Running against new opponents

Traditions are big with Novi cross country. The Wildcat runners take pride in passing the torch from one great class to another.

Evidence may be found with several graduated runners from Novi's storied past continuing to run with the current team in earlyseason practices.

But last year's team was not able to make the state meet, something that had been a staple in the past.

The Wildcats lost a pair of top runners from last year's team, but

they return a host of others that will try to keep Novi mentioned as one of the top teams in the state.

Returnees Mike Blaszczyk (captain), Jake Carless (captain), TJ Butler (captain), Lucas Barnes and Dan Bgner lead a host of runners that will try to get the Wildcats back to the elite race of the year. Andrew Burkhardt is the fourth captain.

Wildcats stake claim at Spartan Invite

EAST LANSING — While some may have believed Novi had faded away among the top boys cross country teams, the Wildcats made their presence known at Friday's Spartan Invitational at Forest Akers East Golf Course.

Mike Blaszczyk placed second, leading five runners among the top 80 finishers, as the Wildcats won the Green Division title with 100 points.

Novi. which won its second straight Spartan Invitational title, highlighted a strong showing by Oakland County athletes at one of the state's largest cross country meets.

Troy's Mike Atchoo won the Green Division individual title. leading the Colts to third place; Megan Goethals of Rochester won the girls Elite Division title: Waterford Kettering's Alex Katona placed third in the boys White Division race and Stoney Creek. Novi and Farmington were second, third and fourth respectively in the girls Green Division race

Blaszczyk came in at 16:12 for the five-kilometer course, finishing a second behind Atchoo. But teammates Dan Egner (19th), Alex Minghine (21st), Joe Schubring (28th) and Thomas

Butler (30th) all finished within 12 seconds of each other.

"It's huge," said Novi coach Robert Smith who, in the last four years at the Spartan Invitational, coached the Wildcats to three firsts and a second-place finish. "There's 41 teams here and this is one of the premier meets in the state.

The Willicats also uncovered newfound depth on the squad. All of their top seven runners

were among the first 55 finishers, considerably ahead of other squads. Only the top five runners score.

"We had one boy who didn't run today and another one banged up," said Smith, "but I know when we're healthy we're a darn good team. Now we've proven we're a deep team (too). We had some boys that stepped up and filled the holes."

Smith said the Wildcats, a

traditional state meet participant, did not qualify for state last year and may have been under the radar. But they are no longer

Atchoo, among the lead pack the entire race, shook off Blaszczyk in the final strides in

a thrilling finish.

"I was with the leaders all the way and the last 200 meters. I just sprinted," smiled the junior, whose teammate James Yau came in 16th. "It's real exciting. Last year I got third, and I was hoping I'd do well again."

Meanwhile Goethals, who won the OAA Red Jamboree last Tuesday took her racing to another level, as she clocked a sizzling 17:39 on a damp course.

Grand Blanc's Gabrielle Anzalone, who placed fourth at the Division 1 state meet last year, went to the front and stayed until Goethals, who was several seconds behind, slowly reeled her in.

"A little after the two-mile mark, that's when I decided to go," said Goethals, who was still wary despite taking charge. "I thought she (Anzalone) was going to shoot by me at the end. When I crossed the line. I felt like I was going to pass out, but I feel good now I didn't think I could win it. I was so excited. I've never won something like

this before, so this is really cool."

Anzalone said she felt physically well but couldn't respond to Goethals's move. "I just told myself don't give up and just push through it," said Anzalone, who clocked 17:56. "I got a season PR and I broke 18 minutes. which is what I wanted to do."

Katona pointed to his bandaged lower leg, moments after his race.

"I've got two big gashes there," said the junior, who also plays soccer. "(But) I'm not complaining about a third-place finish."



Goethals completes undefeated season

But that day

BROOKLYN — Even as the victories began mounting, Megan Goethals of Rochester High School still felt she'd eventually get ambushed.

has yet to come, as Goethals completed an unbeaten season by capturing the Division 1 individual state title Saturday at Michigan International Speedway.

Goethals topped a strong group of contenders, including last year's defending state champion, Shannon Osika of Waterford Mott, who was second.

The slender junior completed the five-kilometer course in 17:10.1, the fastest time of all the division runners and believed to be the fastest ever by a high school female on the course.

"I didn't think it was going to last (victories)," she said. "I was just really surprised I was able to keep it up the whole season. It just feels so good."

Grand Blanc's Gabrielle
Anzalone was the early leader
and Osika followed a few seconds behind until Goethals and
Osika overhauled Anzalone and
made it a two-person race the
last mile.

Osika was taken to the limit by the blistering final mile as Goethals took control.

"I stayed with her as long as I could," said Osika, who burning with pain, felt like giving up. "I didn't want those mental thoughts to get to me, so I knew if I couldn't get a state title, I could get a really good time."

She did, running a personal best 17:17. But, "that was the worst I felt after a race ever," she said.

Cally Macumber (sixth) and Lindsey Hilton (10th) were top finishers for Rochester Adams; Kristen Smith (ninth) and Natalie Smith (23rd) led Clarkston and Lindsay Clark (12th) and Julia Valencia (23rd) led Walled Lake Western.

On the boys side, Lake Orion placed fourth with 186 points, Novi Detroit Catholic Central was sixth (243) and Rochester Adams (11th) and Novi (13th) followed behind state champ Ann Arbor Pioneer, who scored 82 points.

Troy's Mike Atchoo placed second in 15:22, Brother Rice's

Mike Murphy was third (15:23) and Rochester's Kenny Laskowski placed fifth (15:29) behind winner Stephen Walker of Midland Dow, who finished in 15:18.

Atchoo had Walker in his sights in the final stretch but couldn't close.

"I was feeling tired, (but) I got my second wind," said Atchoo, who felt good about his effort.

"It was brutal," Murphy said of the final stretch, "but I'm pretty pleased. I gave it all I could. I'm glad it's over."

Laskowski bettered his previous best by some 10 seconds.

. "I didn't see this coming at all," said the senior, who let the race come to him. "It kind of him me at the 1½ mile mark I could count the people in front of me."

Lake Orion was missing Doug Mack, the Dragons' fourth runner who was out with a hip flexor.

"Basically, we all had to dig deeper," said Jeremiah Hargett, who placed 12th behind teammates Sean Bone (10th) and Ryan Ziolko (11th) as all finished within two seconds of each other.

Ricardo Galindo, who placed 22nd, led Catholic Central, expected to be one of the contenders.

"We ran OK, it's just everybody ran better," Shamrocks coach Tony Magni said. "I thinl we just got caught up in the moment. (But) we had a great year."

Also running for Novi were Jacob Carless (115th) and Alex Minghine (126).


With just two seniors in the seven runners that ran at state, Smith is fired up for next year.

Calculating Catholic Central takes Huron Meadows regional

BRIGHTON — A last-minute subtraction added up to a more difficult journey for Novi **Detroit Catholic Central's cross** country team.

But the Shamrocks didn't depend on luck. They reached down deeper into a depth-laden lineup to help pull out a victory at the Division 1 Region 6 cross country championship Friday at Huron Meadows Metropark.

Catholic Central finished with 49 points to place ahead of Pinckney (58), a three-time defending state champion, and Novi (87), as all earned qualifying berths to next week's state cross country championships. The top three teams and top 15 individuals qualify for the state meet, to be held Nov. 1 at Michigan International Speedway.

On the girls side, Brighton, whose Liz Kingshott placed third to lead five teammates n the top 14, won with 48. Pinckney was second with 65 and Novi was third with 88 as all qualified for state. Courtney Calka of Livonia Stevenson

won in 17:47.8.

Shamrocks coach Tony Magni was challenged to solve the absence of John-Paul Zebrowski, the team's third runner, who moments before the race said he couldn't run because of a pain in his leg.

Even so, the deep Shamrocks had reserves on the roster who

filled in the gaps.


"My eighth guy was my sixth runner today." Magni said of sophomore Mackenzie Boyd,

who placed 24th.

Ricardo Galindo was second to lead Catholic Central, finishing in 15:53.4, just ahead of Novi's Mike Blasczyzk, who finished in 15:53.8. Alex Toloff was fifth, Viktor Puskorius was 12th and Austin Zebrowski, John-Paul's twin brother, was

"They ran as a group and that's what we needed," said Magni, who had high expectations of his crew. "I thought we should qualify but it would be nice to win."

Pinckney's Matt Wines won in 15:41 as the Pirates could still be a factor in state competition.

"This is a heckuva regional," signed Novi boys coach Robert Smith, who noted five of the teams which competed were at the state meet last year.

"I knew it was going to be tough from the start," Blasczyzk said. "Last year we didn't qualify for states (and) it was a heartbreaker. I knew I had to run fast the whole race. We were a really solid pack from two through five.

Thomas Butler (17th) and Daniel Egner (20th) were other top finishers for the Wildcats, who had a string of top-10 state finishes since 1998 halted last year. "It's nice to start the streak (again)," Smith said. Walled Lake Western's Kosei

Yajima placed 10th to also qualify for state.

For the girls, Novi's Elle Robinson and the Wildcats were in suspense until they found out they made the cut.

But why was she smiling after crossing the finish line?

"Cause I broke the school record," beamed Robinson, who clocked 18:36.9 to place fifth. Teammate Abby Chandler (eighth) and Kelsey Hodge (12th) followed as Novi's top

Walled Lake Western, running one of its best races of the season, was edged out for the final qualifying spot with its fourth-place finish (110).

But Lindsay Clark, who

placed second in 18:12, and Julia Valencia, sixth in 18:47, earned state berths for the Warriors.

Clark, who felt a pain in her knee, held back at the start. But her 5:35 first mile was her fastest ever, "(and) I remembered to keep up my pace," she said.

North Farmington's Angela Wright placed 15th in 19:35.6,... finishing a fraction of a second ahead of Northville's Gina McNamara, who came in at

Kristina Rikkonen, who was 18th, led Farmington, which placed fifth.

Runners excel in the classroom

Southfield Christian's boys and girls were capable on the cross country course as well as the classroom this past season.

The Eagles were the top boys and girls team academically in Division 4, according to the Michigan Interscholastic Track Coaches Association (MITCA) Academic All-State team. Southfield Christian's boys ranked first in Division 4 with a cumulative 3.822 grade-point average and the girls ranked first with a team average of 3.896.

Victor Allen of Southfield Christian had a 4.0, tied for first among Division 4 athletes, and Rachel Carter and Carmen Allen each had 4.0 GPAs, also tied for first. Anna Goike of Royal Oak Shrine also had a 4.0.

Oakland County athletes were represented in all four divisions.



In Division 3, Shannon Morehouse of Clawson was tied for best GPA with a 4.0.

In Division 2, Kayla Gawlik of Bloomfield Hills Lahser joined 13 other athletes, each with 4.0 GPAs and Anthony Porretta, also of Lahser, had a 3.92 average for academic honors.

In Division 1, Lindsay Clark (Walled Lake Western), Grace Green (Troy), Christinia Cappricioso (West Bloomfield) and Lauren Kettle (Milford) each had 4.0 GPAs to earn academic all-state honors.

Troy's Michelle Moriset and Shelby Janutol, Rochester's Molly Pozolo and Brook Handler, and Lindsey Hilton of Rochester Adams each had averages of 3.833 or higher.

Among Division 1 boys, Mike Atchoo (Troy) and Mike Murphy (Birmingham Brother Rice) each had 4.0 GPAs along with Ricardo Galindo, Austin Zebrowski and John-Paul Zebrowski, all from Novi Detroit Catholic Central, who also had 4.00 averages. The Shamrocks had the top GPA (3.996) of all teams, with Novi (3.838) and Rochester (3.705) sixth and 10th best respectively.

Victor Puskorius (Catholic Central) had a 3.979 GPA while James Yau (Troy), Ken Laskowski (Rochester), Stefan Morell (Lakeland), and Novi's Thomas Butler and Michael Blaszczyk were other honorees, each with at least a 3.85 average.

In the sprawling compound of Michigan International Speedway, the site of the annual state high school cross country meet, Ryan Ziolko of Lake Orion felt right at home.

After all, the senior was making his third appearance at state, and "the experience is

better each year," said Ziolko, who along with teammate Sean Bone helped lead Lake Orion to fourth place in the Division 1 race.

The pair was joined by Mike Murphy of Brother Rice, Ken Laskowski of Rochester and Mike Atchoo of Troy as the area's top quintet of cross country runners this season.

This distance Dream Team proved itself all season long with solid efforts against the best runners in the state.

For Bone, also making his third trip to state, the relatively flat course at MIS was a welcome site for the junior. "We hadn't done a lot of flat courses so it was nice," he said.

So close were their abilities that Ziolko and Bone often battled each other for placings. The pair led Lake Orion to the OAA Red Division title as well as regional and Holly Invitational titles while being among the top finishers in all their meets.

At Holly, Bone and Ziolko were second and fourth respectively and at regionals, Bone was runner-up, while Ziolko placed sixth.

"Ryan has been a part of basically two league championships and four regional championships," Lake Orion coach Stan Ford said, "and I think that speaks for itself, in some respects, where he's been and how he's contributed to the team,"

Bone's competitiveness helped drive the Dragons. "Sean being a junior he is what every coach hopes for,"
Ford said. "When he gets
through with the season; he
comes to me and asks what can
I do to get better next year. He
has a lot of drive and determination."

Likewise, so do Atchoo and Murphy, a pair of smiling, friendly, easy going students with high grade point averages — both are 4.0 grade point average students and both are academic all-state honorees

 who turn into relentless competitors when it comes to racing.

But it was a season-long development for Atchoo, according to coach Eric. Prowse, which pushed him to the forefront.

"He was by no means ready to compete for the state title in September," said Prowse, "(but) he was able to learn something new about himself each time he raced." Atchoo took second in the first OAA Red Jamboree, but convincingly won the next two jamborees. He added individual titles at the Algonac regional and Spartan Invitational meets, too, to go with his Division 1 race runner-up finish at the state cross country meet. In fact, Atchoo went from 31st at state last year to No. 2 this year as he was bearing down on eventual state champ Stephen Walker of Midland Dow.

"Once he was able to trust himself to contend with the lead pack, he was confident that he could finish with a strong kick if the race came down to that."

Indeed, with his school-record-setting 15:22.9 clocking at state, he shaved nearly 40 seconds off his previous best state effort. Lots of speed and shorter-intensity workouts toward the end of the season helped, according to Atchoo. But lots of his mom's pasta didn't hurt either.

As for Murphy, who won Oakland County, Catholic Central Invitational and Holly regional titles, he was bearing down on Atchoo at the state meet, but placed third in 15:23.2, a career best and just a fraction of a second behind Atchoo.

"I felt pretty strong at the end (and) I gave it all I could," said Murphy, who has already been accepted to the University of Michigan, but is also looking at several Ivy League schools.

Laskowski placed fourth in the OAA Red Jamborees Nos. 1 and 2, and was sixth in the championship jamboree. He placed 17th at the Oakland County meet, and was fifth at the Algonac regional where he clocked 15:40. But he improved that time at the Division 1 state meet when he came in fifth in 15:29.9, topping his previous career best. He used a simple formula at state. "I would just find a guy and stick with them and basically move up," said Laskowski, an academic allstate honoree who has a 3.8 grade point average.

He was third at regionals and placed 19th at the Division 1 state meet in 15:45.1.

Nate Huff, Milford — Thrust into a leadership role after graduation losses, Huff responded, taking his place as the team's top runner. After finishing 11th at the KLAA Lakes Conference meet and 14th at the Oakland County meet, the junior placed fourth at the Holly regional,

Eight local runners fared well recently at the USATF Junior Olympic Championships in Mechanicsville, Va. Mike Blaszczyk, Chase Conrad, Dan Egner, Geoff Giese, Brett Giampa, Alex Minghine and Garrett Murphy, all from Novi, ran as a team in the intermediate boys division (ages 15-16) and placed 11th nationally. The squad geared up for nationals by placing second in the state level competition held in Northville and third in regional competition held in Canton, Ohio.

"What makes this team special is that they chose to run together as a group of local runners when virtually every other team competing were all-star teams that cherry-picked the best runners from a large geographical area," said David Egner, the team coach. "The fact that we finished 11th in the nation is a testimony to the

quality of their high school cross country program and the commitment of these young men to train hard for six weeks after the high school season ended."

Leading the way for Team Ivon was Mike Blaszczyk, who earned All-American honors by finishing 14th in the field of 213 runners with a time of 16:34 for the five-kilometer course. Blaszczyk was the first Michigan runner to cross the finish line. Dan Egner finished 57th (17:21), Minghine 77th (17:32), Giese 82nd (17:32), Giampa 160th (18:29), Murphy 161st (18:30) and Conrad 165th (18:36).

Running unattached in the young men's division (ages 17-18) was Josh Lumley, who had a time of 17:34 to place 66th in the field of 135 runners. Lumley, a freshman at the University of Michigan, is a member of the Michigan Running Club.

"We also have captain's practices, and the first few weeks of fall are every challenging so [members] can get used to the rest of the season," Burkhardt said.


In captain's practices, members run with people of their own pace so that no one feels left behind.
