Fans get a kick out of Boyd's

two-mile victory in FP track

Standing ovations for two-mile runners are rare, but all of the 2,000 fans were on their feet when Mirian Boyd crossed the finish line Saturday.

Boyd turned in one of the many outstanding performances in the first Free Press Girls State Invitiational Track Meet at Warren Fitzgerald High Saturday.

Just a week after winning the state Class A mile and twomile runs, Boyd recorded her second best time ever in the two mile when she covered the distance in 10 minutes, 39.4 seconds.

"I was a little too fast at the beginning," the Port Huron junior said. "After a couple of laps I started slowing down so I was able to turn it on the last lap."

BOYD REALLY didn't need much of a kick at the end. She was well in front of the field.

"I started pulling away about the third lap," she said. "I'm just glad I didn't have to run the mile today because after the two mile, you don't care how fast you run in the mile."

Another outstanding performance was turned in by Delisa Walton, a junior at Detroit Mackenzie who holds the state record in the 440- and 880-yard runs.

Walton gracefully strided away from the rest of the field and turned in a 54.8 guarter. She also anchored the winning 880 "I thought we started out too slow, and then I got boxed in on the second lap and that got me mad. So I just took off after that."

"I had some trouble in the 880 relay because I just can't come out sprinting," said Walton, who set a national record in the 880 a week ago.

TRACY ARION, a junior from Linden, wasn't very optimistic before the meet, but she ran away with the mile, recording a personal best of 5:10.1.

"I didn't think I had much of a chance to win this," she admitted after the race. "But when we got here my coach told me he thought I had a good chance of winning.

"I thought we started out too slow, and then I got boxed in on the second lap and that got me mad. So I just took off after that.

"I would have liked to have run a 5:09 but I'm very surprised and very happy. I just hope I can come back next year and do even better."

FP girls track gets warm reception

You don't gain perfection the first time around, but the first Free Press State Girls Invitational Track and Field Championships Saturday proved a satisfying beginning.

Some 2,000 fans came out on a near-perfect day for the sport to see the cream of Michigan's girl track stars step through their paces at Warren's Fitzgerald High.

There was a delightful 12mile-an-hour wind out of the southwest which probably hurt a couple of the distance performances, but as a whole the meet was well accepted by both the 300 girls from all sections of the state who competed and the fans who responded with a half-dozen standing ovations,

Mackenzie's Delisa Walton, who set a national record last week for Mackenzie High in the state Class A championships, stepped a lively 54.8 in the 440, three-tenths of a second off her own state record.

Molly Brennan of Waterford finished third in the 100yard dash and then came back to win the 220 in 25 seconds flat.
