Pioneer Sweeps To Seven-A Title

YPSILANTI — When an
Ann Arbor track team wins a

championship it's old hat.

Tuesday, St. Thomas captured the initial Tri-County
Conference title, after winning the Detroit Catholic League's
Second Division championship a year ago. Wednesday, Pioneer High ruised to its third straight Seven-A League

championship while Huron High is favored to take its third consecutive South Central Conference crown at Lansing Hill tonight.

Pioneer was awesome in defense of its championship here at Shadford Field and more than doubled the score on the surprising second place finisher, Kalmazoo Central.

Don Sleeman's squad captured every running event with the exception of the two mile run and the 440 relay, finishing with 119 points, while the Maroon Giants had 561/2.

In the two mile, Pioneer's Chris Spear took third and Pete Chethik notched fourth, while the 440 relay team finished second.

Pioneer has been less than spectacular in the field events, or this could certainly be called the finest team in

the school's history.

Sleeman compared it to the championship team of two seasons ago, citing it as another senior-oriented squad, "with a high degree of competitiveness and a high degree of talent. But it's taken a little longer to put it together."

Looking back at the results of the meet, Sleeman said that his squad performed "beyond belief. We were a lot better than we expected."

"After we won all the dual meets, we could have went into this with a cocky attitude." Sleeman said later, "but we couldn't have put in more effort."

That effort could be translated into the times that came out of the proceedings.

Senior Doug Hennigar, who will be running for Michigan next season, broke conference and school marks in both

sprints. His :00.6 in the 100 and :21.4 in the 220 had Eastern Michigan mentor Bob Parks wishing that Hennigard had made a different decision.

Chip Hadler's 4:17.6 in the mile also broke existing school and meet records while Greg Giltrow chopped nearly two seconds off his previous best time in winning the two mile (1:56.7).

Pioneer's fine depth was also illustrated as a team as the 880 relay team of Jim Copeland, Jim Paper, Walt Blissitt and Hennigar put together a winning time of 1:29.6. The mile relay tema of Steve Busch, McMahon, Giltrow and Paper won in 3:24.3, while Copeland, Matt Verhoff, Mark Slaughter and Blissitt teamed for a :43.8 in the second-place 440 relay.

In the 800, Pioneer also took third (Steve Hartwell) and sixth (Busch), while in the mile the local team also had a third (Eric Burt) and a fifth (Pat Brusher).

Their were also a couple surprises as Jim Bowker placed fifth in the high hurdles, and Larry Nichols notched sixth in the 440.

While Pioneer didn't exactly shine in the field events (Slaughter did leap 12-0 in the pole vault for second), that's where Ypsilanti stole the show to leap from sixth after the dual meet season to a tie for fourth.

Robbie Robinson won the high jump for Levi Simpson's Braves at 6-0, while Mike Grice took second and Jeff Hewitt third in the shot put.

from fourth to second as Battle Creek Central's premier high jumper Trummy Williams was not able to compete and its other fine jumper, Bill Thomas, could only clear 5-8.
