Saginaw sprints to state Class A track championship

EAST LANSING - Just as golf has an axiom "you drive for show and putt for dough" it's possible to turn a phrase for Michigan's Class A state track meet: Let the field eventers and distance men have their fun but the sprinters will decide the title

It was that way again Saturday as Saginaw High, led by the brilliant Reggie Jones, scored 41 points to outlast Pontiac Central in an all-Saginaw Valley Conference showdown, Pontiac totaled 35 points.

Both teams scored 69 of their 76 points in the 100, 220, 880 relay, 440 relay, high hurdles and low hurdles.

FOR SAGINAW, it was the first championship since the late Herb Korf
