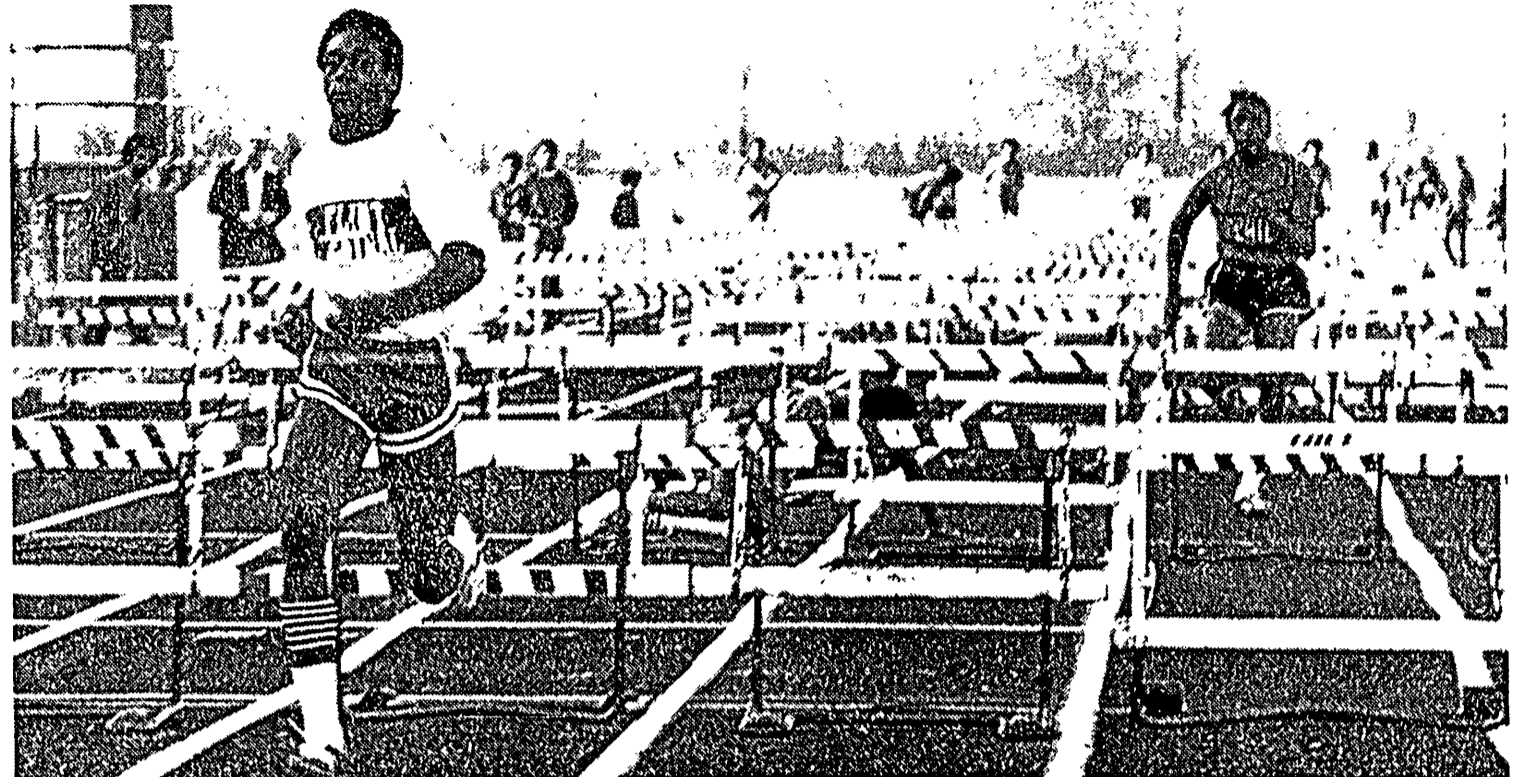

Pontiac Central regains Mott Relays crown

Poise gained through experience probably was the deciding factor Friday night as Pontiac Central regained the championship in the seventh annual C. S. Mott Relays.

The Chiefs paced a 19 team field merely by staying on the track at Houston Stadium. Two others which had excellent shots at the crown didn't.

SOUTHWESTERN had a rough night and never was really a title contender in the last half of the meet although it eventually finished second.

Coach Roger Shepler's Chiefs collected 33 1/2 points to Southwestern's 38. Grand Blanc and Midland shared third with 36 points and Northwestern and River Rouge shared fifth with 32. Cass Tech was seventh with 30, Northern eighth with 28, Central ninth with 26, and Kearsley 10th with 20.

Flushing scored 12 and Clio 5.

Pontiac, which won the Class A state championship on the same track last spring, won only the two mile relay where clever Steve Elliott anchored the victory with a 1:29.2 half mile. It was second in the long jump and added two thirds, three fourths and a fifth

PONTIAC IS accustomed to winning titles on the state, regional and Saginaw Valley Conference levels and its poise was a help Friday.

Shepler was shaking his head in amazement about the mile relay in which River Rouge chopped 1 1/2 seconds from the meet record with a time of 7:54. He said "Heck, we ran 1:22.3 which is a good time and we were fourth. I don't think I've ever had a team run a mile relay where two teams were under 3:20." Grand Blanc was second in 3:19.9 with Charles Crouther, Mike Evans, Neil LaBelle and Steve Barnes running in that order.

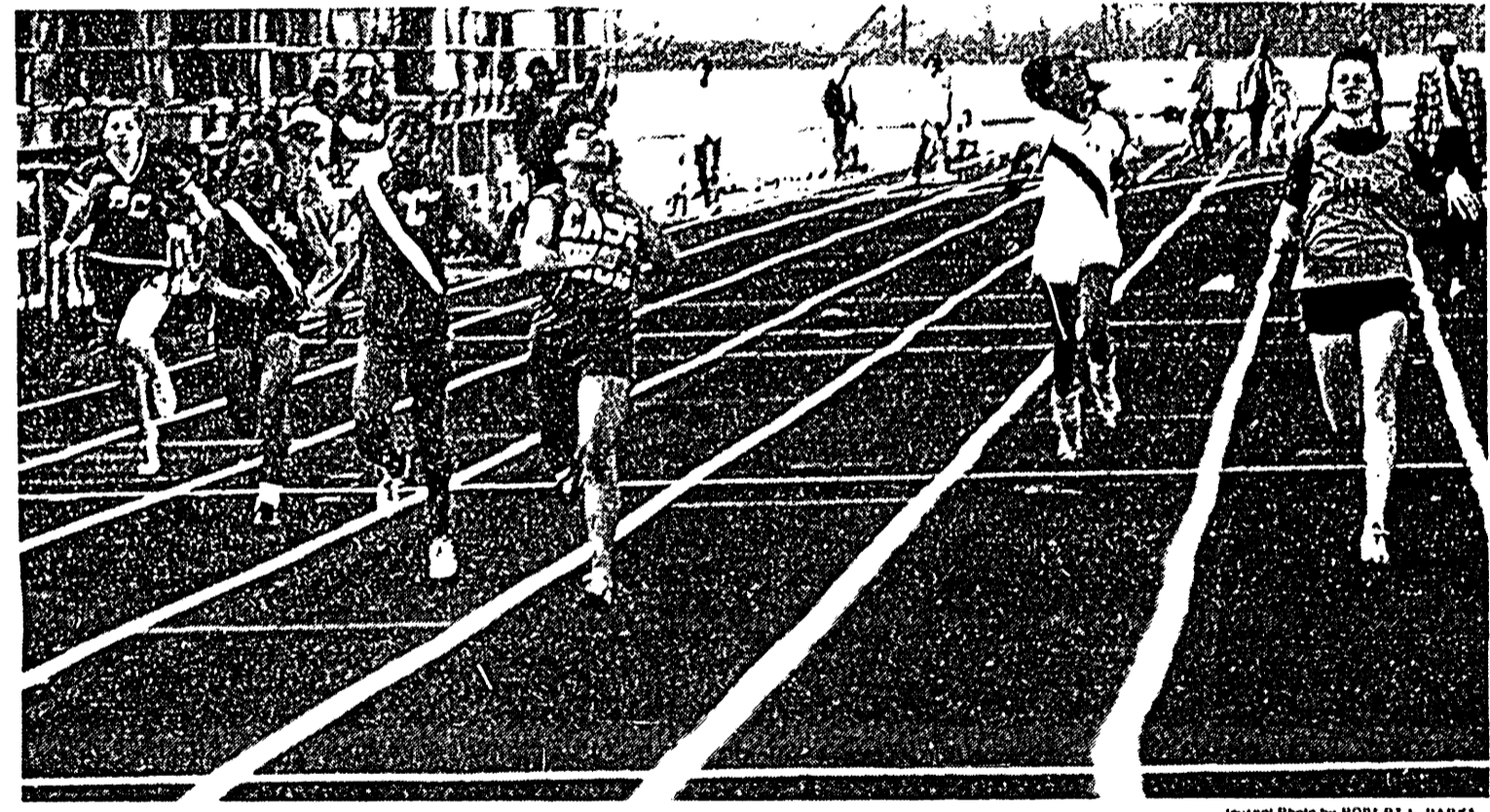
Rouge also lowered the spring medley record from 2:26.5 to 2:24.9.

SOUTHWESTERN'S 880 relay team of Rod Feaster, Carlisle Richardson, Booker Moore and Dexter Shankle won in record time of 1:29.4 and Cass Tech with hotshot Harlan Huckleby on the anchorleg, ran a record 1:20.5 in the special C. S. Mott relay.

However, both schools probably would have swapped the records for better all over luck. Both could have outpointed Pontiac.

Southwestern would have finished at least third in the shuttle hurdles relay except for a spill by Craig Johnson which aborted its chances. It was bidding for second place halfway through

the sprint medley when the baton was knocked from Feaster's hand as he attempted to pass to Dennis Johnson.

And Ryan Reeves, a six foot high jumper, failed to clear 5-8. Thus, team mate Willie Turner, who has cleared 6-7 this spring, had to pass.

FEASTER, Richardson, Moore and Shankle later won the 440 relay in a record 42.6 but that merely got the Colts to No. 2.

Cass Tech had a chance to win in the closing seconds. However, the baton never reached Huckleby, the state 220 champion. The Technicians went from first place — which would have won the meet — to disqualification and out of the meet.

Flint area schools had three other victories.

Northwestern, with state champ Terry Thames clearing 22.10, totaled 42.53 to win the long jump relay on a two-man total. Central's shuttle hurdles team of Joe Hendrix, Tom Wilson, James Toallev and Jim Harston won in 56.1 seconds. And Grand Blanc's distance medley team of Tom Manutes, Sean McVey, Brian Graves and Bruce Harley won in 10:50.1.

Midland won the four mile high jump and pole vault and Cass Tech took the shot put.

Cass Tech took two special girls events, the 100 relay and the individual 100-yard dash with Angela Johnson winning in 1:14.4.
