Reds win regional

Port Huron, Huskies finish 1-2 in A meet

There is strength in numbers, but a few doses of talent will go a lot farther at a regional high school track competition

Port Huron High's small band of competitors rode two relay victories and three individual championships to the school's first Class A regional title since 1971.

The Big Reds, who could probably put their entire team into three Volkswagons, totaled 96 points in the 18-team meet to outdistance crosstown rival Port Huron Northern by more

than 30 points.

The Huskies were second with 64½ points, while Sterling Heights Stevenson was third with 59.

Stevenson won the girls title with 93 points. Sterling Heights was second with 51 points, followed by Eastern Michigan League champ Anchor Bay

Port Huron Northern tied Clintondale for fifth place with 35 points. Port Huron won two relays to finish ninth with 29 points.

The top three places in each event advance to the state meet, which means Port Huron will send its largest delegation to the grand finale in several years.

"We just peaked at the right time and we've been getting some help in the field events lately," said Lowell Spiess, who last won a regional title in 1980 as coach of defunct Port Huron Central.

Eric Boldon, D'Wan Lindsay and Cliff Johnson qualified in four events for Port Huron. Boldon won the long jump, fin-ished second in 400 meters to all-planet runner Omar Davidson of Mount Clemens, and ran legs of the Big Reds' winning 800- and 1,600-meter relays.

Boldon ran a personal best of 49.23 in the 400 but Davidson, a University of Michigan recruit, ran an amazing 47.11. He has already qualified for two national meets.

Boldon also won the long jump with a 21-7 effort. Johnson set a school record with a 38.55 winning time in the 300 meter hurdles. Lindsay was third in the 100 and 200 meters.

Johnson, Boldon, Jeff Kerr and Lindsay ran a 1:29.15 to win the 800-meter relay. That is the area's best time by a full two seconds.

The 1,600-relay quartet of

Johnson, Kerr, Cass Eccles and Bolden ran a 3:24.8, about five seconds better than the closest competition in the Blue Water Area

The Big Reds' other individual first went to Chris Floyd, who won the 110-meter hurdles in a time of 14.61. Floyd has run 14.42 this season, which puts him among the best in the

Port Huron also got a big lift from Steve Wisniewski who picked up a third in discus with a 139-9. John Luyt of Anchor Bay won with a 146-9.

John Fleet and Jim Taylor led Northern's impressive showing with a first in the pole vault and high jump, respectively.
Fleet had a 13-1 Saturday.

Taylor cleared 6-5 in his event.

King Thomasson also grabbed a second in the 200 meters for Northern with a


