One of Pozega's most consistent joint scorers in a three-year varsity

areer has been Marcus Sanders. In today's Detroit News listing of utstanding performances throughbut the state, Sanders shares the astest 100-yard dash in 9.6 seconds

with Don Anderson of Detroit Cody.

Ten years ago, in 1971, Marshall Dill of Detroit Northern posted the same time of 9.6 for the current state Class A record (a mark can only be established in the state inals). It was equalled two years ater by Reggie Jones of Saginaw.

SANDERS, a 5-foot-10, 135pound senior, also tops the 440 listing in 47.9 seconds. Anderson shares the third fastest time with James Johnson of Detroit Cooley in 49.0.

Arch rival Anderson has accounted for the fastest 220, a 21.6, while Sanders shares sixth best of 22.4 with three others.

But most significant in the Sanders camp is that Marcus has turned in his best performance in the high jump with a leap of 23 feet, 634 inches - only 4% inches shy of the current state Class A record of 28-11, set in 1972 by John Ross of Detroit Mackenzie and equalled the following year by Kelsey Johnson of Detroit Osborn.

This is where Pozega's hunch on Sanders could be disputed.

"I'm figuring that if he wins a state title, it is more apt to happen in the 440," explained the Sexton coach. "You see, Sanders is most consistent in that event. But in the long jump he's been up and down. good for distance one day and short the next time.

"SO IN THE state meet we will have him concentrate on the 440. not the long jump. He's simply convinced me during the regular season that he has the speed to win the 440 crown.

"In the state meet a high school athlete only has one crack at a title. So we figure that Sanders will do his finest in the 440 when the showdown comes (Saturday, May 30, at Flint Northwestern High's Guy Houston Stadium)."
