Newcomb ran the second-best time of his four-year career, de-spite running on a snow-covered course in 30-degree weather.

"It was great for those kinds of conditions," Newcomb said. "I was shooting for the top 10 over-all and top five in my race. I'm very satisfied."

But Abdul Alzindani of Dearborn Fordson made that goal unattainable, blowing away the competition with a time of 15:20 in the individual race. Joe Leo of Detroit Catholic Central won the team race in 15.42.

Alzindani in the individual run after being six seconds back at the end of a blistering 4:37 opening mile by the Fordson senior.

"I didn't think he'd do that," Foltz said. "He took off fast and I can't go with that. I'm usually not that strong after I do that fast of a first mile. It took something out of me. I had to work to finish. He's tough. He is the best."

As it turned out, Foltz had to work hard just to keep ahead of Big Nine Conference rival Vennie.

"(Alzindani) just took right off d left us in the dust," Vennie and left us in the dust," Vennie said. "I wanted to try to stay with Kevin. I wanted to keep close and try to pass him, but he just out-kicked me at the end."
