

Monday, May 21, '73 STATE TITLE MEETS DALLLE **Kun to Form**

There were few surprises Saturday as track and field championships were deter-mined at five widely scattered

mined at five widely scattered centers throughout Michigan.
Saginaw High, with its premier sprinter Reggie Jones winning both dashes and anchoring a relay, edged Pontiac, 41-35, for the State Class A title at Michigan State's Ralph Young Field.
Up at Flint Northwestern High, Ecorse, scoring heavy in

High, Ecorse, scoring heavy in the relays, captured the Class B crown with 43 points.

St. Martin DePorres of De-troit went back to Mt. Pleasant to successfully defend its Class C crown. Alan Baker won both hurdles and led off the mile relay team for De-

LITTLE Mendon High, 25 miles southeast of Kalamazoo. went all the way to Caro to claim the Class D crown as Lloyd Wilds won both the 440 and 880. Mendon rolled up 74

points.

Lincoln Park, winning the medley relay and mile run, edged Walled Lake Western, 34-311/2, in the first girls' state meet ever held.

Sue Parks, the only girl en-tered from Ypsilanti High, scored all her team's 20 points by finishing second in both the 880 and high jump and taking a third in the 440.

Mike McGuire of Farmington set the only Class A record when he upset Pat Davey of Brother Rice in the two-mile in 9:12 but four other records were tied.

Jones tied Marshall Dill's 100-yard dash mark at 9.6 seconds. Kelsev Johnson of Osborn gained a tie for the long record with a leap of 23 feet 11 inches.

GROSSE POINTE North's Ken Delor earned a tie for the 440-yard record when he was clocked in 48 seconds flat. Kettering's 440-yard relay team of Anthony Thompson, Eddie Woods, ElDon Parhan and Charles Carroll equalled the record of 42.9 seconds in the event.

Larry Flake was the biggest surprise for Ecorse. Flake, who came out for track less than a month ago, finished second behind Comstock's Terry Fields in the 100-yard dash.

The Detroit area produced

four others winners in Class B. Ed Poindexter of Inkster won the 180-yard low hurdles in 19.9 seconds, Devon Hind of
