# Four straight birdies help Casper widen lead NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Placid, imperturbable Billy Casper recled off a decisive string of four birdies and expanded his lead to a commanding four strokes with a six-under-par 66 in Saturday's third round of the \$150,000 New Orleans Open golf tournament. The 43-year-old Casper, who scored the last of his 50 tour victories two seasons back, put together a 54-hole total of 201, a distant 15-under-par for three times over the muddy 7,080-yard Lakewood Country Club course. Casper, who has led or shared the lead at the end of each round, dropped two back of England's Peter Oosterhuis early in the round, but then swept by him on the birdie string that started on the 12th hole. Oosterhuis, meanwhile, bogeyed two of his last six holes and drifted back to a 69 and a 205 total. Steve Melnyk, the former National Amateur Champion who has yet to make his mark in the pros, once advanced to second place, but made a double bogey six on the last hole, scored a 68 and was third at 206, 10-under-par, but five strokes off Casper's pace. Fred Marti, Lanny Wadkins and Bob Wynn were next at 207. Marti shot a 69 in the mild, slightly breezy weather, while Wadkins and Wynn had 70s. Defending champion Lee Trevino finally mastered his balky putter for a 67 that included a 45-foot birdie putt on the final hole. He had a 209 total, but at eight strokes behind, appeared out of title contention.
