Mike Applekamp soared to a new Class D high mark of 3-3 to come within three fourths of an inch of the Class A-B mark.

Lava Rolls Toward Town

SANT'ALFIO, Sicily (AP) — Truck-sized boulders of flaming rock broke from a lava front as high as a three-story house today and rolled through orchards toward the village of Fornazzo.

The little crossroads center of 400 population stood in the new path of peril as fears eased and lava cooled on slopes just above nearby Sant'Alfio.

A new vent ripped open Sunday on the mountainside a mile above Fornazzo was pouring out a river of molten rock. At its present rate it could reach the village within 40 hours.

A more sluggish flow of lava from higher up on Europe's tallest volcano was flowing slowly past Fornazzo down a deep gulch 300 yards outside the village.

Another lava front a half-mile wide had slowed almost to a halt after menacing Sant'Alfio for a week. The lava appeared to be cooling and hardening after burning down farmhouses and orchards a little more than a half mile from the town.
