Central Conference meet, gained the other six points. He took a third place in the shot put at 54-10

Just like Hubbard, the entire Pioner team came up with a gutty effort, prime examples being Mark Slaughter and Greg Giltrow.

Slaughter got Pioneer's final two points of the meet with a seventh-place effort in the long jump at 21-feet-ly. Gilyard run to be fourth at 1:56.4.

Sprinter Doug Hennigar personally accounted for 14 points. He was second in the 100-yard dash at 10.0 and the 220yard dash at :21.9.
