Lansing Sexton, A.A. Pioneer win state track titles

ALMA, Mich. — Standing on the sidelines Saturday afternoon, Cliff Dwelle had exhaustion etched across his brow, but he

started to smile.

The Lake Orion senior had just set a Michigan record (4 minutes, 12.9 seconds) in winning the Class A state title in the 1,600-

meter run. The old mark was 4:13.1.
"It hurt." he said. "but it hurt good."

IT WAS like competing in an outdoor sauna, but Dwelle had been certain of his race's outcome: he and Todd Williams of Monroe dueling, stride for stride, toward the

finish line, his superior kick being the differ-

He was right by one-tenth of a second. Williams (4:13.0) also was under the old record and won the 3,200 meters in 9:01.4 to

break his own state record of 9:11.63.

"I almost fell," Dwelle said, referring to an incident on the last lap when he and Williams were trying to overtake John Gill of

Ferndale.

"He cut me right off going into the turn,"

Dwelle said of Gill, "and I had to put my arm
out to keep from falling down."

COREY PRYOR of Jackson ran 10.4 for 100 meters to break the state record (10.5) and later won the 200 meters (21.37).

Two records fell in girls' events. Cheryl Pruitt of Detroit Henry Ford won the 400-meter dash in 55.6 (the old mark 55.9), and Lisa Waite of Ann Arbor Pioneer threw the discus 140 feet, 3 inches (the old mark 136-7).

Detroit Country Day, Ann Arbor Pioneer, Flint Beecher and Lansing Sexton are becoming synonymous with winning in Michigan high school track.

Country Day, coached by George Prosperi, won its fourth consecutive girls' state championship Saturday

in the Class C meet at Bangor.

Class A Pioneer and Class B Beecher also won state girls' championships — for the third consecutive year — and Sexton won the boys' Class A title for the second year in a row.

The Beecher boys kept pace with the girls by winning the B title at Sturgis High School. The Beecher girls set three Class B relay records and the boys set one.

The other state champions were: (Boys) Detroit Lutheran West in Class C and Detroit East Catholic in Class D; and (girls) Akron-Fairgrove in Class D.

With the 1987 track season over, here are the highlights from Saturday championships.

Overall records: Corey Pryor of Jackson High won 100yard dash in 10.4 to break the overall record of 10.5 shared by Terry McDaniels of Class A Saginaw in 1982, Andreas Laut of Class B Dexter in 1980 and Larry Jordan of Class D Detroit De Porres in 1980.

Cliff Dwelle of Lake Orion High won the 1,600 meters in 4:12.9 to break the overall record of 4:13.1 set by Jeff Wilson of Flint Kearsley in 1984.

Lisa Waite of Pioneer 140-3 discus toss broke the Class A record of 136-7 set by Michelle Pfeiffer of Davison in 1980.

Beecher's 400-meter relay of Daphney Terry, Yolanda Jones, Michelle Westbrook and Twynette Wilson ran 49.02 to break the Class B mark of 49.1 set by their own school in 1980.

Wilson, Jones, Westbrook and Pretoria Wilson ran 1:41.82 in the 800-meter relay to break another record held by Beecher — 1:42.7 set in 1981. And Beecher's 1,600-meter relay of Twynette and Pretoria Wilson, Westbrook and Ayuna Harrison ran 3:55.64 to break the Class B record of 3:59.20 set by Beecher in 1985.

Akron-Fairgrove's 3,200-meter relay of Michelle Brown, Theresa Bischoff, Yvonne Siler and Robin Aldrich ran 9:52.30 to break the Class D record of 9:54:04 set by Fowler last year.

Triple winners: Rory Stace of Galesburg-Augusta won the long jump (23-2), 100 dash (10:81.2) and the high jump (6-7) in Class C.
