

Munising Wins C-D

3 Teams Take Honors In Cross-Country Meet

Three new champions were crowned in two divisions of intercollegiate competition in the annual Upper Peninsula Cross-Country meet held Saturday morning at the Marquette Golf and Country Club with Northern Michigan University as the host.

Escanaba and Ironwood wound up with 65 points apiece to share first place in Class A-B in dethroning Ishpeming, and Munising scored 72 points to take over the C-D crown that had been worn by Pickford.

There are new individual champions in both divisions also as the 1972 titlists graduated in June. Both of the 1973 winners set division records for the three-mile course. Dave Baker of Ironwood finished first in A-B with a time of 15:40.5, and Brad Benam of Munising took C-D honors in 15:37, which becomes an Upper Peninsula record for all classes.

Better balance enabled the Eskymos to tie Ironwood for the A-B championship. The Red Devils had three runners in the top five with Tim Kennedy finishing fourth and Wayne Kokesar fifth. Their fourth entry, Wayne Beckman was 14th, and the fifth contestant, Jessie Johnson took 41st place to give them their total of 65 points.

Escanaba's Dean Benoit was third with Gerard Krause taking seventh. Joe Heller, 10th; Steve

was Rob Cavalleri of Kingford, who was timed in 15:43.

Other A-B entries and the order in which they finished were as follows: Calumet, Ishpeming, Sault Ste. Marie, Kingford, Marquette, Menominee and Gladstone.

Other members of the championship C-D Munising team and the places in which they finished were Greg Harger, 15th; Tom Nadeau, 17th; Ole Egilsson, 18th, and Greg Peterson, 20th.

Runnerup to Benam was Tim Skinner of Pickford and Brian Weng of Stephenson took third.

Munising enjoyed a 22-point margin over Norway, which finished with 94 points. Per-

kings was third, Chassell, fourth, and Pickford, fifth. Other entries and the order in which they finished included Stephenson, Rudyard, Watersmeet, Painesdale, National Mine, Ironwood Catholic, Crystal Falls, Trenary, DePour, Big Bay de Noc, Bergland, Eben, Brimley, North Central, Newberry, Cedarville and Champion.

Ishpeming had won five consecutive titles in A-B and Pickford had taken three in a row in C-D.

Trophies are provided by the Michigan High School Athletic Association for the first and second-place teams in each division, and medals for the members of these teams in addition to medals for the first 15 places in each class.

Trophies and medals were presented by Gildo Canale, Northern Michigan University athletic director, who served as meet manager. The A-B championship trophy was presented to Escanaba as a result of a coin flip and a duplicate award will be sent to Ironwood by the state association.
