Big Crowd, Warm Temp. Would Help 4th Annual Korf Invitational Meet

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The fourth annual Herb Korf Saginaw County Invitational Track Meet is a massive effort of giving by many people. But there are a couple of things the people behind the scenes would like to receive.

Those two things happen to be warm weather with very little wind and a big crowd. Both are within reach, but have been elusive in the first three events.

The Korf meet, sponsored by The News, will be held at Saginaw High's track for the fourth straight time Tuesday. The field events get underway at 6:30 p.m. Pre-meet festivities start at 7 with the running events to follow directly.

There is hardly anything anyone can do about the weather except complain. This has been a very poor season on the weather side for track athletes. A shift to the warmer air would be greatly appreciated.

That could also help bring a larger crowd to see the best Saginaw County track athletes from schools of all classes in one meet. The class distinctions are ignored for the meet and the top qualifiers in each event compete against each other as individuals and not members of a team. No team points are compiled. Individual awards are given, and the most outstanding athlete of the meet is chosen.

Reggie Jones, of Saginaw High, was the most outstanding athlete award winner a year ago and will have some strong competition to repeat.

MacArthur's Bill Yeo, Bridgeport's Mike Arnold, St. Stephen's Pat Moore, Hemlock's Paul Gorney, Saginaw High's Bob Chapman and Arthur Hill's Curt Thon to name a few are all in the running.

The chance to see some very exciting races in all events and strong field event competition should be enough to get people out to the event. The added emphasis on so many outstanding athletes is an even greater incentive.

Crowds have not been large, to say the least, at Saginaw High the past three years for the event. No crowd has totaled over 400. The Korf Committee found this meet to provide high-level competition for area

trackmen and keep the name of Herb Korf in the limelight.

A scholarship is also presented yearly to a County track athlete. He is chosen by a special committee upon recommendations from County coaches. All monies collected from the meet go into this fund. All time and services are donated, and The News sponsors the presentation of all trophies.

In order to build a larger scholarship fund, the Korf Committee debated on changing the site of the meet. It was decided that Saginaw High's Track was Herb Korf's track and for the present the meet should be held there. A poor turnout could alter that somewhat, though in the future.

The price for admittance is minimal and those who have attended in the past can take pride in being a part of the first scholarship awarded last year to Arthur Hill's Jim Jones.

Jones is currently attending Central Michigan University and had a very successful spring football practice session.
