

## Ontonagon Edges L'Anse to Win U.P. Class C Girls' Championship

GWINN — Ontonagon High School won the team championship in the Class C girls' Upper Peninsula track meet here Saturday, scoring 46 points against 43 for arch-rival L'Anse and 21 by Rudyard. It was the second U. P. Class C title of the season for the Ontonagon

girls, who also won the basketball championship last December. Miss Dorothy Phillips coached the Ontonagon girls track team and the cage club was coached by Gladys Chamberlain, with Miss Phillips assisting. Roles were reversed in track.

Other team scores: Negaunee and Hancock 20, Houghton 14, Norway 12, Stephenson failed to score. In Class D competition, Crystal Falls won the title with 39 points against Pickford's 29, Rapid River 23, National Mine 21, Lake Linden 14, DeTour 10, Watersmeet 9, Ewen-Trout

Creek 6, Big Bay de Noc 4, Chassell 3, Eben 4, North Dickinson 4, Engadine 2, Cedarville 1 and Baraga, Bergland, Bark River, Brimley, Dollar Bay and White Pine failed to score. The total schools entered, all classes, was 41 with more than 1,600 athletes taking part under meet manager Tom Piasocki of Gwinn.

All records are considered new U. P. marks, since this is the first meet ever held for girls to be run with the boys meet format, classes A-B, C and D titles being awarded.

Last year's initial meet was not run by classes. Seven marks in Class A-B better than in the 1973 meet with one tied and four of the marks in Class C were better than in the 1973 all-class meet.

MHSAA officials said that the entry list of 1,000 plus athletes is the largest in U. P. athletic history.

## Curl Wins Colonial Open For 1st Golf Tour Victory

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) — Champagne glass in hand and lustily toasting his first triumph on the professional golf tour, Rod Curl, a White Indian, announced: "My Indian name is now Yose. It means Johnny Jump-up or Johnny-Comer-Fo-a-Behind. My Mother named me. It took her 31 years to do it, but she finally did it."

And jump up he did, overtaking Chuck Courtney and

withstanding the wind, the heat and the challenge of Jack Nicklaus to capture the \$30,000 Colonial National Open.

The former California ditch-digger lamed Colonial's testy par-70 course with a closing 66 for a four-round total of 276, four-under-par and a stroke ahead of Nicklaus, who also wound up with a 63.

"I'll tell you something," Curl said with a grin, "and you ain't gonna believe it. But I dreamed last night that I would beat Nicklaus by a shot . . . that's every golfer's dream. I'm just happy to beat the best golfer in the world on one of the best golf courses in the world."

Nicklaus, whose bid crumbled with a bogey at the par four, 17th hole, earned second place money of \$28,500 with a 12-foot birdie putt at the final hole and said of Curl: "He never made any mistakes. He just kept right on playing . . . I was aware of his position . . . but I thought I might sneak in there. The turning point for me was the 37th."

Courtney, who led Curl by two strokes and Nicklaus by one at the final round infirmary, shot a closing 72 and finished at 278 for third and \$17,750.

Julius Botes and Lee Trevino also had closing 68s with Botes taking fourth at 279 and Trevino fifth at 280. Gary Player wound up at 282 with a par 70. It was somewhat ironic that
