The contrast between pre-season predictions and post-season reviews always makes for some moving prose usually about the fulfillment of dreams or the heartbreak of near-misses.

The boys and girls track seasons provided ample instances of both: Waterford Kettering's P.J. Osika overcoming his disappointment with second place in the 800-meter run at the state meet to win the Midwest Meet of Champions; Pontiac Northern's Lisa McCoy winning four events at the regional and Oakland County meet; John McCleary's win in the 800 at the state meet and Brother Rice teammate Joe Davey's second-place finish at the same meet; the crestfallen look of South-field's Glen Williams after Terry Whitt held on in the mile relay to win the regional meet for Rochester and, in contrast, William's elation at placing second in the 110-meter hurdles at the Class A championships.

What follows is a special mention of the boy and girl athletes who made the track meets memorable, in Oakland and beyond.

Boys team

■ 100-meter dash Robert Hess, Rochester: Had the county's best 100-meter time this season best 100-meter time this season — 10.8. After a strong start, a leg injury hampered him late in the year. Though he didn't duplicate his pair of fifth place finishes at last year's state meet (in 100 and the long jump), he's still one of the county's top sprinters and long jumpers and a valuable relay team runner.

Next year, he'll be running for Eastern Michigan University's fine track team.



ond-place finish at the Class A state meet with a throw of 160-8.


