## World records fall

TORONTO (CP) — A 17-year-old Ottawa girl clipped almost three seconds off the world indoor record for the 1,000 yards Friday night at the Toronto Star Maple Leaf Indoor Games.

Glenda Reiser covered the distance in 2 minutes, 29.4 seconds, eclipsing the previous record of 2:32.2 set in Los Angeles last year by Kathy Gibbons of the United States.

Miss Reiser took the lead after about 110 yards and was never headed. She first fought off a challenge from Christa Merten of West Germany and then withstood a late challenge from Robin Campbell of Washington State International.

Miss Campbell finished second in 2:30.7 while Nancy Shaffer of Canton, Ohio, was third in 2:32.5.

Miss Reiser holds Canadian

indoor records for 1500 metres in the midget, juvenile, junior and senior divisions and flashed to prominence last summer at the Olympic Games in Munich.

She finished second in a 1500-metres heat and lowered the existing world mark while doing so. However, she faded in the semi-finals, finishing last.

Another world record fell earlier when Iris Davis of Tennessee State University Tigerbells ran the 50 yards in 5.5 seconds.

Miss Davis wiped out the record of 5.6 seconds set by Wyomia Tyus in 1966.

In her heat, Miss Davis finished first in 5.7 seconds, the same as Alfreda Daniels of the Detroit Police Athletic League.

In the final, Mattline Render of the New York Police Athletic League was second in 5.7 while

Miss Daniels was third in 5.8 seconds.

In the 50-yard hurdles, Mamie Rallins got off to a poor start, but had enough to tie the world record.

Miss Rallins, representing Tennessee State University Tigerbells, hit the tape in the final just ahead of Lacy O'Neal of Washington Sports International. Both were clocked in 6.4 seconds.

Pat Hawkins of New York Atoms Track Club was third in 6.7.

Miss Rallins was the fastest qualifier, winning her heat in 6.5 seconds. For the final she lined up beside Miss O'Neal who had won her heat in 6.6. The Washington girl got a good start and led with about 20 yards to go, but she couldn't hold off Miss Rallins.

Patty Johnson of the Angels Track Club, California, set the meet and world records last year.

Danny Smith of Florida State University pulled an upset in the men's 50-yard hurdles, beating Willie Davenport and Rod Milburn and tying the world record in the process.

Off to a super start, Smith,

champion of the Bahamas, streaked to a 5.8 clocking.

Thomas Hill of West Point was second, also in 5.8, while Larry Shipp of Washington Sports International was third in six seconds flat.
