# **1977 RULE BOOK CORRECTIONS:**

14-2 - Fig. 3 DISCUS CIRCLE DIAGRAM - The distance between the points where the two sector lines bisect the throwing circle is 4' 11/4". When structuring the sector lines you create an equalateral triangle with each side equal to the radius (one-half the diameter) of the  $8' 2\frac{1}{2}''$  circle.

Situation Ruling 621 (page 54) Delete last 3 lines of ruling and insert: "but F had 4 misses and A had 3. Therefore, A is 5th and F is 6th."

1. Situation: A1 is competing in the pole vault while wearing gloves.

Ruling: Gloves in themselves do not constitute an "artificial aid." It is conceivable that some types of gloves could be ruled illegal if they included material attached to the palm that would adhere to the gripping area on the pole. (e.g. A type of golf glove that features a "snug-tex rubber grip" in the palm area.) Generally any glove that has a smooth surface in the gripping area would not be considered illegal.

2. Situation: In the shot put, A1 reports with the fingers on the putting hand taped individually (not together).

Ruling: Illegal. The rule is quite specific in defining where and how specific areas of the hand and wrist may be taped. (10-9-1)

3. Situation: Before A1 committed an unsportsmanlike act that caused his disqualification in the pole vault, he had jumped 21'6" in the long jump, qualifying him for the finals.

Ruling: While AI cannot earn place points in the pole vault, and is denied further participation in the meet, his mark made in the long jump, prior to his disqualification, can be considered for place points (5-3-1, 10-5-1 and 10-1-4)

4. Situation: In the sprint medley relay, only the first three legs are run in assigned lanes. When can A4 cut for the pole?

Ruling: A4 may cut for the pole as soon as the baton has been exchanged provided A4 does not interfere with another runner. (9-3-12)

5. Situation: The members of Team A's 440 Yard Relay team are wearing identical uniforms except: (a) A1 who is wearing a T-shirt under the uniform jersey; or (b) A1 is wearing a white T-shirt, and A2 is wearing a red T-shirt.

Ruling: Legal in (a) and Illegal in (b) (5-2-2)

6. Situation: A1 is wearing baseball shoes when he reports (a) to the starting line, or (b) the field event judge.

Ruling: Baseball spikes are prohibited. Al may not compete in any track or field event unless he is wearing shoes as defined in Rule 2-3-6.

7. Situation: Al has participated in an excessive number of events. This is discovered (a) during the meet, or (b) sometime following the meet.

Ruling: In either (a) or (b), all individual and team points earned by A1 in any event shall be forfeited. Following the deductions of these points from Team A's score, there will be no reranking of places or team points (5-1-3).

8. Situation: Is the previous ruling in conflict with Rule 6-1-4 which states, "when an apparent place winner is disqualified . . lower place winners . . . will be advanced to fill vacant places"?

Ruling: Rule 6-1-4 applies to an apparent place-winner who is disqualified prior to the approval of the place winners by the head finish or field event judge.

9. Situation: There are four preliminary heats in the 100 yard dash with the six fastest runners qualifying for the finals. There is a tie between two or more runners for the sixth fastest time. The track has only six lanes available.

Ruling: After a reasonable rest period the tied competitors shall compete again for the available lane.° (9-2-4)

10. Situation: Is the above ruling consistent with 9-2-3?

Ruling: 9-2-4 is not in conflict with 9-2-3 which states "the trials should be arranged so that no competitor is scheduled to run more heats than another. When the meet was set up it was arranged so that all competitors would compete in one preliminary heat with the six fastest qualifying for the finals. Certainly the meet management did not "arrange" to have a tie for one of the qualifying places. In other words, article 3 pertains to a predetermined schedule of trials and article 4 provides for the possibility that the predetermined method of qualifying for the finals may not produce a qualifier for each available lane.

11. Situation: In a distance race a person is standing along the back stretch calling out times and other information to A1. A1 and his coach claim the person is not connected with the team and they have asked this person to stop giving help, but their pleas are ignored.

Ruling: If this has happened previously and A1, or his coach, anticipates before the race that it may occur again, meet management should see that the spectator is either restrained from doing this, or removed from the vicinity of the track. If it has occurred for the first time during the race, then the referee will have to determine whether the efforts by A1's coach to prevent this have been sincere. If there is evidence to show the coach or Al is using a friend not connected with the team, in an effort to circumvent the rule, this would be a serious breach of ethics on the part of Al or the coach, and most certainly the runner should be disqualified. The fact that a runner received unsolicited assistance from a teammate or friend, does not remove the possibility of disqualification. (5-1-4 and 8-4-1)

12. Situation: The coach of Team A scratches A1 from the finals of (a) long jump, (b) 100 yard dash, or (c) 440 yard relay. May Al participate in any further competition in the meet?

**Ruling:** In (a) and (b) yes. In (c) no. In (a) any marks made in the preliminary trials would be considered in the final placing. In (c) written certification from a physician would have to be submitted if Team A is to be allowed to designate a substitute runner for A1 in the 440 yard relay. In (a) and (b) no substitute or replacement from Team A, or any other team, may take A1's qualifying spot. (9-3-1, 9-2-6 and 10-1-4)

**Comment:** It is unfair to other competitors if a runner qualifies in a preliminary race, and then withdraws from further competition in that event without a valid reason. Other than the question of ethics, there is no penalty for doing so. It must also be conceded there may be a legitimate reason for an athlete to scratch from one of the remaining events, such as, an unanticipated injury, exhaustion, etc.

13. Situation: In the 440 yard relay one member of team A is wearing white shorts and the the other three members are wearing purple shorts. This is discovered (a) before the start of the race, or (b) during or immediately after the race.

Ruling: In (a) the runner should be advised the uniform is illegal and will have to be changed to conform with the other three runners before the runner may participate. If a change in uniform can be made without delaying the start of the event, no penalty will be incurred. In (b) team A will be disqualified (5-2-2 and 5-3-2).

**Comment:** It is the responsibility of the coach and the contestants to see that all members of a relay team are wearing the same uniform. A T-shirt worn under the jersey is not considered part of the uniform unless more than one member of a relay team is wearing T-shirts under their jerseys. If there is any question about whether the uniforms conform, an opinion may be sought of the referee prior to the race. If the starter, referee, or any other meet official detects an illegal uniform prior to the start of the race, it is good practice in preventive officiating to call this to the attention of the contestant. However, the responsibility of conforming to this rule is that of the contestant, not the meet officials.

14. Situation: In the 880 yard relay, outgoing runner A2 accepts the baton (takes possession) (a) just as he enters the beginning of the exchange zone and while the baton is still over the acceleration zone, or (b) while he is touching the track beyond the limit of the exchange zone, but before the baton itself has actually crossed the vertical plane above the far limit of the exchange zone.

Ruling: In (a) an illegal exchange, and (b) a legal exchange.

**Comment:** It is the position of the baton, and not either runner that determines the legality of the exchange. Rule 9-3-4 states, "the baton must be passed while it is within the 22-yard exchange zone".

15. Situation: Following the completion of the 440 yard relay, A4 (a) throws the baton high in the air in a moment of exhilaration over his team's winning, or (b) throws the baton to the track in disgust because him team failed to break the record, or (c) deliberately throws the baton into the stands, or at an opponent.

**Ruling:** Team  $\Lambda$  will be disqualified in all cases. In (c) A4 will also be charged with unsportsmanlike conduct and denied further participation in the meet.

**Comment:** Though "throwing the baton" has been removed, from the list of examples of unsportsmanlike conduct, it is still an unacceptable act that will cause the relay team to be disqualified, and as described above could also be ruled as unsportsmanlike if the intent and hazard to other contestants, officials or spectators would warrant a more severe penalty. 16. Situation: Pole Vaulter A1 reports to the Head Field Judge for inspection with a pole that has a rubber sleeve similar to the grips found on some field hockey sticks—which covers the gripping area on the pole.

Ruling: Illegal. The judge will require the grip to be removed before approving it for competition (1-7-5)

17. Situation: In the state final track meet the entries in the long jump are divided into flights. The long jump judge announces and permits the contestants to take four jumps in the preliminary trials. The error is discovered after the first flight has completed its round of 4 trials.

Ruling: Even though the judge was in error the results of each competitors fourth jump is stricken from the record, and only the first three trials will be considered for advancement to the finals (10-5-1).

**Comment:** No official, including the referee, jury of appeals or games committee has the authority to set aside a rule. Coaches and contestants also have a responsibility to know the rules.

18. Situation: A1 desires to participate in the pole vault without wearing shoes. This is discovered by the event judge (a) during the warm-up, (b) after one or more trials, or (c) after previously being informed by the event judge that shoes were required, he takes one of his trials without wearing shoes.

Ruling: In (a) he has not, as yet, begun competition and should be warned, but not disqualified. In (b) and (c) the competitor is disqualified whether or not he had been cautioned. (5-3-1, 2-3-7 and 2-3-6).

19. Situation: In the girls 4 lap relay in an indoor meet (30 inch lanes) Team A is in lane one, Team B is in lane two. Outgoing runners A2 and B2 both are using a "blind pass" technique. A2 extends her right hand B2 her left hand as a target for incoming runners A1 and B1. When A1 extends the baton, it ends up in the hand of B2, who assumed she received it from teammate B1. This leaves Team A without a baton and B1 without a teammate to pass the baton to.

Ruling: When the laughter dies down, both Team A and Team B must be disqualified. (9-3-4 and 9-3-5).

20. Situation: After the completion of the 880 yard relay, Team A protests Team B started from the wrong stagger mark, or (b) used the third exchange zone on its first baton exchange.

Ruling: If this can be verified by an official (who should have immediately signaled this violation) the team would be disqualified if they used a starting line or exchange zone other than the one designated to them by the clerk of course. If the clerk erroneously assigned Team A to the wrong starting line or exchange zone, the referee would order the race re-run.

**Comment:** The possibility for errors in staggered starts or relay exchange zone limits can be minimized if meet directors will insist on using the recommended standardized color markings described on page 130 of the 1977 National Federation Track and Field Rules Book.

21. Situation: After all runners are set, but before the pistol is fired A1 and B1 leave their marks almost simultaneously, and after a slight pause A2 and B2 realizing it is a false start, also leave their marks.

**Ruling:** A1 and B1 will be charged with a false start. If it is clear that the movement of A2 and B2 is not simultaneous with, but actually as a result of, the actions of A1 and B1, they would not be charged with a false start. (7-1-6)

22. Situation: Some of the times submitted for seeding purposes are for metric distances, while others are for races at the traditional, or English measurement distances.

**Ruling:** Use the following table to convert "metric times" to their equivalent times at traditional distances. Note: The table shows the conversion from metric to English. To convert from English to metric merely reverse the process, i.e., instead of adding .3 seconds to a 400 metre time, you subtract .3 seconds from a 440 yard time to find the metric time.

**Comment:** 100 metres is longer than 100 yards. 110 metres is virtually the same as 120 yards. All other metric races are shorter than the comparable race at the traditional or English measurement distance.

23. Situation: A school wishes to host a metric meet, but is uncertain as to what events should be included.

**Ruling:** This would vary depending on the usual events included in competition in that state. The following is a list of the generally accepted comparable events.

\* There will be some sentiment to convert the one mile and two mile runs to 1600 and 3200 metres respectively — at both the national and international levels.

**Comment:** There would be no change in the distance between hurdles, or between the starting line and the first hurdle. Any difference in the overall distance of hurdle races would be absorbed in the distance from the final hurdle to the finish line.

24. Situation: In the girls triple jump, one of the competitors does not reach the landing pit. Should the attempt be measured?

Ruling: No — this is an unsuccessful trial. One of the requirements implied in the long and triple jump is that the competitor alight in the landing pit.

**Comment:** Because of the range in ability between senior high school boys and girls and junior high school athletes, the recommended distance between the scratch line (take-off board or area) and the landing pit is 12 feet in the long jump and 32 feet in the triple jump for high school boys and 8 feet and 24 feet respectively for girls and junior high school competition. Facilities utilized by all three classes of competition should include an extra take-off board or scratch line for girls and junior high school competition.

25. Situation: In the 880 Yard Run A1 is bumped by B1 on the first turn causing A1 to fall or break stride. The infraction is immediately signaled by the inspector. Later in the race A1 deliberately or accidentally impedes B1.

Ruling: Both A1 and B1 will be disqualified.

26. Situation: In the pole vault, A1 brushes the crossbar causing it to bounce on the supporting pins and eventually comes to rest with one end resting on the original supporting pin and the other end on a pin below the original crossbar support.

Ruling: An unsuccessful trial. (10-3-2)

27. Situation: Al successfully clears the crossbar, when the released pole (a) hits the upright standard and rebounds back to the runway, (b) the pole pops out of the planting pit and comes to rest beyond the plane of the stopboard, (c) comes to rest (even briefly) against the crossbar or standard, (d) after a momentary delay while the released pole remains vertical, it falls forward into the landing pit.

Ruling: A successful trial in (a) and (b), a failed trial in (c) and (d). (10-3-1)

28. Situation: Al successfully clears the crossbar when the pole catcher, in an attempt to grab the properly released pole, inadvertently knocks it into the crossbar causing it to fall into the pit.

**Ruling:** This should not count as an unsuccessful trial. If it is obvious to the event judge that A1; had successfully cleared the bar and could not have dislodged the bar through his efforts, he could count the attempt as a successful vault. If there is any question in his mind, he should not count is as a miss, but award A1 an additional trial at that height. (10-3-1; 10-3-10)

29. Situation: In the pole vault A1 decides near the end of his approach not to go through with his attempt. In stopping he (a) places his pole in the planting pit, but does not leave the ground (b) the end of his pole breaks the vertical plane of the stopboard, but does not touch the landing pit, or (c) the end of the pole does strike or touch the landing pit beyond the vertical plane of the stopboard. Ruling: Providing A1 does not violate the time limitation, it would not be counted as a trial in either (a) or (b). In (c) it is ruled as an unsuccessful trial. (10-3-2)

30. Situation: Al starts the act of throwing the discus and during preliminary swings, the discus is dropped, falling outside the circle.

Ruling: A1 is charged with a trial which is not measured. (10-7-1)

**31.** Situation: In the girls mile run, A1 is leading and running next to the curb. B1 is in second place and running approximately 2 feet behind A1; and to the right. Runner C1 is in third place and about 5 feet behind A1, approximately 3 feet behind B1, but in an area which would be between them. B1 wishes to move to the inside behind A1 and, as she moves to her left, she slides into C1, who shoves her in an attempt to keep her position.

Ruling: This is a running infraction by B1. Any time a runner in a race run without lanes wishes to cut across the path of an opponent, she must be at least one running stride (about 7 feet) in advance of the runner whose path she is crossing. Since B1 was not sufficiently in advance of C1, she has committed a running violation and shall be disqualified. (8-1-2)

**32.** Situation: In assuming the starting position for the 440 Yard Relay A1 does so with his hands behind the starting line, but permits the baton to touch the track in advance of the starting line.

Ruling: The touching of the baton beyond the starting line is not in itself illegal, as long as no part of the contestants body touches on or over the starting line. (7-1-4)

33. Situation: In the finals of the 220 Yard Dash, there is a spill near the finish which involves runners B1, C1, and D1, who are contesting for second, third and fourth place. A1 finishes first and was in advance of the incident when it occurred. The spill, (a) was or (b) was not the result of a foul.

Ruling: In (a) the referee would disqualify the offender and could order the race re-run with all other contestants entered in the re-run, including A1. In (b) A1 is the winner, with the other places being determined by the order in which the remaining runner finished the race. (8-2-2)

**Comment:** Not every spill results in a disqualification and not every foul calls for the re-running of a race.

34. Situation: In the shot put, A1 is using a rotating technique, similar to the turn in the discus to gain acceleration.

Ruling: Provided the conditions set down in Rule 10-9-1 and 2 are met, this would not be illegal.

35. Situation: The final event in the girls state final track meet is the 440 Yard Relay run in three heats, with the winner and final places determined on the basis of time. In the third heat C2 interferes with D3, causing her to fall. Team C goes on to finish first, Team A and Team E, who were not involved in the interference finish is second and third place while team D finishes fourth. At this point the fastest time was recorded by Team B in the second heat. The referee disgualifies team C and orders all other teams entered in the third heat to re-run the race. On the re-running of the third heat, team A establishes a faster time than the winner of the second heat and is declared the champion. The coach of team B protests that team A, which was not involved in the interference, should not have had the privilege of re-running the race.

Ruling: The referee was faced with a decision as to whether to allow the team interfered with (team D) to re-run the race against time, or to order the re-run of all three of the final heats.

**Comment:** Determining final place winners based on comparative times achieved in two or more heats is never a desirable practice. When the finals are run in three heats, all heats are considered as part of the final heat. When interference occurs in the final heat, "the referee may order a new race between all those in the finals, or between those who, in the referee's opinion, are entitled to the privilege." Team A was not involved in the interference and is no more entitled to this privilege than team B, the winner of the second heat and holder of the fastest time. (8-2-2)

36. Situation: Following the Medley Relay, it is discovered that (a) team D was assigned to the incorrect starting line, resulting in team D running a greater distance than the other teams, or (b) both team D and team C were assigned to incorrect starting lines which resulted in these teams running a greater distance than prescribed. In both instances team D finished first and team C finished last.

Ruling: In (a) the results stand, team A is still the winner, in (b) if this was a qualifying heat team C should be given a chance to qualify in a subsequent heat, or if it is a final heat, the referee may order the race re-run with all of the original teams entered. (8-2-2 and 4-2-2)

37. Situation: In making his approach in the pole vault, A1 discovers his steps are off, and in an attempt to abort the trial, plants the pole in the vaulting box to help him stop. He (a) leaves the ground, but does not break the vertical plane of the upper part of the stopboard, or (b) does not leave the ground.

Ruling: In (a) an unsuccessful trial, in (b) not a violation provided he does not exceed the time limitation. (10-3-2)

38. Situation: In the High Jump, A1 wishes to abort the attempt, but in trying to stop, leaves the ground in sort of a hop, but does not touch the ground or landing area beyond the plane of the crossbar, or the crossbar extended.

Ruling: This is not considered a trial. (10-4-3)

**39. Situation:** In the intermediate hurdles A1 has broken his stride and lost his balance. As he approaches the hurdle, he put out both hands to either prevent himself from falling, or to protect himself from hitting the hurdle. In either case, he pushes over the hurdle and continues on in the race. At the conclusion of the race, this action is reported to the referee by the inspector.

Ruling: If the information supplied to the referee would indicate that A1 was more concerned with protecting himself than in making an attempt to clear the hurdle, or that he gained an unfair advantage by pushing over the hurdle, he would be disqualified. (8-3-1)
