

# Indiana track stars shine

FORT WAYNE, Ind. (AP) — Indiana's Don Young and Rod Woodson each won two running events Saturday, but overall balance carried Michigan to the team championship for the fifth time in the 10-year history of the Midwest Track and Field Meet of Champions.

The annual meet at Fort Wayne matches the top high school seniors from Indiana, Michigan, Illinois and Ohio. Michigan's girls also won on Saturday, their fourth title in as many years.

Young, the Indiana 100 and 200-meter winner from state champion Gary Roosevelt, won both of those events and was a member of Indiana's winning 400-meter relay team.

Woodson, Indiana's high and low-hurdle champion the past two years from Fort Wayne Snider, also won both of his specialties. His time of 35.8 in the 300-meter low was a meet record and an all-time best by an Indiana high school runner, and it will be submitted as a possible national record. It was a hand-held clocking.

Woodson was named boys' outstanding performer in the running events. His meet record broke the former mark of 36.36 by Derrick Simons of Muskegon, Mich., last year.

Scott Reed of Lansing Everett, Mich., and Rick Jordan of Wheaton Northern, Ill., were named out-

standing field performers. Reed set a meet record with a leap of 7-feet, 3/4-inch in the high jump. That broke a five-year-old record of 6-11 1/4 by Fort Wayne Concordia's Brent Bullemeier.

Jordan also set a meet record at 61.7 1/2 in the shot put, breaking the former mark of 61.4 by Mike Lehman of Oak Lawn, Ill., in 1978.

Other winners for Michigan were Rodney Benson, Detroit Cass Tech, in the 400; P.J. Osika, Waterford Kettering, 800; and Scott Crawford, Dearborn, long jump.

The Michigan boys totaled 155 points to runnerup Indiana's 134. Illinois was third at 103, and Ohio was fourth at 60 points. Michigan's girls won with 57 points. Illinois had 47, Ohio 36 and Indiana 33.

Karen Sapp of Michigan's Temperance Bedford set a meet record in the shot put at 45 feet, 1/2-inch. She was named the girls' star of stars.

Other winners in the girls' events — only six events were contested — were Davera Taylor, Thornton, Ill., in the 100; Shelly Jorgenson, New Lexington, Ohio, in the high jump; Janice Rowley of Michigan in the 100-hurdles; Theresa Dunn of Springfield Catholic, Ohio, in the 800; and Michigan in the 1,600-relay.
