

Meet Director **Craig Fuller** can't seem to get away from the Bennett Relays. In 1974 he won the mile run at the Relays for Class B Mt. Pleasant. In 1981-82 he coached Mt. Pleasant Sacred Heart Academy to third and second place finishes in Class D. From 1983-85 Fuller was meet director, and now he's back for his sixth year, his third in a row. He is currently the Chippewas' assistant coach.

**Brad Fairchlid** will help organize the Relays as assistant director. Fairchild is a 1990 graduate of Ferris State University and joined the CMU women's track program as an assistant coach working with weight events, fall conditioning and meet management. He is also pursuing a master's degree in sports administration.

Jed Hopfensperger has been associated with the Bennett Relays since he was a student at CMU in the late 1970s. He will serve again as course clerk. He has also filled a number of other positions in past years. Hopfensperger, currently of Midland, qualified for the Olympic trials in 1984 in three events the 5,000- and 10,000-meter runs and the marathon.

Geraldine Jackson is the meet referee for the third consecutive year. Jackson is the coordinator of athletics for the Detroit Recreation Department. She has been a sports official for 33 years and has refereed track and field extensively throughout the state, including State meets and Detroit Public Schools championships. Jackson is a member of the Association of Track Officials of Michigan.

Dear Student Athlete,


Welcome to the 53rd annual Central Michigan University Lyle Bennett Relays track meet. It gives me great pleasure to welcome you to this outstanding event.



**Champion Girls Class A Greenville** 

Greenville's superiority in the relays and Mt. Pleasant's depth separated them from the Girls Class A field. Leslee Lake led Greenville to its first Bennett Relays Championship with wins in the 100-M Dash, Sprint Medley Relay and 1600-M Relay. Mt. Pleasant, the home crowd's favorite, placed 3 athletes each in the 100-M Hurdles and High Jump, but couldn't catch Greenville. Sarnia St. Patricks, one of 8 teams from Ontario and Ohio to enter the Girls Class A Relays, finished third.



**Champion Boys Class A Flint Kearsley** 

Distance runner Gary Kinnee paced Flint Kearsley to its first ever title over 10 time champion Lansing Sexton, ending Sexton's two year winning streak. Ann Arbor Huron edged Cadillac 56 - 55 for third place. Kinnee won the 3200-M Run, The 1600-M Run, and led Kearsley to a win in the Distance Medley Relay. Detroit Mumford showed up with a squad of sprinters, snatching the 400-M Relay and Sprint Medley Relay, but Sean McKillop of Bluevale (an Ontario school) won the competitive 100-M Dash.

#### **Champion Girls Class B Hillsdale**

Hillsdale won only one event but took 4 second places while topping a competitive field in Girls Class B. Hillsdale did well in both sprints and distances, and beat Flint Beecher in the 400-M Relay by 1/100th of a second. The high jump was an officials' nightmare, as 7 jumpers reached 4-6 with identical misses, forcing a 7-way tie for sixth place and the awarding of <sup>6</sup>/<sub>7</sub> of a point to each team involved. Beecher ended up second, followed by Corunna and 1991 Champion Petoskey in fourth.



**Champion Boys Class B Flint Beecher** 

Flint Beecher won for the 13th time since 1977 as Beecher Track dominated the Boys Class B Field for the second year in a row. Beecher won 5 events, including 3 relays, en route to the victory. Midland Bullock Creek finished 6th, winning the 400-M Relay by edging Beecher in 45.08 to 45.09 seconds. Success in the field events helped Chippewa Hills to second place, its strongest showing ever at the Bennett Relays, with Linden finishing third. Bob Baily and Marty Howard placed 1-2 in the Pole Vault, and Kevin Ray won the Shot Put and placed second in the Discus for Chippewa Hills.



**Champion Girls Class C Maple Valley** 

Maple Valley won 8 of 13 events and coasted to a 147-69 victory over second place Lake City. Charlevoix and Coleman won the only relay events Maple Valley didn't claim. Mindy Shoup won the 1600-M Run, Janet Bouldrey won the Long Jump, and each was on two of Maple Valley's winning relay teams. Stacy Robinson won the 100-M Dash and helped Clare to a third place showing. Maple Valley was the only girls team that managed to repeat as champions in 1992, making it two in a row.



**Champion Boys Class C Clare** 

Clare won the Boys Class C title for the third time in the last five years despite 5 first places by Charlevoix, beating Charlevoix 105 to 86. Matt Smith, the Class C Outstanding Athlete of the meet, led Charlevoix with a win in the 1600-M Run and helped on two of his team's 4 relay victories. But Clare's depth and multiple point scoring in individual events overcame Charlevoix's superior relay speed. Lake City finished third on the strength of Stacey Minthorn's 3200-M Run victory and strong finishes in the distance relays. Nine different teams won events in a balanced field, with 21 teams scoring points.



Champion Girls Class D Fowler and Glen Lake (on page 9)

Maple City Glen Lake took 5 firsts to Fowler's one first place, but Glen Lake needed a win, and got it, in the final 1600-M Relay to catch Fowler for a tie in Girls Class D. It was only the 6th tie in Bennett Relays history, and the first ever for a girls championship trophy. Fowler's depth showed in the 100-M Dash and Long Jump, with 4 individuals placing. Bath's distance runners helped Bath to edge the pack for 3rd place. Glen Lake's Marnie Peplinski broke the Long Jump record, the only record set during the two days of cold, windy, wet weather.



**Champion Boys Class D Detroit Lutheran West (1991 Squad)** 

Detroit Lutheran West won its 4th straight Boys Class D Crown, but it was perhaps its hardest fought title as 26 teams reached the scoreboard. Webberville edged out Lutheran West in the 1600-M Relay by a split second, but lost the overall trophy, 85-74. Fowler finished third and Akron-Fairgrove and Onekama tied for fourth, with Onekama winning two distance relays, The Medley and the 3200-Meter. Lutheran West rode to victory in the sprints, led by firsts in the Sprint Medley Relay, the 400-M Relay, and Reggie Dalton's 100-M Dash triumph. Three Webberville pole vaulters finished in the top 8, including Brandon McCarty in the top spot.

## **1993 Relays Information**

This meet has the approval of the State High School Athletic Association and the National Federation for Michigan, Ohio and Ontario Athletics.

#### Eligibility

Only athletes eligible for high school athletics under the Michigan High School Athletics Association rules are eligible to compete.

#### Awards

Trophies will be awarded to team class champions and runners-up. Winning relay teams will receive trophies and all athletes running on the top five relay teams will be awarded medals. The first five places in individual events will receive medals. Outstanding meet performers in each class will receive awards. Honor coaches will receive awards at 1:15 on the track.

#### Dashes

The hurdles and 100-meter dash prelims will be conducted at the same time on opposite straight-aways of the track.

### Names Help Tell a Story



Lyle Bennett

Bennett Track. Finch Fieldhouse. Dan Rose Arena. The names on the Central Michigan University campus, like the names of the residence halls and academic buildings, offer a glimpse into the history of the campus and the school. Lyle Bennett, Ron Finch and Dan Rose all worked at the early Central Michigan Relays, or Chippewa Relays, when the high school track meet was in its infancy. They gave it a start, developed and improved the meet until the Relays was the largest high school track meet in the

country. Others contributed as well: AI Thomas, Kermit Ambrose, Bill Podoli . . . the list could continue.

The CMU Relays was named after Lyle Bennett in recognition of his long association with the meet, devotion to track and field, and contributions to Central Michigan University as a teacher and coach. The track was resurfaced and improved and renamed Bennett Track in 1987. Bennett coached track for 24 years, winning 11 conference titles. He was a three sport letter winner from 1925-27 in baseball, football and track. Bennett later coached football at CMU from 1947-49, taking over from

Ron Finch, who coached for 10 years. Bennett was inducted into the National Track Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 1961.



Bennett coached CMU great Jim Podoley in the 1950s. Podoley went on to star in the NFL.


### **Bennett Relays History**

The first CMU High School Relays track meet was run in 1938 with homemade wooden hurdles put together by a shop class, 38 teams and just a handful of events. In the next twenty years the Relays grew to be the largest high school track meet in the nation.

Ron Finch, the CMU football coach at the time, organized the first meet. He wanted to promote track and field in the area and make use of a fine facility. There was no meet in the northern or central part of the state which would allow top athletes from various regions to compete and compare their skills.

Under the direction of AI Thomas in the late 1950s and early 1960s the CMU Relays reached its heyday. As many as 3,300 athletes from nearly 200 schools participated in the two-day meet — and this was before girls were invited to compete in 1976.

Other changes over the years included running some events or the entire meet indoors in



Bennett Track was called Alumni Field and was the site of both CMU football and track in 1950.

Finch Fieldhouse during bad weather and having some collegiate athletes compete, though in separate events.

Some quick math will reveal that in 1993, 56 years after the first CMU Relays, the 53rd Annual Relays will be held. For three years during World War II the meet was canceled. Gasoline shortages and high prices restricted travel at that time, and meet organizers chose to cancel the meet rather than hold a watered-down version.

## **Top Performances in Bennett Relays History**

#### If this is an even year. . .

Fowler's girls team has won the Relays in Class C in 1984, 1986, 1988, and 1990, and they tied for first in 1992.

#### How about that?

Former Detroit Free Press writer Hal Schram (nicknmed "The Swami" for his predictions of game scores), who covered high school athletics longer than anyone dared admit they remembered, competed in the very first Chippewa Relays in 1938.

#### It's a long way from Mount Pleasant.

CMU sports star and NFL great Jim Podoley ran in one of the early CMU Relays for Mount Morris High.

#### Those medals are really made of gold.

Hayes Jones won five medals at the 1956 CMU Relays, four years before winning a gold medal in the 1960 Olympics.

#### But can he jump that high today?

One of the most durable records in meet history was set at the very first Relays in 1938. Flint Central's Floyd Bates jumped an incredible 6-foot 5 and 3/4 inches in setting a high jump record that lasted 30 years.

#### Where was she in '87?

Shirley Evans of Detroit Country Day won the Girls Class C 100-meter dash in 1985 as a freshman and again in 1986 and 1988. Country Day didn't enter in 1987, however, preventing a sweep.

#### What did they feed 'em back then?


earned All-State and Academic All-State honors.

"We're glad to be back this year," Meyers said. "This meet is well-run and has a lot of tradition. Plus, we don't have to take a long bus ride anywhere."



### Maple Valley Coach Gary Hamilton





Maple Valley won the Class C competition at the Bennett Relays for the second consecutive time last year and is looking forward to a return visit.






## 1892

Central Michigan University opened a yearlong celebration in June marking its centennial year 1892-1992. Since its founding as a college for teachers and business people, CMU has graduated more than 100,000 students. Throughout its first century, the university has expanded the areas of study that it offers to 80 majors and 90 minors, with 16,500 students taking classes in a broad range of subjects.

CMU's main campus is on 854 acres located in Mt. Pleasant, a town of about 25,000 in the heart of Michigan's Lower Peninsula. A tradition of academic excellence, convenient size and location, and economy are some of the reasons that Central Michigan University remains one of the state's most popular fouryear institutions.

CMU is NCAA affiliated and has team participation in eight intercollegiate sports for men and eight for women, and offers 36 intramural or club sports. The Chippewas compete in the Mid-American Conference.

The Chippewa athletic program has seen many improvements in recent years, including Theunissen Stadium, the improvements to Bennett Track, the varsity softball field and the new Student Activities Center addition to Rose Center. In the 1970's CMU made the transition from Division II to NCAA Division I and joined the MAC.

## **Chippewas Aim to Make Run at MAC Title**

After losing five athletes to injury prior to the 1992 Mid-American Conference (MAC) meet, Coach Jim Knapp's goal for the men's track and field team for the 1993 season is to go to the championship meet healthy.

"If we are healthy," said Coach Knapp, "we may be hard to beat at the conference meet."

The team is off to a good start. Everyone is healthy to start the season and has been focusing on weights and flexibility during the winter months. The Chippewas have been chosen to finish fifth this year in a preseason coaches' poll. CMU was fifth in 1992. The Chippewas placed sixth at the 1993 MAC Invitational indoor meet.

"Eastern is the favorite in the conference but not a handsdown favorite," said Coach Knapp.

The following is an event-by-event rundown for the 1993 track season.

Bill Stricklen (Richmond, Jr.) and Deren Pershinske (Engadine, Sr.) are expected to lead the Chippewas in the distance events. Both are coming off good cross country seasons, and Stricklen ran especially well during the indoor season. Chris Long (Sandusky, Jr.) also will contribute. Long ran a personal best 31:06 in the 10,000-meters at the Southeast Missouri Relays.


Chuck Fair (Detroit, Jr.) and Garry Warrick (Warren, Jr.) are the leaders in the middle distances. Chuck was all-MAC in the 800-meters last season, while Garry just missed being all-conference. "We are looking for big things from Garry," said Coach Knapp. Keith Seybert (Mount Pleasant, Sr.) will return to the Chippewas this season after missing 1992 with an injury.

Courtland Pitt (Detroit, Sr.) will be the Chippewas' number one hurdler this season. Pitt was the MAC "Athlete of the Year" in 1992 and also was all-conference in both the high and intermediate hurdles. Knapp believes Pitt is an all-American contender.

Marc Brown (Flint, Jr.) and Chris Oliver (Flint, Jr.) will join Pitt in the hurdle events. Both of these athletes placed in the indoor conference invitational in 1992.

A couple of two-sport stars will lead CMU in the sprints. Eric Johnson (Grand Rapids, So.) will move from the football field to the track for the 1993 outdoor season. Johnson had four record-breaking indoor performances in

1992 but will concentrate on outdoor this season. Leo Griffin (Detroit, Jr.), another football player, will return to the track after not competing in 1992. Griffin was all-conference two years ago.


Scott Eagle (Fowlerville, Sr.) and Ben Ludka (Traverse City, Jr.) will return to compete in the high jump for the Chippewas in 1993. "Both are consistent seven-foot jumpers," said Coach Knapp. Both Eagle and Ludka were all-conference in 1992.

In the long jump and triple jump, two redshirt freshmen will lead the way. Brandon Wynn (Muskegon Heights) and Matt Burton (West Branch) will be competing for the Chippewas. "This is an area where we need some good performances," said Knapp.

Scott Stanley (Charlotte, Sr.) and Glen Jenkins (Taylor, Jr.) are expected to lead CMU in the throwing events. Both were all-conference athletes in 1992.

There are some promising new faces in this area, according to Coach Knapp. "I usually don't talk about new athletes," said Knapp. "I don't want to create an atmosphere for the athlete. They need to create their own atmosphere." Coach Knapp did mention one newcomer, Kevin McGraw (Haslett, So.). Kevin comes to CMU as a transfer from Hillsdale College. "Kevin has looked very good this fall," said Knapp.

In the javelin, Tim Hansen (Fowlerville, Sr.) will return for another season. Hansen was all conference in 1992 and had his top three throws at the 1992 conference meet. Hansen also will try the decathalon in 1993.

## **Chippewas Look for Improvement in 1993**

The 1993 Central Michigan University women's track team looks forward to a year of solid competition and hard work.

"We have some high goals set for the season. We are trying to take this group and install confidence and aggressiveness," said head coach Keela Yount.

Although the team is made up of mostly juniors and freshmen, competition in all events is expected to be strong.

"We are solid in each of our events with our talent and numbers," said Yount. "We are optimistic about our future. Our team lies with a group of juniors and freshmen. We have an outstanding freshman class."

Yount is currently in her ninth year of coaching at CMU. She was named MAC Coach of the Year in 1989 for the cross country season. She also received this honor in 1986 for cross country and in 1985 for track and field. She coached the program's first track all-American, Chris Cooper, as well as coaching a two-time qualifier for the NCAA in cross country, Suzy Somers. Yount became Central Michigan's first woman to earn four varsity letters in both cross country and track, while also earning all-conference recognition as a Chippewa runner.

Ellen Carpenter is in her third year as an assistant coach for the women's track program.

Carpenter will coach the sprints, jumps, hurdles and heptathletes at Central. She also is responsible for fall conditioning, recruiting, academics and meet management.

The highly touted freshman class features a trio of sprinters: Patricia Rowe (Kitchener, Ont.), Theresa Proost (Empire) and PamMcKiernan (Richmond). Marnie Peplinski (Maple City) and Chloe Parker (Dimondale) will run the hurdles, and Janet Bouldrey (Nashville) will run middle distances.

Peplinski also will compete in the heptathlon. She placed seventh in the pentathlon at the MAC Invitational indoor meet in February and set an indoor school record with a 8.20 clocking in the 55-meter hurdles. Incidentally, Peplinski and Bouldrey won Outstanding Athlete awards at the 1992 CMU Bennett Relays. Peplinski led Class D Glen Lake High School to a co-championship with Fowler. Bouldrey led Maple Vailey to a championship in Class C.

The Chippewas will be trying to improve on their eighth place finish at the 1992 MAC Championships. CMU was sixth at the 1993 MAC Invitational indoor meet.

CMU will be led by co-captains Kara Baker (Columbiaville, Jr.), Rachelle Pline (DeWitt, Jr.) and Kelli Gilchrist (Colon, So.). Gilchrist and Kelly DeLange (Fair Haven, Jr.) are the top returnees in the distance runs.

Karen Thelen (Lansing, Jr.) and Kim Blouw (Wyoming, Jr.) will lead CMU in the middle distances. Nana Kwabi (Windsor, So.) set a CMU indoor record in the shot put and is expected to do well in the throwing events. Pline high jumped 5-8 indoors, also a record, and wants to improve on that.


The team will rely on the veterans for experience and guidance. "They know the program and the competition. They're focused in the right direction. They know the conference and should be contenders for the top places," said Yount.





### Your Career in Physical Education and Sport



Although teaching will always be a popular career choice, your degree may qualify you for many other types of challenging sport-related occupations. The continuing interest in leisure pursuits, as well as today's tremendous emphasis on physical fitness and good health, will result in many available positions in this profession.

If you are interested in a career in physical education and sport, you must work well with people. Many physical education jobs are created out of popular demand; without people, there would be no job. Because of this, your patience, perseverance and personality will be advantageous. Two other necessary characteristics, which sometimes are taken for granted because they are so essential, are good physical and mental health. These, along with enthusiasm, creativity and dedication will help assure your success in the areas of physical education and sport.

#### **Highlights of the CMU Program**

The department of physical education and sport offers several teaching options leading to a Bachelor of Science Degree in Education. A major in physical education provides the greatest teaching flexibility as it leads to obtaining a K-12 teaching certificate. The department also offers a

combined major/minor in physical education and dance. Other teaching areas leading to certificates include three minors in the areas of elementary physical education, secondary physical education and special physical education.

An increasing number of students have selected one of the non-teaching programs which generally lead to either a Bachelor of Applied Arts Degree or a Bachelor of Science Degree. The department offers both a major and a minor in sports studies. This major or minor is most often combined with another major or minor that would enhance entry into the sports industry. Majors or minors in business administration, marketing, management, journalism, broadcasting, recreation or health fitness are examples.

Students interested in the allied health profession of athletic training are encouraged to investigate the sports medicine major. This nonteaching major leads to a Bachelor of Science Degree, and is an accrediated educational program which incorporates specific coursework and a variety of clinical experiences to prepare the student to became a certified athletic trainer (ATC). This demanding major consists of three semesters of selected coursework and clinical observation; four semesters of advanced coursework and directed clinical experiences; and a 15week field experience. The sports medicine major meets all the standards of the National Athletic Trainers Association and qualifies the student to sit for the national certification exam for athletic trainers.

If you are interested in coaching you may enroll in the **coaching minor**. This minor will prepare you to coach in a public school, private school, recreation program or community athletic program.

## CMU Stars Who Made It BIG

In the 100-year history of Central Michigan University (1892-1992) the Chippewas have progressed a long way from a 14-5 loss in football in 1896. The century has seen the rise of CMU to a Mid-American Conference power with championships in football, baseball, field hockey, gymnastics, cross country, wrestling, softball and basketball in the last five years.

CMU competes against Michigan State, Kentucky and the University of Nevada-Las Vegas. Compare that to when the Chippewas played a schedule that included Bay City High School, the Saginaw YMCA and the Midland Athletic Club. By the way, Central Michigan avenged that 1896 football loss to Alma College by winning a rematch 8-4 that same year.

#### Dan Majerle




Basketball prowess at CMU has advanced as well, from a team that began by beating Clare High School in 1904 to one that took the MAC by storm (with "Thunder" and "Lightning") in 1987 and sent "Thunder" Dan Majerle on to stardom in the NBA.

Dan Majerle's phenomenal success has surprised most people, including some from his hometown of Traverse City. Majerle was the best player

on a bad team until he rallied the Chippewas from a 7-11 MAC record one year to a 14-2 first place finish in 1986-87. He was a first-round NBA draft pick of the Phoenix Suns in 1988, a move the Suns were ridiculed for until his gutsy style of play won over fans and helped him make the U.S. Olympic team. That catapulted him to hero status in the Phoenix area. Now a NBA All-Star, Majerle has his own line of clothing, endorsement contracts and a huge fan following in the Phoenix area.

#### Curt Young




Left-hander Curt Young pitched during the early years of CMU's domination of baseball in the MAC. The Chippewas won nine championships from 1977-90, including five in a row in the mid-1980s. Young had his best years pitching for the Oakland A's, going 9-4 in 1984, his rookie year. During his best three years

as a starter for Oakland, Young was 37-24 with 12 complete games and two shutouts.

Young is currently with the Yankee organization. He struggled through the first half of 1992 with Kansas City before going to New York, finishing the year with a 4-2 record. With the Yankees he was 3-0 with only 10 walks and one homerun allowed in 43 innings.

#### Gary Hogeboom



Gary Hogeboom started at quarterback just two years at CMU, but he led the Chippewas to their first MAC title in 1979. After years as a back-up to Danny White at Dallas, Hogeboom finally got his chance to start for the Cowboys, then for the Indianapolis Colts and Phoenix Cardinals. He also played for

Tom Minkel has been athreetime wrestling All-American and an Olympic athlete and coach during his distinguished career. Minkel posted a 73-13-1 record from 1969-71 and is the only CMU wrestler to never lose a match in a dual meet. Minkel earned the only spot in his weight class on the 1980 U.S. Olympic team but was not allowed to compete because of the boycott. He is a four-time national champion in Greco-

Roman wrestling at 149-pounds and was the coach of the 1992 U.S. Olympic team.
