THE TWENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL MITCA TRACK CLINIC

It was a very excellent clinic. Marty Crane, Flint Beecher, and 1984 President of MITCA, was in charge of the arrangements. The setting was the Flint Hyatt Regency. He gathered some extremely knowledgeable Track and Field Coaches, who spoke and demonstrated their specialties.

Mike Shine discussed the long hurdle races and also presented an excellent "Learn by Doing Session" on race starting.

Tony Naclerio, Iona College: was to have been on the program to discuss "The Up Down Check-T-Shot Put Technique". Unfortunately, a death in his family, necessitated his cancellation. Fortunately, Marty Crane was able to substitute Ted McGaughlin, Southern Medthodist University.

Steve Cooksey, U. S. Naval Academy, was in charge of discussions on the high jump. Loren Seagrave, Louisiana State University, talked on "Plyometrics and Power Sprint Drills".

Dr. Phil Henson, Indiana University, presented information dealing with "The Coaching of the Multiple Event Athlete".

Don Lukens and Micky Turcheck, reviewed their previous presentation on "The Lydiard System", and then went more deeply into the coaching methods of Arthur Lydiard. In closing, they demonstrated "Micky Turcheck's Eight Minute Drill".

A special session for Junior High Track Coaches was conducted under the direction of Marty Crane. There were about 35 people in attendance and it proved to be very helpful. #### THE CHUCK SWEENEY AWARD - - - - NINTH ANNUAL

This prestigious award was established in 1977 to honor a man who had contributed much to track and field and cross country in the State of Michigan. His work with MITCA as a treasure, from its inception to 1973, was invaluable.

Coach Sweeney began his coaching career at Imlay City in 1934 and then moved to Lansing in 1943. He had 14 State Championships in football, track and cross country and was a member of the Michigan Coaches "Hall of Fame."

Chuck retired from coaching in in 1969 and moved to Florida. MITCA was saddened to hear of Sweeney's death in Florida on November 20th, 1984.

"You can get more out of a man when you ask him to do some-thing than by telling him he has got to do it!" That was the motto of Coach Charles "Chuck" Sweeney.

By the way, Coach Sweeney was the only three year consecutive Class "A" State Champion Coach in cross country. His Lansing Eastern teams won in 1955, 1956 and 1957.

<u>CROSS COUNTRY COURSES</u>

Your newsletter writer has been in attendance at a State Cross Country Championship Run, every year, since 1953. I've-attended college-runs at the Uni. of Indiana [4], Lehigh Uni, Uni of Ill. (2), Notre Dame, Uni. of Minn., Denton Texas, Uni. of Mich., Michigan State, Central Mich. Western Mich and Eastern Mich. Uni. Also a National AAU Meet at Houston and a National TAC at Boston . I firmly believe that I have a good knowledge of how a cross country course should be set up.

Contrary to the opinons of some people. I think the course at the Dama Farms Golf Course for the State Class "A" meet in 1984 was as good a course as we have had anywhere for a state meet. I made seven trips to Dama Farms from Royal (a distance of 50 miles) to set up the course. Bob Bloomer Traveled hundreds of miles also to work on the course, plus trips to Brighton to confer with the athletic dept. of that school which was hosting the State Championship Meet.

Complaint---The course was too flat. The State was lucky to have the Dama Farms Golf Course. It was the only one availto Brighton. The chances are that the complainers never went over the course. What were we supposed to do? Bring in bull-dozers and build hills and valleys.

Complaint---The runners were too far away from the spectators when they were at the south end of the course. Thank heavens the runners had the chance to get away from the crowd for part of the run. You have had the same situation at Sturgis, Grand Blanc, Flint, holly, Oxford to name a few.

Complaint---The chute was too small. Complaint---We didn't follow-the prescribed formula for setting up a chute. One foot for each runner in the race. How many of you have heard of any formula such as this. We had 209 runners in the boys "A" race. What did they want??? One chute 209 feet long or 209 chutes each 1 foot long. I'm confused.

The chute at the State Meet was 75 feet from the finish line to the mouth of the chute. We had a triple chute 140 feet long which is a total space of 420 feet, room enough to put all of the runners in the chute if no-one left it.

The Michigan/High School Athletic Asso. in their publications have indicated that instuctions will be given for chute workers. My question is - - who is going to prepare these instructions. I believe every cross country race is very different from all of the others, and that it is not possim: ble to set up a prescribed pattern to follow. The problem arises when runners stop and walk as soon as they cross the finish line. Also many of the chute workers are there for the first time and have never worked a meet before.

Coaches do some work on getting your runners to continue running through the chute. If a runner is on the verge of collapse, move him out of the chute and have people available to take the runners place, going through the chute to pick up his finish card for him.

Potentially, the State Class "A" meet could have36 teams in the race., in 1985.

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Co-ed teams? A.D.'s say no

Tribuer Sports Writer On Friday night the basketball fans pack the high school gymnasium, the band clamors loudly and the cheerleaders yell: "Go Brian! Go Tom! Go Marcia!" Marcia? That's right, Marcia!

If Oakland County high school athletic directors follow the recommendations of a recent study, several prep teams will become co-ed - something

that women have fought to avoid for nearly a century. It doesn't seem likely, since few A.D.'s agreed with the recommendations offered by the Oakland County Project on Equal Education Rights (PEER) study committee at Thursday's monthly meeting of the county A.D.'s. Included in the disgruntled group was Ferndale A.D. Donna Giltrow, who said the study

based conclusions on misconceptions. "Our main interest in doing the study was to strive for sex equity in education," said Joyce Krause, one of the five all-female members of the PEER committee and the only task force member with a background in physical education or athletics. Previously the committee studied sex equity in two

educational fields - vocational education and the

The athletics study, which was sponsored by the National Organization for Women Legal Defense and Education Fund, reported that for all of the 20,240 Loucation Fund, reported that for all of the 20,240 high school athletes competing in 25 of the county's school districts during the 1983-84 school year, only 7,649 (or 37.8 percent — slightly off from the reported 40.0 percentage) were females. "Girls are just 40 percent of the athletes partici-pating in our high school sports and they receive about 40 percent of the budget," said Cynthia Goldberg, a PEER member.

The actual county average of \$7.8 percent female participants in interscholastic sthletics is a bit higher than the state average of \$7.9... a figure that PEER member Elizabeth Giese, a former NOW chairperson for the state of Michigan, said was reported for Michigan in 1983-84 in a book published by the National High School Athletic Association.

According to another PEER committee member, Terry Ryan, "The problem really is that there isn't any hoopla for girls sports. The boys get the band and the cheerleaders but you don't see anything like that for the girls — like the basketball team.

for the girls — like the basketball team. "What we are suggesting is that when selecting sport teams we should concentrate more on skill level rather than gender," Ryan added. "Rather than having a boys basketball team and a girls basketball team, we should have an 'A' team and a 'B' team where boys and girls play co-ed and one team will be comprised of more skilled players and the other of less skilled players." less skilled players.

"At this stage of the game," said Royal Oak district A.D. Chuck Jones, "if we switch to co-ed basketball; volleyball, baseball and track, who's going to lose? Not the boys."

Along with the data compiled concerning sex equity in athletics, the PEER report offered several recommendations, such as:

1. Co-ed teams whenever possible to assure girls receiving benefits of support groups (booster clubs, band, cheerleaders, etc.) 2. Oakland County should be a leader in the state

by pushing for boys and girls sports to be played in the same season because fan interest in the girls athletics will improve. 3. Boys should be offered volleyball so that interest.

4. Since the Michigan High School Athletic Associa-

(This is to compensate for the reported fact that in the winter, there is a greater variance of girls participation because dnly 850 girls play sports compared to 2,031 boys.)

influx of teams, primarily women's teams. But I have not one more locker room, not one more gym. not Nothing new has been built." Hazel Park A.D. Dan Grant said, "My facility was built in 1960. Maintaining existing facilities is a daily

struggle.

Retired Farmington Hills A.D. Jack Cotton added." "We have asked A.D.s to double their programs but we have given them single facilities and single budgets. The people here today have done a hell of a job accomodating all of our teams under those conditions.

ТНЕ MENTAL GAME

In every athletic contest, at every level - - from beginner through professional - - the key factor affecting consistency of performance is the MENTAL GAME. Some ath-letes almost always come through in clutch situations, while others almost never do. There are some who never give up, but many who give up too easily. Attitude makes the difference; the mentally prepared are winners!

I coach's greatest challenge in working with athletes is to help them build the attitudes that will motivate them to do their best. But the truly superior athlete, the dependable performers, don't depend on a coach for motivation; they generate the desire to achieve within themselves. No one has to motivate Pete Rose to "hustle"." No one needs to give Dr "J" or George Brett a "pep talk." No one must urge Isiah Thomas to "try harder." Athletes of their calibre are masters of self-motivation.

What is self-motivation? An attitude. A state of mind. A refusal to give less than your best. Self-motivation is the heart of THE MENTAL GAME, coming easily to some, while others must work hard to acquire it. But self-motivation can be acquired!

One method of acquiring positive qualities is to associate with people who already have them. An individual with ambition and the desire to be a winner should associate with winners and learn from them. A winner's attitudes and be-havior are contagious and can inspire others to seek high aspirations.

<u>SWEAT UNIFORMS</u> Why do so many cross country runners and track and field athletes go out to warm up for a work-out or meet without sweat clothes. If you say some-thing to them you get the stock answer - "its warm out". The temperature is in the 50's and 60's. You perspire. It evaporates. When a liquid evaporates it must obtain heat. Oakland County high school athletic directors will address that topic today at their monthly meeting along with the results of the Project on Equal Education Rights (PEER) study which measured the participation of females and males in the county's interscholastic sports programs. A speaker from PEER, a project of the National Organization for Women

Legal Defense and Education Fund, is scheduled to present the results of the 1984-85 study in which the number of males and females on each of the county's junior varsity and varsity high school teams during the 1983-64 school year was tallied and a participation percentage derived.

Idealistically, if a school district has an enroliment of 50 percent males and 50 percent females, equality in the sports program should follow suit with 50 percent athletic participation by both sexes.

Throughout Oakland County the comparison of females to males in the sports programs was 40 to 60 percent, shy of the 50-50 goal. Yet the figure is higher than the state average where 63 percent males and 37 percent females are involved in interscholastic sports.

The report examined a

single school year, which may make it difficult to draw an accurate analysis, according to Hoyal Oak School District A.D. Chuck Jones.

"Participation in any area goes in a trend," said Jones, who is also the A.D. at Kimball High. "We have 55 girls on our swim team this season and we had just 24 on it last year. That happens with all sports, boys and girls."

Participation in girls athletics has increased dra-matically since Title IX, the federal law guaranteeing equal opportunity in education, passed in 1972. "When I started teaching at (Royal Oak) Dondero

15 years ago there wasn't a single interscholastic girls sport," said Dondero athletic director Jerry Barich. sport," Since Title IX passed I've never seen anything rise as quickly as girls sports. And they're still getting bigger.'

The summary of the PEER report suggested three areas that need to be addressed in Uakland County athletics:

1. The fewer opportunities girls have to participate in junior varsity sports. 2. The fewer opportunities for girls to play sports in

the winter.

3. The smaller number of participants on the teams

for some girls sports. Some of the recommendations to improve these areas may not be feasible in Oakland County school

districts, according to several area A.D.s. One of the PEER recommendations to improve athletic opportunities for girls in the winter is to move the girls high school basketball season from the fall to the winter to coincide with the boys as a traditional season for the sport. To do this, the report

raditional season for the sport. To do this, the report suggested that girls volleyball be switched to the fail. Michigan is one of only four states that play girls high school basketball in the fall.

there would be no com-petition from other sports for facilities. Changes in girls sports scheduling might also have other beneficial side effects such as greater fan support than presently experienced with non-traditional scheduling of girls sports."

Ferndale High A.D. Donna Giltrow, who is also the volleyball coach at the school, said, "Selfishly speaking as a vol-leyball coach, I'd like to have volleyball in the fall because no one fights for the gym. But realistically, as an athletic direc-tor, it is difficult to run two of the same sports in the same season. "It would also be dif-

ficult because we'd have to find more coaches. Gittrow explained. "Several of our sports have a

entry over of coaches. We do feel the need to have more women coaches." Currently, according to the report, only 13 percent.

of the county's coaches are females. The situation at Hazel Park High is much the same,

according to A.D. Dan Grant. "Our coaching staff is predominantly male though we do have some excellent women coaches on the staff," said Grant, "There are qualified women in staff." athletics and with Title IX I believe the that we are just beginning to see the evolution of female coaches. More of the female coaches coming to us now have high school or college athletic experience and we are just beginning to see the effects of that."

Since Title IX was implemented in the 1975-76 school year, the female students of that era are just now beginning to filter back into the schools as teachers, though few districts are hiring new teach-

ers. "We go out of our way to get women coaches. And overall I feel the school districts are trying to do the best they can per dollar and per student," said Royal Uak's Jones. "Some of the recommendations they are asking for are physically impossible."

The clipping at the left and the one on the next page is provacative and possibly it will engender some good discussion on the part of coaches, men and women.

1, for one, am of the opinion that we should have more girls out for cross country and track. It is very discouraging for athletes and coaches to be unable to attend the State Championships because several teams were not able to field full teams.

The articles insinuate that girls are being treated unfairly, because there are more boys out for sports than there are girls. The schools and coaches are not restricting girls from trying out for the teams. There is nothing to keep a girl from reporting when the call is made to report for the first practice at the start of the season. Girls certainly can not be forced to report.

This situation does not apply at all schools. There are many institutions that have excellent turn-outs. I'm sure there are some schools that have more girls running cross country than they have boys, and I think that is fine.

The question of co-ed teams was presented. How many girls could run on a boys cross country team or track team? How many girls could compete on the basketball team, the soccer team, the swimming team, baseball team, etc. The girls would be completely eliminated. That certainly would not be fair.

A school has one gymnasium. How could they possibly field a boys' varsity team, a girls' varsity team, reserve teams for both boys and girls and freshman teams for both of the bous and airls?

I also think there should be more women coaches. We have some very excellent ones, but there should be more. There are some that are coaching both the boys and the girls teams, and doing excellent jobs.

And, why don't we have some women starters for track and cross country? I know of only one. Joy Buhagier worked with me at two Invitational Track Heets that were sponsored by Port Huron Northern.

THE KERMIT N. AMBROSE AWARD

A very fine gentleman, who has contributed much to cross country over the years, was the recipiant of this award. George Bruder, Fennville High School, started his teaching career at Chester, Illinois and coached some tennis. This was in the early 50's. He spent three years at Taylorville helping with a football program.

George came to Fennville in 1958. He started the cross country program at Fennville in 1960 and he managed the first Fennville Cross Country Open in 1961. Races are help for all grades from kindergarden on up. Grades K-6 run about 3/4 of a mile. 7th § 8th graders will run about 1½ miles. There is also a race for 9th graders from Junior Highs. They run a distance of 24 miles. There are five races for high school boys and three races for girls. There is also competition for runners above high school. This is known as the "Oldtimers Race." The run a 10K, a 5K and a 2½K. George has had as many as 2000 runners at his meet. In recent years the number of runners has decreased due to the fact that it has become too expensive for some schools to use bus transportation which enabled them to carry large numbers of runners.

George and his wife Joyce were married 28 years ago and they three daughters. Joyce, the oldest, is the girls track coach at Lake Forest, Illinois. Joyce has also been the starter at the Fennville Cross Country Open the past few years. Jean is at school at Michigan State and Jane is attending Western Michigan Uni.

# **These Records May Never Fall**

The records that were made to be broken but may never be topped are the Drake Relays marks in events run in imperial (yards) distances prior to Drake converting to a metric track.

Now that American track is in step with the rest of the world in contesting races on 400-meter ovals, metric distances are replacing the yard races at most meets.

What has happened is that races in many cases have been shortened by a few yards. Where the distance is comparable, records can be nearly judged equally

Where the difference is wide or the metric distance is longer than the imperial distance, comparisons can not be made.

For example, the 100-meter dash is equal to 109.4 vards. Therefore, times for 100 yards and 100 meters can not be compared. Also, a mile is 119.6 yards longer than 1,500 meters, making comparisons impossible.

However, those who ran 220, 440 and 880 yards covered a distance somewhat longer than the present 200, 400 and 800 meters and those times can be examined together.

In 1970, Brigham Young's Ralph Mann ran the 400-yard intermediate hurdles in 49.4 seconds for a Drake Relays record. The 400-meter race is shorter by 2.6 yards or 7.668 feet.

If Mann could run a longer distance faster than the present-day runners, his mark should be the Relays record even though he ran 440 yards. Confusing? Let an expert explain

Says Garry Hill, managing editor of Track and Field News, the bible of the sport of track: "It's merely a response to the realities of the situation. To do it any other way would fly in the face of logic.'

Hill also used Mann to illustrate his point.

"He was not timed at the 400-meter point, so we don't actually have a 400 time for him," Hill continued. "However, even if he were moving at the speed of light, there would be some time differential between the two points (400 meters and 440 yards).

"With the 440 time being slower (logically a longer distance), we therefore know that . . . if he ran (49.4 at the 440 point, he was certainly no worse than :49.4 at the 400 point. Obviously, he was faster, but :49.4 is a certifiable time for that distance.

It all means that Mann's :49.4 in the 440-yard intermediate hurdles in 1970 will stand as the Drake Relays record until someone runs 400 meters faster than that. When that happens, Mann's 440-yard mark will stand as that event's record forever.

What the Drake Relays is trying to do is preserve its top accomplishments and continue the tradition of its track and field meet.


