ELSIE — Rumors of De-Witt's demise as track ruler of the Central Michigan Athletic Conference have proven greatly exaggerated.

The Panthers are back on

BUMPED FROM the head of the class for the first time in seven years last spring by Potseven years last spring by Pot-terville, DeWitt recovered handsomely here Thursday night to win the CMAC meet held at Ovid-Elsie. DeWitt totaled 74 points, Olivet capturing the runner-up slot with 65, and Potterville was third with 57.

Field events were a major factor in the Panthers' suc-cess. Rich Albertson and Tom Ashley provided a 1-3 finish in shot put, Terry Faust and Ashley were 1-4 in high jump, and Randy Lankford and Randy

Pitts supplied a 1-4 placing in long jump.

DeWITT ADDED three of the running events, Mike Mandrick copping the half mile, Doyle Foland the two-mile and Lankford, Tim Farr, Pitts and Albertson combining to prodto the meet's only record-breaker with their 46.5 winner in the 440 relay.

Olivet came up with four victories, and Potterville with

three. Both had the services of double winners, Bryan Klein-felt sweeping the hurdles for Olivet, Bob Nemeth notching the short dashes for Potter-

Olivet also got a 440 dash triumph from Rich Schriner, who anchored the mile relay to victory as well. Nemeth helped Potterville to success in the 880 relay.

THE ONLY events not won by representatives of the "big three" were the pole vault, where Greg Glover of Webberville held forth, and the mile, which went to Springport's Barry Elmer.

Nemeth and Foland both dominated their specialities for the second straight year.
