

In all reality, Novi Wildcat boys' cross country coach Bob Smith should be salivating.

Over what? Well, his squad.
The Wildcats are bringing 35 runners to the program in 2003, compared to the 25 that graced the roster last year. Coming back for the Wildcats are a slew of talented runners — including a harrier that could easily be

considered one of the most premier runners in Michigan.

"The guys had a real nice summer." Smith said of his team's condition and preparation for the season. "I know they were all out there running and it's really exciting. I can't believe what a close field it is."

Statistically speaking, junior Mark Moore is the top-runner on the squad this year and his performance at the state meet last year marks him as one of the top runners in the state for 2003.

But, the other Wildcats aren't about to let him get away with being the default leader for the

squad.

Juniors Amol Huprikar and Spencer Ornes will be nipping at his heels as they look to keep a pack time of under a minute for Smith and their fellow 'Cats to admire. Seniors Eric Tingwall and Scott Bergeson will be right up there as well.

This year, Novi has seen one of the most remarkable improvements over a summer by one of their runners in senior

"Last year, his PR (personal record) was a 16:21," Smith noted. "This year, he came out with a 16:07. He's really taken his game to the next level and he's eying a potential All-State status."

Joseph came out of the gates in full stride and doesn't look like he plans on slowing down any — which is just going to push his squad to better themselves even more.

"Most schools end up with one or two guys in the front," Smith said. "We're going to have four or five in the front."

The captains on the team this year are Moore, Joseph, Preketes, Tingwall and Bergeson. They will be leading

a squad of young runners as they get in the hunt for some major Kensington Valley Conference competition.

The seniors on the team Bergeson, Chris include Dobryden, Brandis, Brad Joseph, Preketes, Darin Styles and Tingwall while the juniors are Huprikar, Moore, Justin Namm, Ornes, Nate Quay and Brad Spisich. Sophomores include Peter Andrews, Dan Bruder, Steve Pannon, Artun Kircali, Brad Larson, Kevin Lee, Riley Lokar, Andrew Chris Machisak. Macek, Brenden Neville, Andrew Park and Matt Thomas. Incoming freshman are Mike Beard, Pat Carroll, Jorden Dagslet, Ricky Manza, Alex Prasad, Abhishek Rao, Akira Shinomiya, Ben Vallerand, Scott Wagner and Mike Wheat.

"We are a very young team," Smith noted. "Young, but we're very experienced. This is a seasoned team and I think we're going to have an impact."

The Wildcats are hoping to be in the hunt for the KVC title this year as they are nearly every season. Their biggest foes, without a doubt, come in the form of Mavericks.

"The consensus across the state is that the state meet is Milford's to lose," Smith said. "It's really true, because on paper they are awesome."


But that doesn't mean Novi can't beat them.


"We scare the bejabbers out of them," Smith said. "They have to be ready when we run against them. For a long time, we were looking over our shoulders at who is coming up behind us, but now they are looking over theirs. They are tough, but you never know who is going to win."

The Wildcats are going to be eyeing a conference title from the word go.

"If we stay healthy, we have the potential to be knocking on the door for first place," Smith said. "We have to stay healthy, and that's the key."

OAKLAND COUNTY BOYS CROSS COUNTRY PREVIEW

A strong season is expected since most of the top boys return from last year. Once again, Milford will be in the chase for state honors with Novi also figuring prominently and Bloomfield Hills Lahser also a contender.

KENSINGTON VALLEY Defending champion: Milford (Division 1 state runner-up, 7-0, dual meets)

This year's favorite: Milford. The Mays return six of seven state finalists, including a senior contingent of Dan DeRusha, Seth Thibodeau, Kyle Harris and Chad Murray. Each has all-state efforts in either track or cross country. Kyle and Cralg Morrison, sub-10-minute two-milers, also figure promi-nently along with Dana Pitcock and Mike Andersen. Tim Wilkins and Joel VanDerworp give the Mays a top 10 unmatched in the state. "Our depth has been unbelievable for the last two years," Mavs coach Brian Salyers said.
"All those guys are mid-16s (16 min-ures) or faster."

The darkhorse: Novi, which took third at state last year, will be nipping at the Mays with Mark Moore, last year's top sophomore in the state, Eric Joseph, Spencer Omes and Arnol Huprikar, each with state meet experience. "We have plenty of guys who are ready to step up this year," said Novi coach Robert Smith as Justin Namm, Eric Tingwall, Nick Preketes, Scott Berguson, Nate Quay and Dan Bruder

ready themselves to make an impact.
The wildcard: With a senior-dominated lineup, South Lyon potentially has its strongest team in years. Jeff Techirhart leads the returnees and he'll have plenty of help. "I have about 15 seniors on the squad," said Lions coach Scott Smith. South Lyon was a deceiving 2-5 in dual meets, but lost several close ones. "The KVC is a

mighty brutal place to run," Smith said.
Who's left: Lakeland's young squad
may need another year of seasoning
but the Eagles are developing. Juniors Steve Leonard, Mitch Weiner and Jason Sosnowski all ran at the state meet last season along with sophomores Brad Craig and Dan Welch. Josh Par, Alex Rickens and Ryan Matson will also help. "We'll have to rely on the team concept." Lakeland coach randy Wilkins said, whose teams have qualified for state 20 of the last 21 years. "I've got no real thoroughbread, but I've got some idds who are pretty good."

Boys' Cross Country Milford makes another push for a state title

MILFORD - Brian Salvers believes Milford is ready to earn the title of state champion after finishing runner-up in Division 1 the last two years.

"We're blessed with tremendous talent ... our most talented group ever," said Salvers, Milford's coach. "They have great work ethic and a great spirit. I enjoy this group a lot. They have some special opportunities before them and it's up to them to reach-their goal (of winning state title)."

Milford has never won a state title in cross country, falling two points behind state champion Rockford last season. Milford, which was second to Detroit Catholic Central in 2001, was 17th nationally last year and 10th two

"We have six of our top seven runners returning and five have been all-state in cross country or track," Salvers said.

Seniors Dan DeRusha, Seth Thibodeau. Kyle Harris and Chad Murray anchor Milford's lineup, along with juniors Dana Pitcock and Mike Anderson.

DeRusha is the defending Oakland County champion (15 minutes, 22 seconds), but he placed just 76th at state (16:35.20). Thibodeau (25th, 15:59) and Harris (29th, 16:05) earned all-state status with Murray falling just short of a top-30 finish (32nd, 16:07).

2. Saline: The team returns six of its top seven runners from last year's team, which finished seventh in Division 1.

All-state seniors Dustin Voss and Neil Atzinger lead the returning group. Voss finished second at state and set the school's record with a time of 15:21. Atzinger placed ninth (15:47). Seniors Dan Pinter, Jim Hart and Brian Fisher and juniors Carter Bishop and Curtis Begley will also contribute.

3. Bloomfield Hills Lahser: It returns all seven of its top runners from last year's team, which placed third in Division 2, including all-staters junior Bruce Kaczmarek (24th, 16:11) and sophomore Mike Quick (29th, 16:18).

4. Novi: Ali-state junior Mark Moore (8th, 15:47) leads a lineup that placed third in Division t last year. Senior Eric Joseph (16:21) and juniors Spencer Ornes (16:37) and Amol Huprikar (16:48) are also returning starters.

c. Detroit Catholic Central: The Shamrocks return three of their top seven runners from last year's team, which placed fourth in Division 1, including seniors David Lucas (38th, 16:12) and Dan Horgan (42nd; 16:14). Junior Max Working (16:30) is the other returning starter.

6. Ann Arbor Huron: Senior all-stater Frank Tinney (third, 15:24) is among three starters back from last year's team, which placed sixth in Division 1. Juniors Adam Daoud (16:52) and Austin Riker (16:56) are the other returning starters.



Challenging indeed. The Wildcats found themselves running through the hilly course that the beautiful Cass Benton provides with blue skies overhead and not a cloud to be seen. Not a bad day for a picnic, but a sizzling day for a 15-20 minute run.

"I think the guys did a good job today," Smith said. "I didn't know what to expect out of them with this being their first afternoon run, but they lived up to any expectations there were."

In fact, the trio that looks to be the leaders of the Novi cross country pack all came in with the exact same times, as though they all timed their runs perfectly. Eric Joseph, who is quickly becoming a premier runner with Novi, and juniors Mark Moore and Amol Huprikar all finished their runs in 17 minutes, 35 seconds - not bad for their first time out in the sun.

Justin Namm was next in line, finishing the run in 18:12, while Scott Bergeson, a senior, ran to an 18:56. Eric Tingwall had a nice showing, finishing up the course in 19:04, while Nate Quay recorded a 20:37 on the day.

Freshman Mike Wheat ran to a 21:15 finish, not too far ahead of teammate Darin Styles. Brad Spisich finished in 21:55, while Scott Wagner recorded a 22:02. Alex Prasad and Ricky Manza, both freshman, finished just two seconds apart with a 22:06 and a 22:08, respectively. Carroll ran a 22:14 for the

Wildcats. while Brenden Neville notched a time of 22:52. Fellow Wildcat Steve Fannon took a 22:53, while Andrew Park ran a 22:54 and Matt Thomas ran a 23:19. Kip Miller took home a time of 23:49 in his first race in high school, while Chris Brandis competed his run in 24:22. Turning in a time of 24:29 was Artun Kircali, while fellow Wildcat Kevin Lee ran a 24:44 and Mike Beard ran a

Andrew Macek recorded a 27:05 on the day, Jorgen Dagslet ran a 28:34, Brad Bobryden notched a 30:06, Peter Andrews ran a 31:10, Brad Larson recorded a 31:15 and Akira Shinomiya finished in 31:20 to round out the Wildcat times. Abhishek Rao, Spencer Ornes, Nick Preketes, Dan Bruder, Chris Machisak, Ben Vallerand and Riley Lokar were not stile to run the race due to various situations.

"We had most of the team participating," Smith said. "We had some injuries and some sicknesses that stopped some of our guys from running."

. The Wildcats are looking good though, and are no doubt looking forward to their next race, which takes them to Howell to compete against their Kensington Valley Conference the Howell in Highlanders. The meet is slated for September 4 at 4:30 p.m. Following that meet, the Wildcats will host the Lakeland Bagles at 4:30 p.m. September 9 as one of their three home meets this year.

Novi boys harrier team

loses to an opponent other

than rival Milford Mavericks

It's strange to say, but coach Bob Smith thinks this could be the best thing to happen to his squad this year.

What is it he's talking about? A loss, actually.

The Novi Wildcats boys cross country team took their first regular-season loss to a team other than Milford for the first time since 1997. The Howell Highlanders came out with something to prove, and they did so with a 27-28 win over one of the top teams in the Kensington Valley Conference.

"It really was a heck of a meet," Smith said. "But it all boils down to us being complacent for the last year and a half or so. There were signs that we were getting away from the root of what made us good. That came back to haunt us in a big way."

Though the Wildcat harriers were the ones who took the loss on the course, Smith is taking full responsibility for the entire event.

"The buck stops here, or so the old saying goes," he said. "I may

have even been a little complacent myself, or at least allowed it to happen. For that, I'll take responsibility. I just haven't been working them like I should be."

Mark Moore was the first to cross the line in the race, completing his run in 16:23, while Eric Joseph took second in 16:38. From there through fifth place, it was all Howell, with Spencer Ornes taking sixth in 17:17 and then two more Howell runners finishing behind him.

"This was the best thing to happen to this team," Smith said. "It was definitely a wake-up call for us. It shows us that we're vulnerable, and that we can't survive on history, memory or wishes. It all has to come back to hard work."

Any idea of competing for the Kensington Valley Conference title may be out the window for the Wildcats — but Smith said that was becoming a goal that was slowly pulling further and further away from his squad.

"Milford is currently ranked seventh in the nation," he said. "We're not there. We're not even close to that. Right now, we can't

even expect to beat them unless some really strange things begin to happen."

The squad is eying a possible second-place finish or a second-place tie in their conference.

"There's really no difference between the two," Smith said. "The guys really seemed to accept that."

The Wildcats did learn a very valuable lesson from the loss — this should be a once-only experience this year.

"We're not going to let this happen again," Smith said. "If we lose, it's not going to be because we weren't prepared. I really felt as though that were the problem this time, and I just didn't have them prepared the way they should have been."

The Wildcats boys' soccer team didn't react in a negative way, which was different than most would have done.

"They are a pretty even-keel team," Smith said. "I was kind of surprised the way they reacted, but they don't get overly excited with wins so I shouldn't expect that to get overly depressed with losses.

That's a good frame of mind."

Smith, on the other hand, does react

"I don't take losing very well,"
Smith said. "But, I am learning
from the guys every day as well. I
do think we're going to be on the
winning track after this, and
maybe this whole learning experience was a positive one."

The Wildcats are slated to get right back into the conference match-ups when they visit Brighton September 16 at 4:30 p.m. before hosting the Lions of South Lyon September 23, which also begins at 4:30 p.m.

In what is known as an "open" run, any person can take to a course and compete. This can cause problems when it comes to keeping team scores, but that is sometimes the best thing for a program.

"We turned this race into one for the less experienced guys," Smith said. "Our next wave, you might say."

The older runners, or more expe-

rienced ones at least, like Moore and the otehr top-10 runners on the squad, were given an alternate workout that day but still showed up to not only cheer on their fellow Wildcat harriers, but also the dads that ran the race as well.

"It was nice to see," Smith said.




One of the Mavs' top runners, Mike Andersen, was out of the lineup due to mononucleosis, according to Salyers.

And it worked. Novi's second place finish was only able to be duplicated by state-favored Milford. That's not a bad statistic — especially considering there were 17 teams that competed in the event. Out of those 17, the six Kensington Valley Conference teams were in the top 10.



Wildcats make a run for it at finals

At what point does winning become a legacy?

For the Novi Wildcats boys' cross country team, running to a top-10 place in the state finals doesn't seem to be an issue. For the past six years, the squad has repeated that feat each and every year, and 2003 proved to be no different.

"We did it again," Novi coach Bob Smith said. "For the sixthstraight year, I am proud to announce that the Novi mens' cross country team finished in the top-10 at the state finals."

Novi raced to a seventh-place. finish this year as they collected 252 points in the highly touted and highly attended event. Placing first Valley were Kensington Conference rivals Milford, who won with a convincing 90 points, while Ann Arbor Huron took second with 149 points. In third was a strong Saline team, gather 166 total points, and Grand Ledge took fourth with 2001 and Ann Arbor Pioneer was fifth with 236. Placing sixth and showing how strong the KVC is this year were the Pinckney Pirates, who collected 240 points at the meet.

And the Wildcats have another honor too. For the seventh-straight season, Novi has the right to claim they have some of the best runners in the state on their squad. Juniors Mark Moore and Amol Huprikar were recipients of All-State status thanks to their incredible performances.

Moore ran to a top-10 finish as he took 10th in a time of 15:31.35, while Huprikar finished 13th with a time of 15:33.20.

Though not everyone could take home a covered Alf-State medal, there were impressive performances across the board from each and every Wildcat runner.

"Six of our seven racers set a career personal best yesterday," Smith said of his stellar harrier squad. Eric Joseph, a senior who has been remarkable this season, finished in 47th place and just missed out on his personal record—though his time wasn't anything to scoff at. Joseph put together a 16:22.35 in the most competitive meet in Michigan.

Spencer Ornes, who has shown steady improvement since his first runs with Smith and the Wildcats, ran a 16:28.90 for his personal career best time and took 57th place for his efforts.

Taking 129th was Scott Bergeson, who put together a time of 17:14 to notched a career-best time for the Wildcats.

Claude Miller came to run too, and he finished his long-distance trek in 17:16.40 to take 131st at the finals.

Nick Preketes ran his best ever as well, coming up with a 17:37.65 for a 155th-place finish in the state.

The Wildcats found themselves in some very familiar company as the majority of those finishing in the top-10 in the state were runners who competed in the 7-1 regional at Clarkston — considered the strongest regional in the state.

Finishing first overall was Saline's Dustin Voss, who put together a staggering time of 14:54.45 to blow the competition out of the water. Second place went to Frank Tinney of Ann Arbor Huron, who ran a 15:07.20, while Waterford Kettering's Justin Switzer ran a 15:09.45 for third.

A familiar name in this area was that of Neal Naughton, the stellar runner from Walled Lake Western, who finished fourth with a time of 15:14.30 while Milford's Seth Thibodeau ran to a fifth-place finish in 15:23.60. Muskegon Mona Shores was well represented as well, as Tim Kaijala took sixth in 15:24 and Ryan McCarl took ninth with a 15:28.35. Neil Atzinger of Saline took seventh with a 15:25.30, and Milford's Dan DeRusha finally found himself placing eighth with a time of 15:26.65.
