

## Central runners sparkle

Central had the best individual times in some events and made distance runs at the Northwest track and field meet of the Pullman School League yesterday.

The meet was run on Central's all-weather track. The 100-yard sprints included Anthony Jones to the lead with a 10.4, Mike Jones in close quarters, Larry, in the 100 with a 11.2 and Alan Jones in the 200 with a 2-0.

The 400-yard race, however, had a lead by Weston's 12 and Chadley's 11. Larry Womack and Eric Chisney paced the Northwest's effort. Womack had a best time of 2:0.8 in the 100-yard low hurdles, while Chisney had a 1:1.2 in the 120-yard high hurdles.

The pole vault and high jump trials for all four brackets were to be held today at Wayne State.

The West Side events were slated for next Thursday also at Central and the East Side events the same day at King. The league championship will be decided June 2-7 at Wayne State's track.

In the Northwest bracket action, Cooley paced the field at the Ford course with 12 individual qualifiers, including Art Little who long jumped 20 feet 7 as the best performance of the day. Host Ford and Mackenzie also did well on the slow course.

Kelsey Johnson, the newly-crowned state Class A long jump champion from Peshing, turned in a disappointing effort of 20-6 in the Northeast bracket trials at Osborn in sharp contrast to his 23-11 title performance last Saturday at East Lansing.

Peshing, however, accounted for the most qualifiers with 22 and was closely followed by Kettering with 21.

Among the hurdles stand-outs were Finney's Lovett Allen and Kettering's both Boyd. They qualified in both hurdles. Allen was clocked in 15.7 and 21.4 for the highs and lows, while Boyd was timed in 15.9 and 21.1.

In the other bracket trials at King for the Southeast schools, the host team had 19 qualifiers followed by Cass' 17 and Northern's 16.

Jeff Dill of Northern and Harlan Huckleby of Cass were the best qualifiers. Dill, the younger brother of Michigan State star Marshall Dill, was timed in a slow 10.6 for the 100 and a 24.6 in the 220. Huckleby had a 23.5 in the 220 and, although he qualified, his time for the 100 was not reported.
