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The cross country season is just getting started, and already it is one of the best ever for Bangor John Glenn.

Coach Matt Nemode's Bobcats established a milestone by winning the first girls championship in school history at the St. Charles Invitational Aug. 23.

With junior Molly Millar and senior Gratia Trahan providing a solid 1-2 combination, the Bobcats are looking to winning even more.

Millar was the Bay County cross country medalist last fall while Trahan is coming off a stellar track season that included regional firsts in the 1,600- and 3,200-meter runs.

Also back are sophomore Ariel Trahan, junior Kristen Callaghan and seniors Erin McParlan and Ashley Christie.

"Gratia and Molly are going to push each other in practice and that's going to make each of them better," said Nemode. "If the other girls show improvement, too, we could have a very nice season."

Glenn competes in the tough North East Michigan Conference, where perennial champion Ogemaw Heights is prepared to make a run at a state title. The Falcons feature two of the state's premier distance runners in seniors Abigail Nelkie and Jessica Kraft.

John Glenn will be less competitive in the boys events, as only three boys have come out for the team. Jeff Byrne, who was second-team all-county last year, heads an all-sophomore lineup that includes Grant Pringle and Dan Tippman.

Bay City Western

Gone are E.J. Green, Rob Samborn and Rikki Owczarzak, the nucleus of Western cross country for the last four years. Coach Mike Nesbitt hopes the replacements are strong enough to make a good showing in Saginaw Valley League competition.

"It may take us awhile because we have a lot of new guys, but we should be all right by the end of the season," said Nesbitt.

Western's boys are led by senior George Phillips, a state meet qualifier who had been the Warriors' No. 1 runner most of last season.

Also back are junior Jaron Erickson - who ran on the area-record 3,200 relay last spring - sophomore Ron Green and junior Marc Witzke.

The Western girls are led by junior Sarah Felton, who was seventh in the County last fall. A knee injury bothered her during track season, but she has recovered enough to place third overall at the Essexville St. John Festival 5K Road Race Aug. 18.

Also back for the Warriors are senior Kristi Kapke and sophomore Sarah Wright.

"We may be a deeper team now," said Nesbitt. "If we can maintain some consistency, we should be competitive."

Bay City Cenral

New coach Alex Velasquez has infused enthusiasm into the Central program, as evidenced by the 32 runners on the boys and girls teams combined.

Sophomore Mario Cornejo and senior Joe Keech lead the Central boys team that includes senior Keith Bukowski and sophomore Kyle Pero.

"Mario and Joe are both wrestlers running for conditioning, but they are taking it seriously, too," said Velasquez, who is assisted by Karol Syring. "We have a good nucleus to start with, and we're going to surprise some teams."

Central's girls are led by seniors Alexis Lopez and Anne Gruber, who have five years of varsity experience between them. Sophomore Heather Bauer and Kelyn Fogelsonger lead the team's youth movement.

Essexville Garber

Senior Andy Cojeen, the individual winner at the Bay County meet each of the past two years, leads a Garber team that finished second in both the Tri-Valley East Division and Bay County last season.

"Andy's in good shape, and he's the kind of kid who is always going to be running up at the top," said Garber boys coach Jack Nesbitt of Cojeen, a two-time state qualifier.

Following Cojeen in the Garber top five are senior Grant Soehnel, junior Brian Anderson, sophomore Kyle McKendree and freshman Ben Gallagher.

St. John Festival 5K winner Melissa Martin, Cara DeSanto and 1999 state qualifier Erin Patterson lead a contingent of eight seniors for the Garber girls team out to reclaim the County title from Western.

The elder Dukes will be pushed by freshmen Jennifer Tuttle, Courtney Kotewa and Stefanie Madziar.

"This group is capable of running with anyone, but I'm an optimist and always think that about my teams," said Garber girls coach Linda VanTol.

### Pinconning

With just nine runners between the boys and girls teams, the Spartans will be out of the running for most team competitions this fall.

"Our other sports are so strong we don't get the girls out to run," said coach Pam LeBourdais, whose girls are led by junior Danielle Raushi and senior Adrianne Offenbecker.

Raushi was a state meet qualifier in track last spring, while Offenbecker is starting her fourth year of cross country.

Seniors Chad Howard, Clayton Cole and Kirk McKinnon lead the Pinconning boys, who have the minimum five members to compete as a team.

I was covering the Novi/Lakeland CC meet at Lakeland's home course at their

high school Thursday, and after reviewing his rankings, I thought these results may shed some light for him. So I offer this for what it's worth, just results from one meet.

Novi beat Lakeland (the two top teams in the Kensington Valley Conference)

20-35 (corrected score was 18-37 later). Chris Toloff (senior) of Novi broke the course record (previously 15:52) with a time of 15:31. His teammate Tim Moore (currently ranked No. 2 behind Dathan) ran runnerup in a

time of 16:18. Their teammate Mark Avenius (No. 15) finished third in 16:58. Brian Theut (normally Lakeland's No. 2) finished 4th at 17:16. His teammate Pat Klein (Currently No.5) had a poor race and finished 6th at 17:37.

I offer these results only so that the person ranking can get some insight

into Novi's best runners. Earlier this season, at a scrimmage at Cass Benton in Northville, Toloff and Moore ran 16:08 and 16:09 in that order. They ran together the entire race, challenged by noone.

Toloff will consistently finish better than Moore this season, based on talks with Novi insiders. Just thought I'd share what I knew. I don't know

if this helps you out at all, but as a sports editor who covers many sports

as well as cross country (including Novi the past two years), I understand

that additional information can't hurt! If this was of help to you, I could

FH Northern's White shines at Middleville cross country invitational

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When Crystal White was a sophomore at Forest Hills Northern, she finished the Middleville cross country invitational behind former Trojan standout Danielle Quisenberry. As a junior, she missed the bus and didn't make it to the meet on time.

White wanted to start her senior year on a high note, even if Danielle had already graduated. So after arriving early for the bus and praying on the way down for no rain, she beat Danielle's younger sister Melissa.

Middleville's girls team may have defeated the Huskies to win the overall battle, but for White her celebration had just begun.

"I didn't think we were ever going to run," said White, who finished the Middleville girls division race in 19 minutes, 50 seconds, coming in ahead of Allegan's Katie Morrissett (20:22) and Quisenberry (20:36).

"The other girls were seeing lightning on the way down and I was like 'Don't say that, I want to race.' I wanted this so badly, it was a great, great feeling."

The host Trojans, the defending Class B state girls champions, scored 47 points to place ahead of Plainwell (88), Caledonia (109) and Forest Hills Northern (110) in a showdown among larger schools. The tournament was divided into three divisions, with teams seeded according to school size.

"People will wonder how it mysteriously cleared up for an hour for us to race, but let them," Middleville coach Tammy Benjamin joked after the race. "No doubt we're on course now to do well, but we're looking for how it goes in the long haul."

The Huskies, whose girls team won the Forest Hills and Hudsonville invitationals, added a boys title to their collection with a score of 63 points, coming in ahead of East Grand Rapids (72) and Caledonia (79).

Forest Hills Northern placed only two runners in the top 10 (Jason Raehl in third and Gary Micka in seventh) but the Huskies' depth overcame the first-place power of Caledonia's Tim Ross (15:46).

"This is one of my favorite courses," Ross said. "The lake breeze always helps me to do better, about the only thing wrong was it was a little soggy around the second mile. But as of today I'm right on track."

In the Thornapple division (mid-size schools), Kelloggsville's girls put four runners in the top 10 to breeze to a 37-68 victory over West Catholic with Hamilton (76), Coopersville (81) and Comstock Park (119) rounding out the top five.

"We didn't expect things to be as close as they were," Kelloggsville coach Ray Antel said, "but this tells us what we need to do. We need to close the gap between our fourth and fifth runners. We have a lucky 2-3-4 punch behind Nicole (Bush, who finished first in 19:24) but until we do that we're susceptible."

Godwin Heights' boys team showed positive strides Monday, putting five runners in the top 10 to win the Thornapple boys race with 33 points. Although Tom Clifford (West Catholic) won the race in 15:46 and three other runners came in before Wolverines leader Josh Sigman crossed the finish line in fifth, Godwin also took sixth, eighth, ninth and 10th places.

"We weren't expecting to have five runners at all," Wolverine coach Riley Swinehart said. "But this is nice. We're quickly forming a solid pack of runners and it's getting to be pretty tight time-wise."

In the Kellogg Division, Allendale's boys and Tri-unity Christian's girls won titles despite the presence of strong Hopkins runners.

Richard Stein and Kirk Williams finished one-two for the Vikings, while Brooke Brenner won the girls race; Allendale put three runners in the top 10 to take the boys title. The Falcons won last year's Class C state championship but lost six runners from that team, so the win was encouraging.

"We had a pretty good idea that things could go our way," said first-year coach Brett Cataldo. "We didn't run against our conference schools but at least we got an idea of where we should be."

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Holland Christian cross country coach Dave DeKruyter had one more piece of advice for his Maroons after Saturday's annual Bredeweg Invitational at West Ottawa.

DeKruyter told his runners to go take a jump in Lake Michigan.

Seriously.

The Maroon boys took top honors and the girls were runner-up to Grand Haven. Afterward, both Holland Christian teams headed to the beach to cool off after collecting their medals and trophies.

"We are a little sore, but the healing powers of Lake Michigan are incredible," said DeKruyter, whose boys squad finished second in the state a year ago.

"Cold water does wonders, so it's kind of a tradition that after the West Ottawa meet we head out to the beach, play some volleyball, kayak, swim and enjoy the water. We have a great time out there."

The Maroons edged Holland 81-86 to take top honors in the 13-team boys field, while Grand Haven recorded a 40-68 win over Holland Christian in

the girls competition. The Maroons and Buccaneers took first in the Bredeweg event a year ago, too.

Holland Christian placed three runners in the top 13, and Tyler Zwagerman and Rick Vogelzang finished third and fourth, respectively. Holland's Matt Huyser took medalist honors in 16 minutes, 37 seconds, but the Dutch came up just short in their bid to overtake the Maroons.

"The conditions weren't real favorable because of the high humidity, so I'm pleased with our kids," DeKruyter said. "We wanted to come in and run a smart race. We wanted to stay under control in the first mile and not go out too hard. We wanted to get a feel for where the pack was at and put more of an effort in the second and third miles.

"What's been happening is that we have been going out hard, and that has been pulling our sixth, seventh and eighth men out a little too fast. We gave each person today a time we wanted them to run that mile in to control their pace."

Grand Haven placed six runners in the top 17 en route to winning its third invitational of the season. Bucs senior Anne Zuelke was medalist in 19:59, which was eight seconds quicker than Holland's Kendra Snyder. Jentry Soule cracked the top five for the Bucs by finishing third overall in 20:18.

"We faced a very tough field today, it was more competitive than it has been in the past," Grand Haven coach Greg Russick said. "We had eight O-K Red teams, and Holland Christian was very impressive. I thought they beat us because they had three bunched up in front of our third girl.

"But I'm real pleased with our girls because we've worked them really hard on Thursday when they did four really tough three-quarters. They have been putting in quite a few miles, so I knew they would come in tired."

Holland's boys squad had three runners finish in the top-16, including Huyser. Evan Reimer was ninth overall and Dan Herrick was 16th. Holland Christian's Elyssa Kalkman, Bethany Hofman and Stephanie Schippers swept places five-through-seven in girls.

Cross country streak: 2 years and running

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"Two years, two years," Hanover-Horton High School cross country coach Dean Blackledge yelled. "Come on Chris, you've worked too hard for this."

Chris Alcenius, a junior at Hanover-Horton, was running comfortably in second place midway through the East Jackson Invitational, but Blackledge knew Alcenius would have to push herself to edge out Addison senior Julie Porter for second in the end. So he used those words as motivation.

Alcenius was running for her 730th consecutive day. That's two years. Every day. For at least a mile.

She celebrated the anniversary by finishing second behind Ann Arbor Greenhills runner Jennifer Leichtman and ahead of Porter. Alcenius' kick in the last 100 yards was enough to hold off Porter.

"If it hadn't been my two-year anniversary, I would have never beat Julie," Alcenius said. "That's all I was thinking - that I've worked way too hard to not do this."

Alcenius finished in 20 minutes, 47 seconds, seven seconds off her goal of 20:40 but three seconds better than her best time last year.

"I'm really excited about where I am right now. I basically picked up where I left off, so that's pretty cool," Alcenius said.

Leichtman won the race in 20:15, and Porter was third at 20:49.

The invitational was an individual contest and no team scores were kept, but with seven of the eight Cascades Conference teams competing in the 10-school event, coaches used the race to see how they stack up against the competition. Only Vandercook Lake did not compete from the Cascades.

"I thought I even saw a couple of people from Vandercook Lake here checking out the competition," East Jackson coach Steven Doerr said.

The invitational was divided into four races: girls and boys freshman-sophomore races and girls and boys junior-senior races. The top-20 finishers received medals.

"The University of Tennessee would love to have her," said Jones, who has helped train some of the city's top track athletes, including Detroit Northern sprint legend Marshall Dill.

"We're definitely looking to break some records," said Womack, a Crockett graduate, who works for Wayne State University.

But on Tolan Field, Parker appeared content to simply enjoy the moment.

"I have always run distance," said Parker, who completed her training run a minute faster than her coaches predicted. "My fifth-grade coach put me in the distance races and I've been running them since. My strategy is to always run the best race I can run."

After her excellent cross-country debut last year, she was unable to compete during track season because of problems with her knees.

She returned to form this summer at the AAU National Junior Olympics in Orlando, Fla. In the 17-18 division, she placed second in the 1,500 (4:49.05) and won the 3,000 (10:26.85).

"I was kind of scared before the 1,500, but I told my coach the night before the 3,000, 'I want this race,' ," Parker said. "I'm always willing to challenge myself to see what I can do."

And it is that attitude that excites her coaches, and turns their thoughts to the future.

"She's coachable. Whatever you ask her to run, she runs," Womack said. "That's why she came back the way she did -- she was determined to run some more.

"They'll have her in some interesting races in college, and she'll be ready."

Parker is soft-spoken and modest, but she realizes that she has an opportunity to set a standard for PSL female distance runners.

"I definitely feel like I represent Detroit, my school and my family at every meet, "said Parker, who will be competing in Class C this season.

"I want to make everyone look good, and show them that Detroit has talent too."

HIGH PRAISE: With the Olympics approaching, it's a busy time of the year for Craig Masback, USA Track & Field CEO. But he was not too busy to respond to an e-mail about Rockford's Dathan Ritzenhein.

Not surprisingly, Masback, a former world-class miler, is aware of Ritzenhein. He watched the Rockford star defend his national two-mile title this summer at the Foot Locker Outdoor Championships in Raleigh, N. C. and praised Ritzenhein for "his willingness to take chances and push his limits with his running."

Ritzenhein, the defending Class A cross-country champion, already appears headed to an outstanding senior season. He ran 14.58 at the Aug. 26 Benzie Central Invitational as Rockford swept the top four spots in the Class A-B race. Following Ritzenhein were Brian Smith (16.14), Kyle Fujimoto (16.21) and Joe Swendrowski (16.28).

"This was an exciting meet because of the length of the course and the muddy conditions," Rozga said. "Our coach took the pressure off times and just wanted us to place as high as we could. We were out here to have fun."

A fun season includes winning 6 of the 8 invitationals the Oilers have participated in this season.

"We lost four seniors last year so it was considered a rebuilding year," Mount Pleasant senior Nina Johnson said. "This was a puddle run today."

The Gladwin boys team won its first-ever Delta Invite. The Flying G's will need the same kind of effort in late October when they host the Division 3 regionals at Delta College.

"We've been running well all season and it was nice to beat Gaylord today," Gladwin coach Dave Beyer said. "We need the same performance at regionals. We have a good team but not a great one. We have a solid top five."

For the third time this season, St. Louis was able to beat Central State Activities Association rival Shepherd. The Sharks edged the Bluejays by five points, led by by junior Shannon Stanglewicz's third-place finish (12:49.38).

"We ran very well today and we're definitely happy to beat Shepherd," Stanglewicz said. "We had a little doubt when we headed over to the leader board. We didn't know how close the meet was."

The biggest surprise was a 12:14.22 run by Clare's Jessie Rodgers for first place in the Division C race. Rodger's is a freshman who just turned 14-years-old, but her experience is starting to build. Of the seven invitationals she's ran in this fall, she's claimed victory in five of them.

"This was a nice meet but I like the longer courses better," Rodgers said. "I'm kind of surprised that I'm doing so well. My main goal for the season is to break the 19-minute mark. I ran a 19:25 early this season.

"I'd also like to finish in the top five at the state meet."

After losing his last two meets, Valley Lutheran's Chris Schiemann finally found his form in winning the Division C individual championship. The senior ran a 10:28.03, edging out tough competitors Jeff Luehm of St. Louis and Sanchez.

"After losing the last two, I had to prove to myself that I can win," Schiemann said. "Winning this Delta meet on a short course was a big goal for me. It was nice to be able to show my speed."

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Myra Markey can't stay out late on Friday nights.

That's not good.

But the Freeland High School junior can prepare herself to play collegiate sports.

That's the catch.

Markey is very busy this fall. Her sterling 4.0 grade-point average goes hand in hand with her dedication to basketball. Markey is in her third season of varsity basketball and helped guide the Falcons to their first ever state championship in 1998. She's Freeland's point guard this season and a productive one at that.

"I appreciate being able to use her for meets," said Freeland cross-country coach Dan Craig, who also has fellow hoopsters Liz Lane and Sarah Stimpson on the team. "Myra is our first finisher so it helps a lot when she runs for us. And it doesn't wear her down much. When kids are 16 and 17-years old they are full of energy."

Freeland basketball coach Dave Oczepek was a bit hesitant with Markey's double-duty at first but he hasn't noticed a change in her work ethic.

"She's in great shape, probably better shape than any female athlete in the state," Oczepek said. "She has great instincts on the basketball court and plays 100 percent every time. She's the best point guard I've ever had. The only time she sits the bench is when she gets in foul trouble."

Markey runs less than 20 miles a week but gets most of her training for cross-country in an hour-long independent physical fitness class coached by Craig. There, she works with fellow runner Niki Suitor on her pace for the meets.

"It helps training with Niki because we're about equal and we both push each other," said Markey, who doesn't run distances on basketball game day. "That hour of training helps because I don't have to run after practice. I can just go home and get my homework done."

But cross-country meets are run every Saturday morning. Where does Markey get time to socialize?

"Yeah I can't stay out late on Friday nights," Markey said. "That stinks."

Catholic Central's boys are out in front after the first two big meets of the season.

Coach Tony Magni's Shamrocks won the 28-team West Bloomfield / Brother Rice Invitational Sept. 6, with 66 points and followed by winning the 20-team Division 5 of the Holly Invitational on Sept. 16 with 63.

Coach Tom Frederick's Hornets were third at the state meet last season in Class A.

"Our goal this year is to return to the top three in the state, and to do that we have to build around our top two runners, Sean and (senior cocaptain) Ed Davis," Frederic said.

Saline is now in the Southeastern Michigan Conference Class A Red Division, along with Ann Arbor Pioneer in Washtenaw County, Adrian in Lenawee County and Temperance Bedford in Monroe County, so it's on the outer fringes of the Metro area, but getting closer as Metro suburbia sprawls.

## Catching up

The Belle Isle course was wet for the Grosse Pointe Woods University Liggett Invitational Sept. 14. It commemorated the first on-record state high school cross-country meet, held in 1899 between Detroit University School, now Liggett, Detroit Central and a few other programs that are no longer in existence.

"It was a combination of their injuries and us believing that we could do it," said Caledonia coach John Soderman, whose team won its seventh O-K Gold championship. "We'll take this any way we can get it. Since a week ago when Cedar Springs beat us, these kids have been really motivated to come back."

For Sparta coach John Thomas, second place was sweet. "The kids have been working, going the extra mile to do well," Thomas said. "Those that did finished in the top 10 today."

Sparta runner Kelly Carter didn't have to worry about revenge, but fear was her biggest motivator.

Carter, a sophomore, did not want to be caught off guard in her first conference meet, after missing last year's meet due to a stress fracture in her left leg. So Carter tackled the big hill and sprinted ahead to a wide lead, finishing in a time of 20:13, 28 seconds ahead of Caledonia's Tricia Miedema.

It was enough for the Spartans to repeat as champions, overcoming a surprising challenge from South Christian, to score 45 points. The Sailors, who finished fourth in the regular season, finished with 60 points while Cedar Springs took third (74).

"Fear of being beat, that's a huge motivation for me," Carter said. "I was kind of surprised at how far ahead I finished, but I wanted to save all my strength for the end of the race."

The shirts may have been new, but the results were the same for the Trojan girls, as they swept to the conference championship by scoring 26 points. It was the third conference title for the Trojans and the fifth in Benjamin's tenure at Middleville.

"The kids love orange, you can tell that," Benjamin said. "I figured today would be a good day to break the new uniforms out. This was basically a regional tune-up for us. I was confident we had the title wrapped up, so we needed to do well here to prepare for regionals."

Melissa Quisenberry ran 20 minutes, 13.9 seconds to outdistance the Hamilton duo of Sara Sterenberg and Meg Peters by 22 seconds. Sterenberg and Peters were three-tenths of a second apart across the finish line, 20:35.4 to 20:35.7.

"People think it's crazy, but I get scared going into every meet, like I'm not sure how I'll do," Quisenberry said. "Then it always goes away. But now I'm worried about regionals and how we'll do there."

Jen Verkerke took fourth for Middleville, while Christine Dood, Katie Richter and Jessica Stortz finished a respective sixth through eighth. Coopersville's Mallory Edmonds broke the Trojan pack with her fifth-place finish.

"My goal was to be first in the conference, so now that's set," Havenga said. "I can't get unfocused now, however. Now I have to go on to regionals and do just as well to have a shot at state."

Many area schools got a firsthand look at the Ram dynasty in action, as it overpowered the competition to finish the girls class A-B race with 22 points, 105 points ahead of second-place Traverse City Western.

"We lost four seniors from last year, so the concern was having a good pack," Rockford coach Brad Prins said. "We had the strength up front, but we're a bit disappointed in our performance because we needed the fifth and sixth runners to close the gap today and it didn't happen."

Joe Swendrowski (Rockford) was third with a 16:02.7; he was the only runner off Rockford's top boys team to compete in Saturday's race, as everyone else had an off day.

The invitational is considered by many coaches to be the top tournament in the state and a preview of the MHSAA finals. The meet attracted close to 3,000 runners from 90 different schools in Michigan and Ohio.
