It's record-breaking day in MEEC track

The crashing noises coming from Kearsley High's track Tuesday night were just the sounds of records breaking in the Mid-Eastern Eight Conference track meet.

All existing records in the girls events were broken and 12 of 16 boys events saw records smashed.

Montrose ended its two-year stay in the MEEC by winning its second consecutive championship in both boys' and gris' competition.

Coach Bril Kebiler's Rains took the boys title with 53 points. Hamady was second with 49 followed by Byron with 15%, Goodrich 33, Atherton 29, New Lothrop 22½, and Bendle and Holy Posary with 12 apiece

In the girls' competition Montrose again out-distanced Hamady for the second year, 76-69. Bendle was third with 22 points followed by Goodrich, 16, Atherton 13, Holy Rosary 10, New Lothrop 9, and Byron 8

ATHERTON'S JOHN DARGA led the assault on the record book for the thooys with victories in the mile and 880. Montrose's Dave Cole took the long tamp and also anchored the Rams Standard-setting 880 and mile relay teams for the double winners.

Hamady's tabulous Laurie Byrd was the outstanding performer of the meet with victories in the 110 yard hurdles, high jump, tong jump and she also anchored the Hawks' mile relay sound.

Byrd's teammate Tanet DeNicolo was a double winner with victories in the 880 and mile and she also ran on the mile relay quartet.

The Rams' overall strength was too much though. Pallastean Harris took the 100 and 220 yard dashes and ran on the 880 relay squad. Christy Webber picked up a pair of victories in the discus and shot put.

Montrose's other victory in the boys' competition came from Jett Glann in the pole vault with a 12-6 mark.

Goodrich picked up three first places. Barry Adkins took the high jump with a 6-4% effort. Kipp Owen set a new record in the 100 yard dash with a time of 10-38 and the relay team of Owen. Eric Schrader, Jim Albrecht and Rod Wood won the 440 relay.

BYRON AND HAMADY each took two first places. Keith Maylum of Byron surprised the defending champ in the 330 low hurdles. Don York of Hamady, with a 38.71 showing while York finished second at 39.42. Both times beat last year's record of 40.10.

York got his revenge in the 120 high hurdles however by edging Maylum out 14.71 to a 15.16 clocking. Joel Hollenback was Byron's other winner with a 52.51 time in the 440. The Hawks' Tim Forte raced to a 23.30 victory in the 220 to erase the 23.67 mark of last year.

shattered the old discus mark of 131-6 with a heave of 146 feet. Jett Baldwin was Bendle's fone winner with a 10:17.6 time for the two mile.

In the 880 and mile relays Montrose's teams, anchored by Cole, set new records. The mile was made up of Rick Beardslee, Andy Bragg, Andy Pyrc and Cole while the 880 squad consisted of Rob Robinson, Phil Green, Shannon Destrampe and Cole.

CATHY MARKLAND'S RAMS won their sixth straight league championship. Montrose and Hamady tied for the most first places with six each but the Rams took seven seconds while the Hawks got only three.

Liz Greene won the 440 for Montrose and also ran on the victorious 880 yard relay team. Greene ran a 61.04 to shatter the old mark of 64.84 and ran the second leg of the relay team consisting of Harris, Media Bragg and Kris Podulka.

Montrose nearly swept all the relay events but was edged by one one-hundreth of a second in both events. Hamady took the mile relay with a time of 4:13.98 to 4:13.99 for the Rams.

The Hawks' winning squad consisted of Ann Wyczalek, Melissa Cook, DeNicolo and Byrd. In the 440 relay it was Goodrich's turn to nip Montrose. Cathy Pilon, Jenny Allen, Sue Nylander and Pat Syrek made up the team which ran a 52.13 to a 52.14 for the Rams

Mary Mullally was host Holy Rosary's lone victor with a 12:03.8 clocking in the two-mile which broke the old record of 12:35.71
