SOUTHGATE — The Pioneer High track team ran into some tough statewide competition Saturday but was still able to finish fourth here in the rain-soaked Schaefer Relays.

Pontiac Central won the meet with 29 points. Flint Northern and Highland Park tied for second with 21, while Pioneer had 19.

Huron High took only a handful of performers to the meet and finished with a very respectable eight points.

Both Pioneer and Huron have dual meets Tuesday before the Class A Regional at Ypsilanti Saturday. Pioneer will get a workout at the Ypsilanti High track, while Huron will be at Adrian.

Pioneer Coach Don Sleeman was most impressed with the two-mile quartet of Steve Hartwell, Nathan Huber, Pat Brusher and Jeff Luker who teamed to win in 8:21.1. "They really ran extremely well and it was possibly the weakest one I could put together," said a delighted Sleeman. "Their performance far surpassed our so-called good runners."

Doug Hennigar, Pioneer's premier sprinter, was barely edged out of winning the 100 as Chris Richards of Pershing was first and Harlan Huckleby of Detroit Cass Tech was second. Hennigar was timed in 10.0. "He had them beat after the first 60 yards," said Sleeman of Hennigar who just didn't have the finishing kick.

"We did really well for

what we wanted to do," said Huron Coach Kent Overbey, whose major goal was giving his performers some work in specific areas.

John Arndt took second in the shot put with a heave of

54-10. All four teams in the distance medley relay broke the meet record, including the Track Rats' third-place unit of Don Hubbard, Bill Stein, Mark Foster and John Zale. Their total time was 10:46, in-

cluding a 3:08 in the three-quarter mile by Foster, his best ever at that distance.

The quartet of Reggie Jones, Tony Brayton, Foster and Hubbard tied for fifth in the mile relay at 3:29.6.

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Another spring has rolled by without the Michigan tennis team tasting defeat at the hands of a Big Ten opponent.

The Wolverines downed Ohio State, 7-2, Saturday to finish 9-0 again against conference competition. Overall, Michigan is 12-1 and visits Eastern Michigan Monday and Kalamazoo College Tuesday before next weekend's Big Ten championships at Wisconsin.

Fred deJesus turned in the day's outstanding performance for Michigan. He ran off nine straight games against the Buckeyes' Francisco Gonzalez en route to a 6-0, 6-3 victory at number-one singles.

"Gonzalez had lost only one
