■ Milford boys lost four seniors, but still is a squad to catch

Milford's boys cross country team has maintained a high standard during the past 20 or so seasons, but especially

recently.

The Mays won the Division 1 state championship last year and finished second at states the two previous seasons. They've won three straight Oakland County, regional and Kensington Valley Conference titles and have been ranked nationally. But Milford lost four senm who placed in the top 44 at last year's state meet. meaning the Mavs could be vulnerable.

It least three other teams in the conference are capable of Breaking Milford's three year string of unbeaten dual

However, the Mavs won't go down easy. With close to 40 runners on the squad, and some untapped talent, Milford will still be a factor in Oakland County and the state meet. And preseason rankings from dyestat.com has Milford ranked No. 4 in the Midwest.

Returnees Mike Andersen and Dana Pitcock, who've each gone under 16 minutes in the 5k, give Milford a solid 1-2 combination. Joel Vanderworp and Tim Wilkins also will contribute.

"Those two guys give us four seniors with tremendous experience," Mays coach Brian Salyers said. "(Now), it's their aum to leave their legacy."

2. Novi - Will be in the mix of the area's top teams with seniors Mark Moore and Amol Huprikar, another tough duo, returning. Both keyed the Wildcats' seventhplace finish at states last year and runner-up finishes at the KVC and regional meets. Spencer Ornes and Kip Miller both have state meet experience along with Justin Namm.

"I'm cautiously optimistic, that's for sure," Novi coach Robert Smith said. "I like where we are right

now."

3. Bloomfield Hills Lahser — Lahser's success in the last several years — three straight OAA 2 titles and three straight top-four finishes at the Division 2 state meet, earned the Knights a promotion into OAA I, in which they'll contend again. Seniors Andrew Kennedy, Bruce Kaczmarek and Kirill Zikanov have big meet experience, along with junior Mike Quick. Sophomore Nick Krol and Charlie Najt also will help while Jon Adler and freshman Joey Grace could contribute. Lahser can pack them up high, but needs a front-runner to break out of the pack.

The challenge is going to be able to stay healthy and competitive on a weekly basis," said coach

Nick Stration.

4. Lake Orion — Should contend for the OAA I title — it tied. for the league crown last season and challenge for a state quali-fying berth. Billy Peterson should be among the area leaders, with Rob Shinouskas on the verge of a breakout season. Colin Motley and Jayson Lawton are depend-able and freahman Kyle Lawton and Matt Martin will contribute.

Together, the three teams have accounted for five of the last 10 Division 1 state championships. Senior Steve Leonard, a state qualifier last year, should lead the group with support from juniors Brad Craig and Dan Welch. Luke Heiman and Ryan Matson also should

6. Birmingham Brother Rice – Its sluggish starts in past seasons have been concerning for coach Robert Stark, although the Warriors usually get rolling in October. Senior John Black is one of the top runners in the state, and if Chris Wurster improves and Ryan Tamm, Peter Nicolay and sophomore Anthony Wile develop, the Warriors could have a repeat of last season, when they won regional and Catholic League meet titles. They'll be in a tougher regional, though.
7. Rochester — Is in a league-

championship groove with OAA I

titles - it shared the championship with Lake Orion last year - the past two seasons. The Falcons lost two solid runners from last year but return enough to contend again. Sam Watson and Jordan Raetz both ran legs on a 7:55 3,200 relay at track states, and Brad Linden has big-meet experience. The three seniors should provide leadership, plus Jon Payne and Brian Garcia could move up. They've developed a good tradition and they're proud of it," coach Larry Adams said.

8. Oxford — Won't have Donnie Richmond, who's running. at Central Michigan, but the Wildcats have a strong tradition to continue. They've won or shared seven straight Flint Metro League titles and have been unbeaten in league dual meets the past six seasons. Top runner Adam Richmond is improying and seniors Kenny White and German Guerrero are experienced. Brad Haney and Todd Davidson should also help. Another league title is possible, but Fenton will be a challenge. "I'm optimistic," coach Ray Sutherland said. "We've had a lot of kids working out and conditioning over the summer.'

9. Walled Lake Central -Should rise dramatically from its 1-5 dual meet season on the strength of summer training. Phil Watkins will be the only senior returning, and he'll have support from juniors Sean Maxwell and Scott Stevens. Sophomores Jake Hill and Tony Sanfillipo will be called upon to help immediately. The Vikings, who could challenge for the WLAA title, could have five runners around 17 minutes. But a tough regional awaits them.

10. Troy Athens — Despite the loss of its top runner to graduation, Athens can still compete. Phil Shaheen and Tom Clippard, both four-year runners, return along with junior Eric Brunning and sophomore Matt Shaheen, who both ran at the state meet last year. Sophomore Neal Duggan could contribute. The Red Hawks, though, need to turn it up a notch to contend for the league





with 68.

"We didn't get to see everyone like Pinckney, the Ann Arbors or Traverse City, but we did get to see the depth of our team," Novi coach Bob Smith said. "In the Oakland County meet if you have any weaknesses they are going to be magnified. There might end up being a whole army running between your third and fourth guys."

Novi. thankfully, didn't have

such an occurrence.

"I don't think we have any glaring weaknesses," said Smith, "All of our top five runners stayed really close together. We are tough through the top runners, including our three through sixth, which is a combination other teams are finding hard to beat."

Except, of course, Milford—
the team that has found itself
ranked first in the state in
the coaches' poll and second in the Midwest and
ninth in the country by running groups. Novi isn't far
behind, earning a secondplace ranking in Michigan,
ninth in the Midwest and

possibly the top-25 in the coun-

try.
"I don't like talking about rankings," Smith noted. "We can't get stupid and play the rankings game. That came up and bit us a few years ago."

So, his squad needs to focus instead. Every day and every meet has to be run like they are entering the twilight of the season. Why? Because the confer-

ence meet and the regional are right around the corner.

"It's been kind of a wild ride," Smith said. "We have to keep our focus daily."

The Wildcats had a strong showing at the Oakland County race with Mark Moore leading his squad with a third-place finish. He ran the course in just

16:19. Not far behind was Amol Hupikar with a sixth-place finish while Spencer Ornes finished 14th and Justin Namm finished 20th. Taking 25th was Kip Miller, while the always improving Bobby Watts crossed the finish line in 29th. Mike Wheat, a sophomore, was the seventh runner for Novi, earning a 60th place.

"This was Milford's home course," Smith said. "You've got to see that they have a little advantage."

Home course advantage is more prominent in cross country than nearly any other sport. With hills, twists and turns and trails to be run, a team that races the course and practices on it now and again will have the better advantage.

If the run would have taken place elsewhere?

"It just may have been too close to call," Smith said, noting he wasn't going to speculate.

His team will have their chance to prove their mettle against the Mavericks. Novi is scheduled to visit Milford Tuesday at 4:30 p.m.


Milford's Carlie Green was third, leading the Mays to second place with 126 points and Novi was third with 189.

KVC earns reputation as Valley of the Giants

Can't catch breath in this fast company

After Milford won its fourth consecutive Oakland County cross-country championship at Kensington Metropark on Saturday, the Mavericks hardly had a chance to sayor the victory.

"This starts what is an unbelievable stretch for us in intensity and competition. There is no rest," said Brian Salyers, coach of the state's top-ranked Division 1 boys team.

On Tuesday, Milford beat fifthranked Pinckney, 27-28, in a dual meet. Next Tuesday, secondranked Novi waits in the wings. Chalk that up to membership in the Kensington Valley Conference, an eight-school league that has long enjoyed a reputation for cross-country excellence.

Even so, this appears to be an up year for the league. In addition to four ranked schools (Howell is ninth), White Lake Lakeland and South Lyon received honorable mention in the statewide coaches poll this week.

KVC runners say the tough opposition prepares them for other invitationals and championship races.

"It helps you know your competition going into the state meet," said Novi senior Mark Moore, a returning all-state runner. "Novi, Milford and Pinckney are probably three of the top teams in Division 1 right now."

"The competition in the league is one of the biggest things for us," said Howell coach Paul Webster.

"We just get used to it. If we want to do well in the league, we just have to get really fast."

When Howell won the Haslett Invitational on Oct. 2 — finishing ahead of then-No. 2 Ann Arbor Huron — it had a league dual meet record of 1-3.

"The KVC has produced the state champion team in the past six out of nine years, and it's been done by four different teams," Novi coach Robert Smith said. "Brighton, Milford, Lakeland and Novi have done it — and Pincknev's lurking."

Last year, Milford won the Division 1 team title. Pinckney finished sixth and Novi seventh. Six of the top 30 — the cutoff for all-state recognition — came from KVC schools. Coaches think the conference would have had an even greater presence had the KVC schools not all run in the same regional at Clarkston.

"We were fourth, so we weren't real happy," Howell's Webster said. "Last year we were a definite top-10 team and we didn't get out" of regionals.

That should change this season. KVC schools will be scattered at different sites for the Oct. 30 regionals. Brighton, Hartland, Howell and Pinckney are assigned to the Grand Ledge race; Milford, Lakeland and South Lyon will compete at Holly, and Novi will run at Northville.

The schools' last chance to run together comes at the league championship meet, Oct. 25 at Hudson Mills Metropark near Dexter.

Webster said eight runners are capable of breaking 16 minutes there: Howell's John Wilson and Adam French, Milford's Dana Pitcock and Mike Andersen, Novi's Moore and Amol Huprikar, and Pinckney's Ian Boyle and Nick Katsaferas.

"I've been around this area for a long time, and this is as tough as our conference has ever been. and our conference has been the most dominant in the state of Michigan for the last 15 years? Salvers said. "There are a num." ber of factors. One is geography - there's a number of great places for the kids to run. Another is coaching: We have a number of coaches who are the only ones... that have ever coached at their school. Over the years they've been successful, the other coaches have been able to learn from that, and as a result the bar has been set so high. If you can rise to that level in our league. that: means you're a state contender.

The league's elite runners seem to welcome the challenges.

"You can win a bunch of conference meets by going 16:30,"

Moore said. "But not the KVC."

Ready for a confence showdown?

The possibility of season-best times is there as well.

"We'll be running at Pinckney's home course, which is one of the fastest we've run all year," Huprikar said.

Ranked second in the state and taking on the first- and fourth-ranked teams is never easy — but in the end what does a ranking mean?

"Nothing at all," Huprikar said.
"Some teams never live up to
their rankings and some unranked

impressive."

If Novi continues to run the way they have been all season, then the ending to their year will no doubt end up being rather impressive indeed.

Novi runners pace competition

Cross country squad keeps up its numbers

> NOVI — You remember the Rat Pack. More recently there was the Brat Pack. Now meet the Cat Pack.

The Novi boys cross country team, armed with legs too numerous to count, has ridden those numbers to become one of the premier cross country programs in the state.

Sure, having front-line talent helps, and the Wildcats have, since their state championship years of 1998 and 1999, always boasted one or two top-flight runners. But their true strength is in their numbers, a quality that this year's Wildcat team embodies more than any previous.

"Our original plan was to get our pack time under a minute," said coach Robert Smith. "Now we're down to 30 or 40 seconds."

The pack time — or the amount of time separating their Nos. 1 and 7 runners — continues to dwindle right on schedule. With the Division I regional meet set for Oct. 30 at Schoolcraft College in Livonia, the Wildcats appear on pace to continue their recent tradition of saving their best races for last.

"We have a good reputation of peaking at the right time," Smith said. "We seem to have figured out how to finish the season."

In short, they finish fast.

Beginning in 1998 when the Wildcats won the state championship behind speedster Tim Moore, Novi has been as unflappable as any team in the state. Novi repeated its title in 1999, finished runner-up in 2000 and 2001, dropped to third in 2002 and finished seventh last year

The Wildcats have found a formula that works. Seniors Mark Moore and Amol Huprikar provide the wheels and regularly turn in front-of-the-pack finishes. Moore's personal best time this season is 15 minutes, 52 seconds, and Huprikar isn't far behind at 16:25. Both are returning all-staters.

Behind them, but not far, is the pack that has become symmymous with Novi cross country. Using their personal bests, senior Justin Namm,

sophomore Kip Miller, junior Bobby Watts, senior Spencer Ornes and sophomore Mike Wheat all run within 20 seconds of one another.

A glance at this year's roster indicates that the Wildcats should be in good hands next season. A glance at the results from a junior varsity meet in Oakland County earlier this season show they should be in good shape next year and beyond.

The junior varsity Cats won the Oakland County meet. Afterward, Smith went and calculated that the Cats would have beaten a team of All-Stars, everyone in the field versus Novi.

"It's nice to see," Smith said. "You already hear guys talking, 'I can't wait until next year when it's our turn.'

"We'll feel the pinch of this (graduating) class, you always do, but we'll be all right. The future looks pretty bright."

ard work can make the Novi boys cross-country team sick.

But that's OK with them. Their motto is: If you've never thrown up after a hard workout, you probably haven't pushed yourself

enough.

In September, when the "9-1-1" drill — running 1,000 meters, a mile, then another 1,000 — had some of the younger runners losing their lunch, the captains promised their effort would be worth it come November.

"They see how much we want it," senior tri-captain Amol Huprikar said.""We run those workouts at the beginning of the fall."

Regionals are Saturday, the state finals are Nov. 6, and Novi is

eyeing the state title.

Coach Robert Smith's Wildgats have thrived in the past seven years, winning the class A title in 1998 and 1999 and finishing as Division I runner-up in 2000.

The senior class expects a championship after finishing 10th, third and seventh the past three years. They realize this is their chance at lasting glory.

The Wildcats, led by tri-captains Mark Moore, Huprikar and Steve Fannon, tied for first place in the Kensington Valley Conference dual meet season with a 6-1 record. Their only loss came to Pinckney early in the season when the Wildcats were still training heavily.

The one victory that people will talk about until the state finals came Oct. 19, when Novi edged the defending Division 1

champs Milford, 27-29.

Novi's runners finished second, fourth, sixth, seventh, eighth and 10th, featuring impressive depth highlighted by a late kick from junior Bobby Watts.

"It was huge because it was basically the top two teams in the state," Smith said, adding that he expects Pinckney, Ann Arbor Pincer and Ann Arbor Huron to also contend for the title. "We

also contend for the title. "We ere going head to head with them basically on their home turf and it was a very strategic type course. So you have to know how to race."

The win was Novi's first over

Milford in four years.

So what makes this year different from all other years?

"We have a lot of depth," Fannon said. "We have the people who don't score help us mentally in practice. The slower runners don't take it easy just because they're not in the front."

Novi also received a boost when senior Cal DePotter and Watts decided to join the team this fall.

Watts, who also plays hockey, is the team's No. 5 runner and DePotter, who chose to run instead of playing soccer, is the eighth or ninth man.

"Bobby's just got so much talent," said Moore, Novi's top runner who finished 10th at last year's state meet. "Bobby's been improving every race and getting more miles."

Talent and depth have played a major role in Novi's run for the state finals. The Wildcats are expected to advance easily from their regional at Northville.

Much of Novi's success can be traced back to Smith, who tries to keep his runners' minds

and legs fresh.

One or two days a week he breaks the monotony with a running game he invented — sometimes "speedball," sometimes an interval elimination game — just to change the pace.

Smith also talks about noncross country details: what to eat, what to avoid on the weekends, even what shoes to wear to school,

Though it may have taken them all a few years to buy into

Smith's theories, the older runners have reaped the benefits.

"Junior year I started to follow that and people see that it works," Huprikar said.

"It takes you to the next level,"

Moore said.

Novi is in peak form and getting stronger, with just nine days left until the state meet.


"We have a group of dedicated athletes and have a winning formula that's tremendous," Smith said.

Novi boys win cross country title

Monday marked the silver anniversary of the Kensington Valley Conference championship meet, but the Novi Wildcats were looking for gold.

The boys found it, taking first place over Pinckney and Milford to seal the KVC title. The girls took third overall behind powerful squads from Milford and Brighton.

"It was an amazing day," boys coach Bob Smith said of ending Milford's streak of three-straight titles and earning one for Novi. "The boys did a phenomenal job."

"You can't have average in the KVC meet," Smith noted. "If Wheat would have run his average race, we would have still won by one point, but that would have been crazy. It would have been the tightest meet ever."

Novi knew heading into the meet it would be the third through fifth runners that decided how the chips fell. Every team has a strong one and two runner, but the herd thins out in a hurry from there down.

"We've got the best three through five runners around," Smith noted.

And Wheat has made a name for himself as a runner who doesn't shy away from adversity.

"He's really what a coach

hopes for and dreams of," Smith said, "He ran a great race."

Smith has made a habit out of telling his runners their places on the team weren't set in stone when it came to position. Sure, Moore and Huprikar always seem to come across the line in first and second, but the third, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh positions are never guaranteed.

A runner isn't only as good as his last finish.

"Wheat took that to heart," said Smith. "He was really motoring."

The top 16 runners were awarded All-KVC honors with Wheat missing out by just one spot. He is, however, only a sophomore.

Novi was ranked second behind Milford in the state coaches' poll. That may change. "I would think so," Smith said.
"It's nice to have that ranking moniker, but there's a lot more to the analysis than that. We know we may not be the top team in the state, but we know we're one of the better team in the state. We just have to keep pushing it for the next two weeks."

Novi will be back in action when they run the regional tournament at Schoolcraft College on Haggerty Road Saturday at 10 a.m.



Novi stops Milford's boys streak, but Mavs' girls triumph

DEXTER — Novi, Pinckney and Milford, three of the state's top boys cross country teams, took turns beating each other in the rugged Kensington Valley Conference.

But when a victory was really needed, the surging Wildcats distanced themselves from the rest of the pack at Monday's conference championship at Hudson Mills Metropark. Novi halted a string of three straight titles by Milford, as the Wildcats scored 45 points to win their

first KVC title in four years.
Milford's Dana Pitcock won
the individual race in 15:43,

Amol Huprikar (fifth); Spencer Ornes (10th), Justin Namm (11th) and Mike Wheat (17th) completed the Wildcats' scoring in a contest

of wills that left many runners drained from exhaustion.

"This was a hardfought victory," Novi

Few took notice of Novi during the season, according to Smith.



The girls team made the finals in a great showing at the regional, taking third as a team to earn the berth. They even outran Northville, which had been putting up the best numbers in school history.



The race had a noticeable effect on many of the competitors. One Ann Arbor Pioneer runner cramped and collapsed within 30 feet of the finish line. After falling several more times he crawled across the finish line, as others whisked by him on both sides.

Senior Spencer Ornes crossed the finish line upright with a time of 16:45.00 but threw up about 50 yards beyond the finish line. Other Novi runners also appeared dazed and exhausted following the race.

In spite of the agony and disappointments, several team members achieved pleasing results. Moore, Huprikar, and Justin Namn ran season best times despite the course's shape.

Moore finished third with a time of 15:38.50 and Huprikar finished eighth with a time of 15:48.00 to earn All-State hon-





"Mark has been the spiritual leader of this senior class," said Novi coach Bob Smith. "He has been the guy that all the other athletes measure themselves against. Because of his knowledge and ability, he commanded respect.'

Moore didn't just step up for one meet though. He did well all season. He took second overall in Kensington Valley the Conference finals meet as well as third in the Oakland County meet. In the regional, Moore was first overall.

"He has set the tone of the team and, fortunately, the tone has been positive and profound," Smith said.

The Novi senior is a returning member of the HomeTown Newspapers All-Area team, having been named to the squad last season as well. He was also named Athlete of the Year by his team.

Leading the pack

Huprikar is a walking trophy . case. He was the fourth-fastest Kensington Valley Conference runner in the state finals this season with his overall finish of eighth place in just 15:48. He earned All-KVC, All-Oakland County, All-Region and All-State honors this season.

"He has twice achieved All-State status in Division I cross country," said Smith. "Amol is also a student of the sport. He knew the competition, the curses, the strategies and the mental aspect of racing.'

Quite frankly, any team would have been drooling over having such a high caliber runner step up and be their top man.

"He was very active in guiding our younger athletes in the finer points of meet preparation," Smith said.

The All-Area team is just another accolade Huprikar can add to his resume. It marks a return trip for him to the squad, having made it last season as a junior.

Spencer for hire

A strong cross country team has strong finishers who may not be the top runner on the team but always does what's best for his

Spencer Ornes, a senior at Novi High School, is one of those runners. His best time this season was a 16:42 and he came through for his team when they needed it the most.

"Spencer was 100-percent committed to our program," said Smith. "He came into the season fully prepared to make his senior year his best. He accomplished that goal and then some."

In the Kensington Valley Conference meet, against some of the toughest runners Michigan has to offer, Ornes pushed his way into the top flight of runners and came away in 10th place to help Novi secure the championship. In the regional, he ran one of his best races of the year, finishing seventh to help Novi carn that title too.

"As evidence of his drive to excellence, Spencer ran over 700 miles during this past summer leading up to the season," Smith noted.

He also earned an All-Oakland County nod this season to add to his All-Area honors. Ornes deserves his accolades. Few runners work as hard as he does.

Career performances

Novi senior Justin Namm came into this season knowing if he put up his best performances he could hang with some of the toughest runners around — his peers in the Kensington Valley Conference.

Namm did that and a whole lot more in his final stint as a harrier.

"Justin knew how to race and train," Smith said. "It was not unusual for Justin to be at the front of the pack during our practice runs. He stayed focused all year."

In his senior season, Namm collected a career-best run of 16:38 in the state finals. He also earned All-Oakland County honors this year thanks to his impressive running.

"Justin knew the correlation between quality practices and quality racing," said Smith.
In the KVC meet, he was key

in Novi's overall victory for the conference title. He edged past some tightly-packed runners and came in 11th to help secure the crown. He also notched an eighth-place finish in the regional meet and helped Novi to the title.

In the state meet Namm kicked out his best performance, finishing 55th overall.

Huprikar now an All-American runner

Amol Huprikar runs through life.

In the fall, Huprikar runs with Novi High School's cross country team and in the spring he runs with the track and field team. After the season's done he finds himself running some more.

Huprikar recently made news with a second place finish in a highly competitive national race with a time of 15:37 in less-than-favorable conditions. He was less than a second behind the winner.

The end result beyond places and times? Huprikar can now claim the title of All-American.

"I was happy that I got second," he said. "I was excited because I didn't expect that. I wanted to stay up front and planned out when I would move, but I honestly thought there would be a lot more people with me."

And the temperature?

"The actual temperature was about 25," Huprikar said. "With wind chill it was about four or five degrees though."

Huprikar toughed through it though. He had to. It was his first national race. Following last season's cross country schedule he chose not to compete at that level.

"Last year I was pretty beat up by the end of the year," he said. "Plus, I was happy with my finish at the state meet and content to leave it like that. This year we've been planning on doing stuff after the end of the season so we went out and did it."

The other part of the "we" is none other than Novi coach Bob Smith. He knows talent when he sees it. He's coached national champions before. Huprikar definitely had the fire to compete at that level.

"Amol is an amazing athlete," said Smith. "He knows what it takes to reach his goals."

Which is exactly what Huprikar will have to do when he heads to college. He's been talking to Michigan State with hopes of becoming a Spartan next year with fellow Kensington Valley Conference runner Dana Pitcock. He's still looking at the University of Michigan and Purdue as well.

"Right now I'm just scheduling some official visits," said the senior. "Even if I don't get a scholarship, they usually end up giving money to the runners who do good their first season."

Huprikar, who hopes to study engineering at whatever school he ends up attending, is looking forward to the challenge of racing at the collegiate level.

"I like the idea of racing against harder competition," he said. "The kids are bigger and faster and it's twice as far. It's not going to be easy, but I'll enjoy it."
