Depth will get Novi through graduation losses

The slate can be wiped clean for Novi's Wildcats. The defending Kensington Valley Conference Oakland County and Class A boys cross country state champions, who raced through a magical sea-son, have to start all over like the rest of the teams.

But that's fine with the Wildcats, who will see whether they can duplicate last year's per-

Here is Oakland County's preseason top 10.

1. Novi

The Wildcats were hit hard by graduation, losing three of their top five runners, who were also three-fourths of a 3,200 relay squad that ran 7:55 in track and was second at the state meet. But the returnees include another leg of that relay junior Chris Toloff, and sophomore Tim Moore, the school record-holder in the 3,200. Each is a threat to win most races. They'll be helped by juniors Mark Avenius and Eric Walle. But Novi won't catch anybody by surprise this season.

There is going to be pressure, there's no denying that," said Novi coach Robert Smith. We knew that we'd have a buil's-eye on our back. Last year we got a charge out of coming out of nowhere. This year we have nowhere to hide, (so) we're going to go out and prove to everyone we're still here

2. Lakeland

Novi broke the Eagles' streak of consecutive Kensington Valley Conference titles, which stretched some five seasons. The Eagles aren't mad, but they'll be competitive. We've got a little more experience than people think we do, coach Randy Wilkins said. That includes Pat Klein, one of the top juniors in the state. He's our main guy coming back, Wilkins said. He'll be helped by juniors Ryan Bartman, C.J. Hadding, Mat Kiley and Keith Grant, Seniors Eric Jedynak and B.J. McCool have big-meet experience, and sophomore Brian Theut, along with Ryan Woodard, a hurdler in track, could also contribute.

3. Clarkston

Although the Wolves won the OAA I title last season, they've had a hollow feeling the last cou-ple of years because a state quali-fying berth has eluded them. With virtually their whole starting line up returning including six returning seniors who we been varsity runners the past couple of years, Clarkston is set to pull out all stops to get to the state meet. David Sage is one of the area's leading runners, but teammates Brett Quantz, Matt Haver, Chris Weber and Dan Burke will have to pull closer to him for the Wolves to be successful. Eric Sweeney and Brian Parker could also belp, along with some unproven runners. Tve been in this position so many times. coach Mike Taylor said, but I'm optimistic I think we'll have another good year."

4. Milford

Losing three-fourths of the state champion 3,200 relay is cause for concern for coach Brian Salvers. But the anchor man. Tom Greenless could be one of the best cross -מעז עדומעס ners in Oakland

County.



Greenless has been an all-state runner the past two seasons. If sophomores Casey Barnes and Nick Kopczak, junior Steve Rukstelo and seniors Brett Barley, Joe Rukstelo, Mike Callahan and Bill Coggins can run in a pack behind Greenless, Milford could duplicate last sea-son's effort. Each have had their moments, Salvers said. The guys have come through in different instances. It's their time to rise up and be good.

5. South Lyon

If the Lions can support a couple of returning state qualifiers -seniors Ryan Roma and Jason Pridmore — they'll be competitive. Bob Naiduk could also help. along with sophomore Brian Lee. The KVC, though, is a battlefield, and the Lions will take their lumps, too.

6. Walled Lake Central

The Vikings just missed a state berth last year and will need to run like the dickens this season to qualify for state. That I start with Todd Mobley, who after coming off a mediocre track season, is eager to prove he's the same runner

7. Oxford

The waters of the elite teams might still be too deep for the Wildcats, but they return virtually the entire starting lineup that won the Flint Metro League. Senior John Stein and juniors Dan Nelder and Mike Banachowski are tri-captains with experience. Without a top flight runner, though, the Wildcats will have to pack them tight to be competitive. "All three

are running real well," Oxford coach Ray Sutherland said.

8. Troy

With experience returning from last year's youthful squad, the Colts probably can notch a few more victories. Sophomore Nick Gillett could be the leading runner with Rodrigo Landeros, Bryan Barnes, Adam Wagner and Paul Sourier forming a solid quartet.

9. Troy Athens

The Red Hawks lost their top two runners to graduation but we have a ton of juniors who could really make the grade, said coach Mike Stallsmith. That includes Dan Carter, Thomas Ferri, Brandon Hanney, Ayush Batra and Mario Baumann Sophomores Matt Rose and Phil DeCook, along with senior Victor Arena, who played football the last three years, will help. "(He's) as strong as a runner for his size as I've ever seen. Stallsmith said of Arena. Nearly 40 boys are out for the team.

10. Lake Orion

With the departure of its two frontrunners, Jordan Desilets and Eric Lohr, the Dragons' saving grace will be a junior varsity squad that has had some success. Senior Andrew Fons had a respectable track season, and Dane Beardsley and Spencer Astin should also contribute. Chris Morehead and sophomo Michael Colt should also help. If we win, we'll have to win on depth. Dragons coach Stan Ford said. They'll just have to group it up, pack it up and run tough. Somebody will step up, I think."

Trio of captains ready to take off

They say winning a state championship is a hard thing to do, but defending it is twice as difficult.

We'll see what the Novi boy's cross country team can do.

The team has two big things against it in its quest for a repeat. One, for the first time in five years, there will be no Kevin Avenius. The most prolific runner in Novi history. Avenius has taken a scholarship to run cross country and track at Notre Dame.

But what could possibly be a bigger problem for the Wildcats is that they are no longer the underdogs. They no longer have the element of surprise in their arsenal.

"Everyone is gunning for us now," coach Bob Smith said. "We all have bullseyes on our backs. It is much harder to stay on top than it is to get there."

But if early season workouts are any indication, the team is doing everything it can to get back to the top. Tri-captains Nick Bassitt (senior), Chris Toloff (junior) and Eric Walle (senior) got the team together and decided to begin practice on June 21, two weeks earlier than the team usually starts.

"We have to have that common goal." Walle said. "We all want to get back there and win it again. We know we have to do more this year."

They now know what it takes to be in the big time." Smith said. "They are really, really hungry to go back. They had the best summer they've ever had.

"You sure hate to make predictions, but they sure eased the pain of graduation."

Toloff, along with returning sophomore Tim Moore, will lead the team in 1999. They have been about as close as you can be over the last two years. By pushing each other, they have become two of the best runners in the state.

"They feed off each other. They really can help each other," said Smith.

Rounding out Novi's top four runners are juniors Mark Avenius and Eric Walle. Along with Toloff, the three have been a fixture in Novi running since their freshmen year.

"These four guys are leading the charge. They're training like crazy and the dedication level has kicked up a notch," their coach said.

After that, there are seven guys vying for the last three spots on the varsity team.

Bassitt was the team's eighth man a year ago, and looks to be in a good position this season. Others fighting for a spot are juniors Steve Szwast and Dan Stevens, seniors Evan Foster and Steve Shubert and sophomores Matt Harsha-Strong and Mitch Erickson.

These guys train with each other, and if one guy has a good race, they all step it up because they feel they can run with him, Smith said. They are all within 30 seconds of each other.

Like always. Novi will have plenty of regular-season challenges to prepare them for the post season. Lakeland will try to regain the dominance they had in the Kensington Valley Conference for four years before Novi stomped them last season. Milford lost a lot. but have possibly the conferences best returning runner (Tom Greenless) and 50 other kids out for the team. South Lyon and Brighton each have two contenders and Smith feels the Lions are ready to take that next step up.

"We're doing more than rebuilding, we're reloading," an excited Smith said. "I can't wait for next week to begin."

The Wildcats will take on Northville in the season opener today at Cass Benton.

Most sports teams still rely on the leadership provided by the team captains

Being a captain at the varsity level isn't all it's cracked up to be.

Well that's not exactly true.

As any athlete will tell you, being voted or named captain can be as big an honor as there is. Being the one or two guys elected captain by the same peers you've shared both great moments with, as well as the bad ones, it's not that bad.

But what exactly does a captain do? Are they the lockerroom cheerleaders, the ones encouraging their teammates to play harder, longer, better?

The cross country team has three captains this year; senior Nick Bassitt and juntors Chris Toloff and Eric Walle. It was their decision to begin summer practice two weeks earlier than its normally scheduled start. The team was working out as early as June 21.

"We just really wanted to start the season earlier." Walle said. "Usually the more miles you put in, the easier they are to run in the season. We knew we had to do more this year because it will be tougher to defend the championship than it was to win it."

"They're my right-hand tools," Smith said.
"They handle the stretching, the warmups, hydration. Sometimes they choose their own workouts. I know these three guys will take care of it.

"I give so much credit to our captains over the last two or three years."

Not all teams have captains. The football, boy's cross country, girl's tennis, boy's golf and boy's soccer teams have team-voted captains, but some other sports elect not to.

The Novi girl's cross country program, which has been to four of the last five state championships, have senior leaders rather than captains. This is a method head coach Norm Norgren thinks works best for his program.

"I demand senior leadership," he said.
"They've been here before and they know what

to do. To me there's no one kid who's more important than any other one.

Regardless of the sport, it is an honor to be elected by your peers.

"I was excited because it was a high honor, and I know a lot of guys on the team respected me," Kittle said.

The football team normally selects four captains, but only two were chosen this season because of a lack of overall voting.

Walle said it shows him that his teammates listen to what he has to say.

"Coach can't be there all the time, so we basically have to push each other out there," Walle said. "It's good that we have so many good leaders on this team."

With so many swimmers on its roster, the team has three captains for the 1999 squad. Seniors Amy Hartland, Emily Nicol and Leslie Nimer have been selected by their teammates. Nimer for the second-consecutive year.

The tennis team has co-captains, with Tara Stevens and Amrutha Nagarajan leading the team.

The defending state champion soccer team has elected for three captains this year. Ryan Rzepka. Scott Jettie and Frank Raburn will try to lead the team back to the championship game.

Be it great leadership or superb coaching, something must be working. Not many schools can say they won two state championships last fall.

Extra practice shows, pays off

The two extra weeks of practice the Novi boys' cross country team put in this summer seems to have paid off in the early parts to the Wildcats' 1999 season.

Novi took the top five places and seven of the top eight in a 15-48 win over Northville last Thursday. Moreso than the final score, the runners' times were as impressive as ever.

Every starting runner improved his time from the first race a year ago and sophomore sensation Tim Moore did more than that. He broke the school record in his first meet out.

Moore ran the Cass Benton course in a time of 16 minutes, 8 seconds,

shaving two seconds off Dan Christopherson's time of a year ago.

"He ran the race in over a minute better time than he did last year," a

stunned Novi coach Bob Smith said. "He ran a flawless race, ahead of everyone else. This was very unexpected."

Smith said that he asked all of his runners, except Moore, what their goals were for the first race of the season.

"Had I known that his goal was to break the school record, then I would have discouraged him from running all-out so early." Smith said.

With teammate Chris Toloff unable to finish the race because of a knee

injury, Moore dominated the field. He topped Novi's next finisher, Eric Walle by 1:14.

Walle was second overall in 17:22, which shaved over a minute off last year's time.

Mark Aventus was third at 17:58 and Steve Szwast (18:02) and Nick Bassitt (18:05) were close behind to round out the scoring for Novi. Mitch Erickson was seventh overall in 18:17 and Matt Harsha-Strong was eighth at 19:05.

Szwast's time was 1:52 better than last year and Bassitt knocked over :30 off of his time.

"Steve was a wannabe last year, but he's a real contender this year," Smith said. "You can tell he's focused this year. He's got fire in his eyes."

Knowing what his team had last season, Smith was just hoping to see how much farther his team was ahead of last year's pace.

"We really are looking to improve," he said. "So it's very gratifying to see

For two years he played Robin to Jason Hartmann's Batman, but this season Dathan Ritzenhein assumes the starring role at Rockford High.

If anyone can fill the shoes of Hartmann, who won two Class A individual cross-country titles en route to earning a scholarship to Oregon, it's Ritzenhein, a junior.

In fact, at the end of last year's track season, it was hard to distinguish Batman from Robin. Ritzenhein upset Hartmann at the state meet to capture the 3,200-meter title. And two weeks later he won the same event at the Footlocker National Scholastic Championships in Raleigh, N.C.

The sky is the limit for him if he can stay healthy," Rockford coach Mark Nessner said. "He is one of the most driven people I've ever been around."

When Ritzenhein does his best, there may be no one better in the

"After what I did at the end of the track season, and this summer, I think I have a good shot at winning the Footlocker in Florida." he said of the national crosscountry championship. "But first I have to qualify. It's a lot harder practicing without Jason."

Expect Ritzenhein to qualify. It's also safe to expect another great season from Rockford. The Rams finished second to Novi at the Class A state championships, with Hartmann and Ritzenhein placing 1-2.

The Rams return six of their top seven runners, including senior Andy Martin, who finished 17th overall at last year's state meet and hopes to give the Rams another potent one-two punch.

"Hopefully, I can fill Dathan's role from last season," said Martin, who has a 3.6 grade-point average. "If I do that, it will put me where I want to be. Not only the state level, but also nationally."

Senior Seth Folkertsma and juniors Joe Swendrowski, Kyle Fujimoto and Brian Smith also are

expected to perform well.

"It would be nice to see our team win the state championship this season," said Ritzenhein, a 3.3 student. "Novi was great last year and will probably be our biggest competition this year."

Novi returns three top performers from last year's championship team - sophomore Tim Moore (27th) and juniors Chris Toloff (29th) and Mark Avenius

If Ritzenhein and his teammates need more motivation, they can always stop by the school trophy case and view the hardware won by the girls team - last year's state champions.

"Being in Class D I don't think it allowed me to release my potential," said Shay, who graduated from Central Lake in 1997. "A lot of the colleges look for the top Footlocker guys, and I never ran in that meet. But once I got to Notre Dame I started beating Footlocker runners, and now J think more colleges will look at the guy coming out of the smaller

Shay, a junior, has overtaken many runners as a member of the Irish team. He is a two-time All-Big East runner, and a two-time winner of the National Catholic Invitational.

Shay will defend that title Sept. 18 at Notre Dame in his first meet of the season.

Perhaps Shay's best performance was finishing 20th at the World Junior Cross Country Championships in Marrakesh, Morocco, last year. He was the top American in the 200-plus field.

"It was a great experience to get that international competition under my belt," said Shay, who covered the five-mile distance in 24 minutes, 20 seconds. "Not a lot of people were expecting that much from me, so I used that to my advantage."

Shay, who credits a good deal of his success to a high-mileage regimen (60-80 miles weekly) that

Liggett to honor 100 years of teams

teams of University Liggett.

The current version, coached by Phil Langford, will play host to a 10-school anniversary meet at 4 p.m. Sept. 16 at Schroder Field in Grosse Pointe Woods.

To celebrate this centennial season, Langford did some research and initially outfitted his boys in uniforms similar to those worn by Liggett's runners in 1899. There were just two problems.

"The shorts would ride up and bunch up between your thighs and make it uncomfortable to run," senior Shaka Bahadu said.

And the leather belts inhibited breathing. "I tried it once, and I didn't like it," he said.

University Liggett's Knights will be in their regular navy uniforms for the centennial meet.

"I don't think there's another school that's run 100 years," said Detroit Holy Redeemer Coach Patrick Irwin, whose team will participate.

Liggett School for Girls opened in 1878. Boys started running at Detroit University School in October 1899. The schools merged as University Liggett in 1969, effective in the 1970 school year.

Coming up

The traditional kickoff meet for the season is Saturday. Sponsored in the past by West Bloomfield, it will be sponsored this year by Birmingham Brother Rice because of the Jewish religious holiday Rosh Hashanah.

It's traditionally one of the biggest meets in the state. Now in its third year at Kens-

ington Metropark, it will be held at Playfield Possum Hollow.

Meet director Bob Stark, the Rice cross-country coach, expects 80 teams, boys and girls, for four varsity races, divided by enrollment, starting at 9 a.m. with Division I girls, smaller Class A schools and Class B schools. Division II girls (Class A) are at 9:30 a.m., followed by Division I boys at 10 and Division II boys at 10:30.

There is a \$3 weekend admission charge for cars entering the Metropark without a season pass.

... The 13th annual University of Detroit Mercy Invitational also will be Saturday at Cass Benton Park in Northville.

Meet director Guy Murray, the track and cross-country coach at UDM, said 11 teams entered the collegiate races.

The high school / open division early entries include Hazel Park, Plymouth Christian, Dearborn Edsel Ford, Garden City, Trenton, Warren Woods Tower, Southfield Franklin Road Christian, Southfield Christian and Novi, the defending state boys champion in A.

"It's the home course for Novi," Murray said. "Novi is definitely the class of the field."

There will be three races, starting with the high school / open division at 10 a.m.

Murray, 32, qualified for next spring's Olympic Trials in the marathon. The time required is 2:22 or less, which Murray did in June at Grandma's Marathon in Duluth, Minn., running 2:21:18.

Wildcats top Brighton, Moore breaks own record

There's no hiding the fact that they're good. Boys' cross country coach Bob Smith knows that.

This year's team lacks the senior leadership that the state championship squad had in 1998, but each one of the returnees has the experience of 10 seniors thanks to that title. And they're showing that early.

The Wildcats beat Brighton for just the third time ever last week and went on to perform better than any other team at the University of Detroit Mercy Invitational at Case Benton last Saturday.

No scores were kept at the Mercy Invite, but Novi placed three in the lop seven and their top five among the top 21 out of more than 300 runners taking part in the race. The race was a bit unusual in that it was one big race mixing boys and girls, high nera all together.

Novi had 13 career Cass Benton personal

bests and 20 season Cass Benton personal bests. Topping it all off, sophomore sensation Tim Moore shattered his own Novi course record in a time of 15 minutes, 57 seconds. That time was 11 seconds faster than his time he ran two weeks ago and helped him to a top finish among all the runners.

Teammate Chris Toloff also ran well. running his best time of 16:13 to take third.

'if you take a look back 12 months ago, Chris would be the man." Smith said. "Over the past year, our echool record has been broken three times, and Chris' 16:13 would have been a record just a year ago."

Mark Aventus was seventh overall in a time of 16:36, also a personal-best time. Eric Walle came in at 17:08, which was 13th overall in the race. Sophomore Tim Moore and junior Chris Toloff already have run under 16 minutes at Cass Benton Park, one of the area's most

challenging courses.

Other top runners on the 26-member squad include juniors Avenius, Eric Walle

"Kevin Avenius really put us back on the map a couple of years ago," Smith said. "He was our go-to guy, a real big-meet runner.

Novi is prepping for the Nov. 6 state finals with a tough dual meet schedule. Its Kensington Valley Conference rivals in-clude White Lake Lakeland, which won Class A titles in 1996 and '97; and Brighton, the '95 Class A champion.

And it won't be easy Saturday when Novi attempts to defend its Oakland Coun-

ty title at Kensington Metropark.

"Winning the Oakland County championship last year really gave us a lot of confidence," Smith said. "Probably the best collection of cross-country runners in the state are in Oakland County."

Said Mark Avenius, who began training after track season and no longer resembles the mediocre runner of his middle school days: "It's a lot of hard work, but if you plow through all that, once Nov. 6 rolls around, it's all worth it.

MILFORD — Great expectations have followed Clarkston's senior-dominated boys cross country team since they were sophomores. The Wolves, though, have had more letdowns than accomplishments as the window of opportunity began closing in the successive years.

Now, in the final season for most of the group, they're beginning to assert themselves. David Sage took third place, leading five runners in the top 25, as the Wolves won the 40th annual Oakland County Cross Country championships Saturday at Kensington Metropark.

Walled Lake Central's Todd Mobley was the individual boys winner and Tom Greenless of Milford was second in the 5,000-meter race. Rochester Adams, led by three-time champion Katie Boyles, took the girls crown with 85 points and Novi, led by freshman Nina Schmitt (eighth), was second with 144.

Matt Haver took eighth, Brett Quantz was 20th, Kevin Breen was 24th and Dan Burke was 25th as Clarkston finished with 80 points, toppling defending champion Novi, second with 85. Milford took third with 120.

Clarkston was self-assured when it arrived at the fog-shrouded park early in the morning. "It's probably the best team race we've ever run," Sage said, "and it shows, finally, with our group of seniors ... we're finally here at the right time and ready to do great."

Novi, whose Chris Toloff, Tim Moore and Eric Walle finished in the top 10, was set to pack another county title away. But Kevin Avenius, normally the Wildcats' fourth runner, dropped out midway through the race because of a calf injury.

"I knew we were sunk," Novi coach Bob Smith said. "You can control a lot of variables (in coaching), but you can't control injuries. "My hat's off to the Clarkston team. They've been gunning for this for years. They capitalized and they were ready."

Sage ran with a tight lead pack that included Greenless, Toloff, Moore, Mobley and Lakeland's Pat Klein until Mobley, who had shoe problems moments before the start of the race, broke free midway through the race and won in 16:00.2.

"I got to the starting line just in time," Mobley said. "The first mile seemed chaotic. I tried to calm myself down."

In the girls race, Boyles yielded an early lead to Berkley's Jaclyn House, but it lasted only about a mile. Boyles eased past House, sneaked a quick look at her opposition and stretched her lead the remainder of the race. She finished in 19:05, while Karen LeRoy of Oxford took second in 19:31 and House finished third in 19:56.

"I just wanted to see where everyone was," said Boyles, who wobbled briefly

while looking back. "I'm pretty happy. The time wasn't the best, but I can definitely go a lot faster." $\,$

It was the first girls county crown for the Highlanders since 1987, according to coach Budd Cicciarelli, who was confident the Highlanders could do well. "It surprised them, but it didn't surprise me," he said.

Shannon Stanley took ninth, Andrea Moreland was 14th, Kellie Byrne was 27th and Chelsea Gottshall was 34th to round out the Highlanders' scoring.

Courtney Meeker and Leigha Christian, who were fourth and fifth respectively, led Rochester, which finished third with 159 points.






For a select group of Saline runners, the answer was obvious this past weekend at the regional meet held at Ann Arbor Pioneer

Novi again runs past Rockford for 'A' title

BROOKLYN, Mich — Rockford was atop the boys Class A rankings most of the season, just like last season. And Rockford was again No. 1 going into the state championships Saturday at Michigan Speedway.

And, like last season, Novi's boys picked the perfect time to peak, winning the title — with 68 points to Rockford's 90.

"It's psychological, the mind is a tremendous tool," Novi Coach Robert Smith said after the race. "We talked about how powerful the mind is coming here this morning, and they must have taken it to heart."

Leading Novi were sophomore Tim Moore, who finished third in 1527, and junior Chris Toloff, seventh in 1542.60.

Rockford junior Dathan Ritzenhein repeated as individual winner in 1505-40.

"I went out harder than I wanted to, but I had a good last mile," he said. "Tom Greenless started out with me, he was right there."

Walled Lake Central senior Todd Mobley was second in 1525.80.

"I was around toth at the half, and I slowly moved up and passed Tom at the mile. I tried to stay with Dathan, but he slowly pulled away from me. I'm not disappointed, but I thought I'd be closer. My time is not that fast, but the

wind was pretty bad."

Detroit Catholic Central junior Matt Daly was eighth in 15:43.

Class F

Novi wins state title; Boyles first for third time

BROOKLYN — State titles for most high school athletes are a rare commodity, but Katie Boyles is on the verge of cornering the market.

Boyles, a junior from Rochester Adams, captured her third straight Class A state cross country title Saturday at Michigan Speedway, leading the Highlanders to second place with 152 points. Rockford won its second straight crown with 40. Troy was 11th with 285 and Milford was 12th with 346.

Meanwhile, Novi enjoyed its boys Class A state title last year so much that it won it again this year. The Wildcats, who struggled at times during the season, upset favored Rockford, putting four runners among the top 22 to finish with 68 points. Rockford took second for the fourth straight year, scoring 90, Saline was third with 132 and Clarkston came in

fourth with 133.

Boyles joined Sterling Heights Stevenson's Christy Goodison (1991-93), Midland's Kayla Skelly (1979-81) and Sharon Van Tuyl of Portage Northern (1994-96) as runners who've won three straight Class A crowns.

She followed the same plan as in the past, concentrating on her effort rather than place.

"It really wasn't important to me (defending her title)," she said. "I came in ... to be in the top five. As long as I run my hardest and do the best I possibly can, that's good enough for me."

Boyles yielded the lead to a trio of Rockford runners and Romeo's Teresa Bongiovanni as late as two miles into the ruce. She was around eighth at the mile and fifth at the two-mile mark, but didn't panic. "I just kept passing people," she said. "I finally got into first with 400 or 600 (meters) to go."

From there, she held off Bongiovanni on the final stretch, punctuating her performance with a raised fist at the finish line and a resounding "Yes!" as she finished the fast, 5,000-meter course in 17:55.5. Shannon Stanley was Adams' second runner, finishing 27th, while Andrea Moreland, Chelsea Gottshall and Kelly Byrne completed Adams' scoring.

The scores of all races were graded to include only team state qualifiers and not individual qualifiers.

"We pointed toward this,"
Adams coach Budd Cicciarelli
said. "I really emphasize the state
finals more than anything."

So did Novi coach Bob Smith, who sacrificed some earlier meets in order to prepare for the state finals. Novi had taken second at its regional, Oakland County and league meets. But the Wildcats were ready for the big one.

"One difference was Mark (Avenius)," said Smith of one of his top runners, who had stomach flu and a sore calf in the last few weeks. "He was back 100 percent,

"Another factor was our confidence. We tweaked our training procedures the last two weeks of the season and it seemed to work."

Tim Moore was third, Chris Toloff was seventh, Avenius was 17th, Eric Walle was 22nd and Nick Bassitt 55th for Novi's top scorers.

"It's a great feeling," said Toloff, who was 29th last year. "A lot of people doubted us, (but) we were tough and had the confidence to win. We knew we were a good team."

Besides Moore and Toloff, Oakland County runners grabbed six of the top 13 places.

Walled Lake Central's Todd Mobley, who planned to stay with favored Dathan Ritzenheim of Rockford — one of the top juniors in the nation — trashed that strategy. Ritzenheim maintained a maddening pace, running the first mile in 4:30 en route to 15:05.

"It was a little harder to hold that pace," said Mobley, who took second in 15:22. But Milford's Tom Greenless raced to the front after 400 meters — "it was the only way to give myself a shot" and had to fend off Lakeland's Pat Klein for fourth place.

"I thought I had Greenless," said Klein, who was ecstatic with his finish. "I passed him at the three-mile (mark), but he came back and got me."

David Sage (13th) in 16:04 and Matt Haver (20th) in 16:11 led Clarkston.

Milford's Katie Kramer was eighth and Oxford's Karen LeRoy placed 10th in the Class A girls race.

In the Class B girls race, Pontiac Notre Dame Prep's Megan Schneider took 26th in 19:29. In Class D girls, Michelle Rolf of Rochester Hills Lutheran Northwest placed fifth in 20:27 and Joseph Sternemann was 23rd in the boys race in 17:49. Oakland Christian's Amber Beachy was the Lancers' top finisher, coming in 32nd in 21:28. 50¢

Waterford trustees earned the headaches

in t

aterford Township resident Robert Sharrard has been a first-class headache for township officials for several years.

Hopefully, that's not going to change anytime soon.

-Sharrard is demanding that the board ante up \$12,000 — the amount of taxpayer money that's been wasted in Trustee Jean Scott's futile attempt to keep both her district court job and board seat.

The Sharrard-Scott tussle began in -1994, when Sharrard, a former trustee. challenged whether she could hold both positions since the board made decisions that impact 51st District Court. Despite opinions and rulings from Circuit Court, the Michigan Court of Appeals, the state attorney general's office and the Oakland prosecutor's office, Scott decided to -keep both jobs.

And, to make matters worse, the board decided to fund the ensuing legal battles with taxpayer money. That's the money Sharrard believes trustees should pay back - \$3,000 each from the four trustees who approved the payments, including Scott.

Scott, meanwhile, retired from the District Court in September after her appeal failed, but not before upping her pension to \$790 a month. That's based on five years at the court and nearly 20 years as a trustee.

Township trustees made a mistake in authorizing the payments to defend Scott's stubbornness. They compounded the problem by continuing the payments until Scott decided to appeal the Circuit Court ruling.

We hope Sharrard makes life plenty uncomfortable for them - they've earned it.

End of construction worth bonus pay

More than a few readers' eyebrows probably were raised following The Oakland Press story about bonuses being handed out for this summer's road work.

In a nutshell: The contractors on the year's major projects — Interstate 275, I-75, I-696, I-96, the Southfield Freeway and Telegraph — stand to make at least .\$4.36 million in extra pay for completing "the work early. The contractors already pulled down \$177 million for the work.

....Before any irate taxpayer decides to

storm the Michigan Department of Transportation office to protest, consider this: 900,000 motorists traveled those six construction spots every day.

There's no question Michigan's roads never should have fallen into the state of disrepair they did. And one could argue whether the 1997 4-cent-per-gallon increase in the gas tax really was needed. However, few can question the wisdom of spending an additional \$4.36 million to end the road construction nightmare as soon as possible.

Brett Barley and Mike Callahan were key members of Milford's state-qualifying team. And if it were not for Nick Bassitt, Novi would not have won the state championship.

Milford senior takes seventh at regional cross country meet

Tom Greenless of Milford and Todd Mobley of West Bloomfield each had their cross country seasons extended a few more weeks.

Mobley, a senior at Walled Lake Central High School, and Greenless, a senior at Milford High, each earned berths at the Foot Locker Cross Country National Finals, which will take place Dec. 11 at Walt Disney's Oak Trail Course at Shades of Green in Orlando,

Greenless nosed out Mobley for seventh place at last week's Foot Locker Midwest Regional Championships at the University of Wisconsin-Parkside in Kenosha, Wisc.

The top eight boys and girls in the seeded races qualify for the national finals.

Greenless was timed in 15:23 for the 5,000-meter course while Mobley took eighth in 15:24. Both were in a battle for the final qualifying berths as Ryan Cole of Sanford, Mich. placed ninth in 15:25.

Dathan Ritzenheim of Rockford, the Michigan Class A state cross country champion, was the individual winner in 14:55. Mobley was the Class A state runner-up while Greenless placed fourth at the state meet. All three landed berths on the first team of the Foot Locker All-Midwest Regional Cross Country team.

Runners in the Midwest regional came from Arkansas, Colorado, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, North and South Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma and Wisconsin.

Nearly 350 runners from those states competed at the midwest regional.

Other area runners who competed included Tim Moore of Novi, who placed 33rd in 15:49.

Michigan, which had five finishers in the top 10 for 35 points, was the team winner. Illinois was second with 53 points and Ohio took third with 77.

In the girls regional, Karen LeRoy of Oxford placed 78th out of more than 400 runners and was timed in 19:37.

Thousands of the nation's top high school runners competed in other regional meets, which included the Northeast in Bronx, N.Y., the South in Charlotte, N.C. and the West in Walnut, Calif.

Wildcats take lead on boys team

After another state cross country meet there's little doubt that some of the best distance runners in the state are in Oakland County. For the second straight year, Novi won the Class A state championship, following consecutive titles by Kensington Valley Conference rival Lakeland the previous two years. The Wildcats placed four runners on the All-county squad.

Five of the top seven finishers at the state meet were from Oakland County.

Western: A three-time All-County selection and a four-time state qualifier, Mobley was the county's best runner. He won Oakland County, Western Lakes Activities Association and regional crowns and was runner-up at the Brother Rice Invitational. He was unbeaten in dual meets and took second at the Class A state meet.

■ Tim Moore, Novi: Moore came on strong at the end of the season, punctuating a strong effort by taking third at the Class A state meet, seconds behind Mobley. Only a sophomore, Moore was Kensington Valley Conference runner-up and regional champion. He placed fourth at the Oakland County meet.

Chris Toloff, Novi: Toloff and Moore helped give the Wildcats a strong one-two punch. Each took turns beating each other, and each were a threat to win most meets in which they competed. A junior, Toloff was Redford Union Invitational champ, was third in the KVC and was regional run-ner-up before taking seventh at state.

Tom Greenless, Milford:
Perhaps the most feared runner
because of his combination of
endurance and speed — he's a
sub-50-second quarter-miler in
track — the senior is also a threetime All-County selection and
four-time state qualifier.
Greenless is the KVC champion
and was runner-up at the
Oakland County and regional
meets. He used his strong kick to
secure fourth place at the state
meet.

In David Sage, Clarkston: Sage has been one of the area's top distance runners the past four years. A four time state qualifier, Sage was OAA I champion and unbeaten in league dual meets. He won the Oxford Invitational, took third at the

Oakland County meet and was fourth at the tough regional at Springfield Oaks. The senior finished 13th at the Class A state meet. ■ Pat Klein, Lakeland: A strong competitor, Klein eventually began beating runners he had lost to earlier in the season. The junior finished sixth at the Oakland County meet, fourth at the KVC meet, third at the Springfield Oaks regional and second at the Oxford Invitational. He was also 10th at the Jackson Invitational and finished fifth at the state meet, seconds behind Greenless.

■ Matt Haver, Clarkston: Haver, along with Sage, formed a consistent due for the Wolves. who were Oakland County and OAA I champions. Haver was third at the Oxford Invitational. eighth at the Oakland County meet and sixth at the Springfield Oaks regional. He finished sixth at the OAA I meet and placed 23rd at the Class A state meet. ■ Nick Gillett. Troy: One of two sophomores on the squad, Gillett was the Colts' top runner. The tall, long-striding runner was third at the OAA I meet, was **Ambrose Invitational champion** and was third at the Royal Oak Kimball regional. He finished

17th at the Oakland County meet and was 22nd at the state meet. ■ Eric Walle, Novi: Walle supported the Wildcats' effort with steady performances. He took seventh at the Oakland County meet and was eighth at the Ann Arbor Pioneer regional. Walle finished 22nd at the state meet. ■ Mark Avenius, Novi: Avenius overcame injuries midway through the season to run his best when it counted most. He was fifth at the Detroit Jesuit Invitational and placed 17th at the Class A state meet as the Wildcats' third finisher. Coach of the Year, Bob Smith, Novi: With the loss of three quality seniors, including a pair of All-State runners, virtually no one gave the Wildcats a chance to repeat as state champions.

to repeat as state champions. Despite second place finishes at the Oakland County, regional and KVC league meets, Novi was undaunted. The Wildcats ran their best race of the season in capturing their second straight state title. Comparing last year's team times to this year's, Smith said the average time on the Wildcats' home course for the top seven runners was 16:41, the same for both years.
