U.S. is assured Italian finalist

ROME (AP) - An American has made it into men's singles final in the Italian Tennis Open for the first time in 17 years. Whether it will be fourth-seeded Brian Gottfried or eight-seeded Vitas Gerulaitis was to be decided in today's semifinals

Gerulaitis ousted the defending champion, top-seeded Adriano Panatta of Italy, 1-6, 7-6, 6-3 in the quarterfinals Friday and Gottfried beat Kim Warwick of Australia 7-5, 6-2

The two have never met before The winner of their match will be the first American finalist in the Rome tournament since Barry McKay won it in 1960.

The \$185,000 tournament has been a Waterloo for the leading seeded players in both men's and women's divisions. For the men, besides Panatta, the quarter-finals saw the elimination of Romanian star Ilie Nastase, twice a winner here, and seeded No. three He was beaten by Phil Dent of Australia
